

Session 1875-76.

September 7th The Faculty met in called session to make some arrangements for commencing next session.

In the absence of Prof. Patterson in Europe, Prof. Shackleford was elected Pres. of this Faculty pro tem.

A resolution was ~~at~~ then passed, recommending to Ex. Committee of N.Y. University, Prof. Shackleford as the most suitable of our number to act as Presiding officer in Prof. Patterson's absence.

Mr. Friedrich, who obtained a furlough near the close of last session was honorably discharged.

Mr. Smith was excused from drill.

It was then resolved that students who work as much as four hours daily be excused from drill. Each member of the Faculty was requested to furnish the Sec. with a list of his classes in order that he may arrange the hours of recitation for all classes.

Col. Whistler submitted a series of regulations for the organization and conducting of ~~clubs~~, to take the place of the clubs hitherto in existence in this College. These regulations were adopted.

Regent Bowman having dismissed Messrs. Floete, Fowler, Crawford and Comer from the working department because they refused to take milk at the price fixed by himself, and the former ^{two} of these young men having done every thing, which they could honorably do, to ~~the~~ secure admission into the College (Mr. Bowman having refused to admit them) and still the Regent requiring of Mr. Fowler (a state student from Hopkine Co.) to obligate himself not to ask for work (which by the charter of the College he was entitled to) before he would allow him to matriculate, the Faculty appointed Profs. Ewert and Shackleford as a committee to wait on the Regent and request him to allow Mr. Fowler to matriculate.

On motion the Faculty adjourned.

September 13

The Faculty met in called session to consider the request of some students.

Mr. Ward was, at his request, excused from drill in consequence of his working for a gentleman in the country in order to pay his boards.

Messrs. Blanchard and Perry were excused from drill on account of their working the entire afternoon.

A resolution was then passed stating that no student, who resides on the College grounds, will be excused from drill except on such days as he is engaged in work assigned by the Superintendent of the Labor department. It was also resolved that a student of any other College, other than the "A. C. C.", be not allowed to occupy a room on these grounds, unless special permission be given him.

On motion the Faculty adjourned.

November 4

The Faculty met in Col. Whittier's Office at 10 o'clock. Mr. D. Taylor was present, charged by Col. Whittier with refusing to obey an order issued by Maj. Thebault. The evidence in the case being insufficient to establish the charge it was withdrawn.

Mr. Thompson, acting as Superintendent of the Farm, was present and stated ^{that} the students in the Labor department were unwilling to work longer without receiving the money due them. In consequence of a resolution, passed by the Executive Committee,
