The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in regular quarterly session in the President's Office at 10:30 a. m., Wednesday, June 3, 1931. The following members were present; Governor Flem D. Sampson, Judge Richard C. Stoll, Mr. Louis Hillenmeyer, Mr. James C. Utterback, Dr. W. W. Wash, Mr. James M. Turner. Meeting with the Board were President Frank L. McVey and Wellington Patrick, Secretary.

The minutes of the April meeting of the Board and the minutes of the Executive Committee since that time were on motion duly seconded approved.

Dear Dr. McVey:

We were unable to complete our financial report for May in time for this meeting. We will file it with the secretary for insertion in the minutes.

It appears from a study of the receipts and expenditures to date and the estimated receipts for June that it is probable that the expenditures for the year will not exceed the receipts and the surplus of income over expenditures June 30, 1930. This includes expenditures for building operations.

However, there will be a deficit in our bank account of approximately \$175,000.00. This is due to the fact that our books are carrying accounts receivable such as Campus Book Store, Memorial Building, etc., amounting to \$185,000.00.

2. Payments on Library. President McVey reported to the Board that the payments for work on the Library would be all completed by July 1, and that the payments were being made in accordance with the contract on certificate from the architect. He indicated that \$26,000 additional was now due on the Library.

3. President's Report. President McVey made a brief report to the Board covering the following points:

a. Building and Financial Matters. He indicated that the University had practically completed its building program. The Library, he said, is completed and ready for occupancy; and the furniture is now being moved in; and the Library will be occupied at once.

The Agricultural Engineering Building will be ready for occupancy about August 1, 1931.

The bills for the construction of the University Library will be paid by July 1, 1931.

He indicated that the University does not owe anything at the bank and the University has, during the last year, lived within its income. He did, however, indicate that there is a book deficit as explained in the letter from the Business Agent, quoted above. He stated that in the budget for this coming year the University is preparing for a decrease of approximately \$200,000. This, however, is a matter of estimate; and the President was not quite sure that the estimate was correct.

b. Educational Matters President McVey presented to the Board an announcement from the State Teachers' College, Bowling Green, Kentucky, to the effect that that institution is undertaking to give graduate work. The matter was discussed; and a motion was made, seconded, and carried authorizing the President in the near future to call an Educational Conference of the college presidents of the various institutions of the State of Kentucky for the purpose of discussing problems common to the institutions, the conference to be held at the University of Kentucky.

4. Election of Officers. The following officers were re-elected for the ensuing year: Richard C. Stoll, Vice Chairman; John Skain, Treasurer; and Wellington Patrick, Secretary. The Executive Committee: Richard C. Stoll, Robert G. Gordon, James W. Turner, James Park, and J. R. Rash.

5. Alumni Election. Under the statutes of the State of Kentucky an alumni election for alumni members of the Board of Trustees of the University is held every second year. A motion was made, seconded, and carried that the Secretary be authorized to have prepared ballots for an alumni election and have them distributed according to the regulations of the Board previously adopted.

6. Granting of Degrees. The following list of candidates for degrees recommended by the University Senate was presented; and on motion, duly seconded, the degrees recommended were authorized to be conferred:

7. Emergency Work for Unemployment. A communication was read from Dean Thomas P. Cooper indicating that President Hoover's Committee on Emergency Work for Unemployment has made available \$5,000 for the University for the participation in a project in carrying out a family food production in connection with industrial unemployment. Dean Cooper asked that the Dean of the College of Agriculture be authorized to enter into an agreement with the President's Emergency Committee for the purpose indicated. A motion was made, seconded, and carried approving the request.

8. Purchase of Truck. A communication was read from Mr. M. J. Crutcher, Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, requesting that he be permitted to purchase one truck for \$425. The truck which he proposes to buy is a slightly used one and will represent a saving of about \$175 on a new truck. Motion was made, seconded, and carried that the request be approved.

