Having a Pap smear taken regularly may avoid further problems

The adoption of the Pap smear into women's health care has decreased the incidence of invasive cancer of the ecriv (the opening of the uterus) and death due to detection and treatment of precarcerous abnormalities.

The Pap smear was developed by Dr. George Papanicolaou in the 1920s. This simple but important procedure is performed at the time of a woman's annual pelvic annual processor of a woman's annual pelvic annual processor in slides and properly "fixed" to preserve them.

The smear is sent to a lab for evaluation of the cell structure. If all the cells appear normal, the structure is a time cells appear normal, cells indicates the need for further evaluation. These abnormal cells may be called "dyplastic" cells.

Dysplasia
The term "plasia" means growth.
Dysplasia means disordered
growth. It is easier to understand
dysplasia if we first examine the

ormal cervix.

When we look at the lining of the normal cervix under a microscope we see layers of cells. The normal distribution is that the bottom layer is made of round young cells. As

the cells mature, they rise to the surface and flatten out, so that on the surface and flatten out, so that on the surface the cells are flav.

In dysplasia there is a lack of this organized growth process. In mild dysplasia only a few cells are abnormal, while in moderate dysplasia the abnormal cells involve about one half of the thickness of the surface lining of the cervix.

In severe dysplasia or carcinomatin-situ the entire thickness of cells is disordered, but the abnormal cells have not yet spread below the surface. Carcinoma-in-situ means 'cancer in place.' If this condition is not treated, it often will grow into a invasive cancer.

In dysplasia and carcinoma-insitu abnomalities are confined to the surface lining of the cervix. In invasive cancer cells are not only disordered throughout the entire hickness of the lining, but they invade the tissue underlying the surface. Invasive cancer is treated entirely differently than dysplasia.

A pap smear is only a screening tool and not a diagnosis. Therefore, when a Pap smear is abnormal we must look at the cervix more closely to determine the exact nature of the abnormality. This evaluation is

Colposcopy is the procedure of amining the cervix with a special strument to try to locate the urce of the abnormal cells found

in the Pay smear.

The instrument, a colposcope, resembles a pair of specially designed
inoculars with a light source and
enables the clinician to examine the
cervix under magnification. The
colposcope does not enter the vagina. The examination is nor paintain. It is
usually takes about 15 minutes
and can be done in the regular GYN
examination room.

The cervix is first cleaned with a mild vinegar solution, which aids in the visualization of any abnormal areas, and then the cervix is viewed through the colposcope. If an abnormal area is visualized a biopsy may be obtained to further evaluate the degree of abnormality.

Biopsy
When a biopsy of the cervix is obtained, a small segment of tissue is removed. This procedure is done in the examination room and causes little to no discomfort. Slight cramping may be felt.

any pre-cancerous areas. There are several ways to treat dysplasia, depending on the extent and severity of the dysplasia, the age of the woman, her desire for future prepancy and whether there are other gynecological problems.

Two common treatments for dysplasia are laser treatment and cryotherapy. A woman should discuss treatment options with her gynecologist. For students, further information on options is available in UK Student Health Service.

Follow up
An abnormal Pap smear is not something to take lightly. Once a woman has an abnormal Pap smear and careful evaluation and treatment are obtained more frequent. and careful evaluation and treatment are obtained, more frequent Pap smears are indicated — often every three months for one year, then every six months for one to two years before returning to annual smears.

For some women, more frequent Pap smears are a life-long reality. Although dysplasia is not cancer, it can progress to cancer if not treated.

By proper treatment and follow up the chances of cervical cancer can be significantly reduced. About one out of 10 pre-cancerous lesions of the cervix are likely to progress to invasive cancer if not treated, according to the Journal of American Medical Association (Vol. 261 No. 5 page 740, Feb. 3, 1989).

Who's at risk?
Studies over the years have lead to the conclusion that cervical cancer and its precursors (dysplasia)

ease. A woman is at risk if sexual intercourse began before age 20, if she has had more than one partner, and if her male sexual partner has a history of having multiple sexual partners. The increased risk in young women can be traced to the effects of sexual activity and the related exposure of the cervit to oncogenic (cancer-causing) stimuli at a time when the cervix is most vulnerable to abnormal changes.

The human papillomavirus is believed to be a contributing factor in cervical, vaginal and external genical abnormalities and cancer. Sudies have indicated that HPV is associated with 70 percent, and in some data as high as 90 percent, of cervical dysplasia cases. Dysplasia is considered a precursor of cervical cancer, and the severity of the dysplasia appears to be linked to the HPV type.

HPV Insert

HPV stands for human papillomavirus, a family of at least 60 viruses (types), about one-third of which
cause genital problems that affect
both males and females.

These problems include genital
warts and cell changes that can be
precancerous. HPV is recognized
as a sexually transmitted agent and
is among the most common sexually transmitted infections in this
country.

ocountry.

Unfortunately, HPV infections frequently do not produce symptoms, and an abnormal Pap smear may be a woman's first indication that she has the virus. Available treatments do not always cradicate the virus. Thus preventing transmission to a sexual partner is of para-

mount importance.

Co-existing factors that may increase a woman's risk of cervical cancer include smoking, an impaired immune system and a history of sexually transmitted diseases.

A woman should have her first Pap smear shortly after becoming sexually active, then yearly thereafter. For some women, Pap smears may be recommended more often.

The Pap smear should be obtained when a woman is not mensurating, and the ideal time is about day 14 of her menstratal cycle (first day of the period is day one). She should not douche, use a vaginal medication or have intercourse

Students may obtain more infor-mation on abnormal Pap smears and/or other women's health issues or sexually transmitted diseases by calling the Student Health Service at 233-6461 or 233-6465.

at 233-6461 or 233-6465. Students may obtain a Pap smear or evaluation for sexually transmitted diseases by coming to the Health Service, in the Medical Plaza, located across Rose Street from the Medical Center, from 9:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.

There is no charge for full-time students because the Pap smear is covered by the Student Health Fee. The charge for part-time students who have nor paid the health fee is \$15.75. No appointment is needed.



'VERY BLACK AND VERY URBAN'

"It's very black and very urban. People are afraid of that," said Cheryl Keyes about rap music Wednesday night in a lecture at the Martin Luther King Jr. Cultural Center titled "The Cultural Significant Center damericans."

Keyes, a professor in the department of Folk Studies at Western Kentucky University, has studied the style as well as the effects of rap music.

'Although it has been shrouded "Although it has been shrouded by the media, rap music has stayed around on its own terms (of black American culture). Its creators are