9. Report to State Superintendent of Schools. President McVey indicated that the State Superintendent of Schools had requested certain financial data from the University. He presented to the Board a statement which he proposed to furnish regarding the University's finances. Motion was made, seconded, and carried authorizing the President to furnish the report requested.

10. Bids for Equipment of Piggery. At a previous meeting of the Board, it authorized a committee to accept bids for equipment of the Piggery which is under construction. The bids received were as follows:

The Committee recommended the acceptance of the bid of Clay Equipment Corporation, because it gives the most equipment for the money and is regarded as the most satisfactory bid. Motion was made, seconded, and carried approving the action of the Committee letting the bid.

11. Training School Contract with City Board of Education. President McVey presented to the Board a statement indicating that there is due the City of Lexington \$2,687.00 from the University. This amount is due the Board of Education by reason of the contract which the University has with the Board of Education of the City of Lexington. That contract provided that the City of Lexington shall pay the University \$1,250 each year for each teacher in the first eight grades, with the understanding that the City shall have the privilege of placing twenty-five pupils in the first eight grades and that the University may increase the number to thirty pupils, the additional pupils being charged tuition. Under the practical operation of the Training School, however, it so worked out that the City did not have twenty-five pupils in each grade; and the University filled up the remaining space with tuition pupils. Under these circumstances it was considered reasonable by the Board that the amount indicated should be paid to the City Board of Education. Motion was therefore made, seconded, and carried that payment be made accordingly.

12. Salary of A. J. Zimmerman. President McVey reported to the Board that A. J. Zimmerman, instructor in Chemistry, recently died and that it has been the custom of the Board to pay the salary of the deceased members until the end of the fiscal year. Motion was made, seconded, and carried that the salary be paid to the widow and family until the end of the fiscal year, July 1.

13. Leave of Absence for Dr. W. W. Dimock. The British Blood Stock Agency of England has sent an invitation to Dr. W. W. Dimock to visit Continental Europe and England for one month, June 25 to August 25, and to lecture on veterinary problems in blooded stock, it being understood that all his expenses are to be paid during the trip by the British Blooded Stock Agency. Motion was made, seconded, and carried that leave of absence be granted to Doctor Dimock for this purpose.

14. Lease of Practice House Dean Cooper was authorized to lease house at 162 Bonnie Brae Court for the year at \$900 for a practice house department of Home Economics.

15. Request of Carpenters' Union. A communication was read from the local Carpenters' Union requesting the University to work carpenters for eight-hour day instead of nine-hour day as a matter of helping out in the employment situation. The matter was referred to the President with power to act.

16. State Plumbing Code. A communication was read from M. J. Crutcher, Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, stating that the state plumbing code requires an examination of the University plumber in order to meet the requirements of the State Plumbing Code. A fee of \$25.00 is charged for the examination, and Mr. Crutcher requested that this amount be paid for Mr. Claud Dickerson in order that he qualify. Motion was made, seconded, and carried that the request be approved.

17. Extension Work for Colored Teachers. A communication was read from the Board of Regents of the Kentucky State Industrial College for Colored People at Frankfort asking the University of Kentucky to provide extension courses for colored teachers in order that they may have more adequate service in their preparation for teaching. The matter was discussed, and the request was referred to the President with the understanding that he take the matter under advisement and look into the legal aspects before having the matter passed on by the Board.

18. Naming of Buildings. The question of naming the buildings was brought up; and a motion was made, seconded, and carried that the following buildings be named as indicated: The old Education Building to be named Frazee Hall in honor of D. F. Frazee, a former member of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky. The old Gymnasium now known as Alumni Hall to be renamed Barker Hall in honor of President Barker, formerly President of the University. The Gymnasium Building now known as the Basket-Ball Building to be renamed Alumni Gymnasium because of the fact that the building was built by the Alumni of the University of Kentucky.

19. Appointments, Resignations, and Leaves of Absence. The list of appointments, resignations, and leaves of absence was recommended by President McVey and on motion, duly seconded, approved:

Resignation of A. M. Lands, assistant professor in anatomy and physiology, effective at the end of the scholastic year.

Resignation of W. B. Hamilton, assistant bacteriologist in the Public Service Laboratories, effective August 31.

Leave of absence granted to Mrs. Laura Shade on account of illness for two months.

Resignation of Miss Dorothy Banks, clerk in the Poultry Section, effective May 31.

Appointment of Miss Mildred Lewis, instructor, Music Department, at a salary of \$2200 a year, one-half of her salary to be paid by the Department of Music, and the other one-half to be paid by the Department of University Extension, it being understood that Miss Lewis is to give one-half of her time to each Department.

Appointment of Leo M. Chamberlain as director of the Bureau of School Service, effective at the beginning of the next scholastic year.

Appointment of Miss Lucille Lee Bush, clerk in the Poultry Section, Extension Division, at a salary of \$90.00 a month, effective June 1, 1930.

Appointment of Miss Katherine Kinnard Wilson as graduate assistant in Romance Languages for one year at a salary of \$600.

Appointment of Dr. L. W. Cohen, assistant professor of mathematics for one year at a salary of \$2500.

Appointment of Anna Colton, assistant home demonstration agent for Christian County at a salary of \$100 a month from June 3 to December 31, 1931.

Continuation of employment of Mary Clopton, home demonstration agent for Breathitt County, at a salary of \$183.33 1/3 a month from July 1 to June 30, 1932.

Appointment of Christine Blakeman, assistant home demonstration agent for Oldham County, at a salary of \$100 a month from June 1 to December 31, 1931.

Appointment of I. D. Clark, instructor in History for one year at a salary of \$1800.

Appointment of Dr. Leon W. Cohen, assistant professor of Mathematics, for one year at \$2500.

Appointment of Miss May Hutchison, home demonstration agent, Garrard County, at a salary of \$150 a month from June 1 to July 1, 1931.

Continuation of employment of Hazel Graves, home demonstration agent, Madison County, at a salary of \$183 1/3 a month, effective June 1 to May 31, 1932.

Continuation of employment of Ruth Etheridge, home demonstration agent, Bell County, at a salary of \$150 a month from July 1 to December 31, 1931.

Appointment of Miss Ruth R. Waterfield, assistant home demonstration agent of Calloway County, at a salary of \$150 a month from May 1 to May 31, 1931.

Appointment of E. W. Montgomery, assistant professor of Sociology, for the year 1931-32 at a salary of \$2500.

Appointment of Dr. Harold Landin, assistant professor of History, at \$2500, for one year.

Appointment of Mr. Robert H. Baker, instructor in the Department of Chemistry for one year at a salary of \$1600.

Appointment of E. B. Mason, graduate assistant in the Department of Chemistry at a salary of \$600.

Appointment of Charles Morell, graduate assistant in the Department of Chemistry at a salary of \$600.

Appointment of A. J. Middleton and C. P. Kratz, student assistants in the department of Zoology, at a salary of \$40 a month each.

Appointment of Mr. Joe Palmer, instructor in English, at a salary of \$2000.

Appointment of Miss Joy Pride for the first term of the summer session at a salary of \$177.75. She is to take care of the Art Library during the first term, as well as give courses.

Appointment of Dr. R. E. Jagers to be employed at a salary of \$375 for the first term of the summer session to take the place of Dr. Jesse Adams.

Appointment of Miss Elizabeth Gay to take the place of Mr. Lawrence Yates at the same salary for the summer session.

Appointment of Miss Margaret Stucker as school librarian in the University High School at a salary of \$1200.

20. Committee to Visit Sub-Experiment Stations. At the request of the President a committee was appointed by the Board to visit the Princeton and Quicksand sub-experiment stations. The following were appointed: Mr. Utterback, Mr. Hillenmeyer, Captain Rash, and President McVey to visit Princeton Station; Mr. Turner, Mr. Andrews and Doctor Wash to visit Quicksand Station.
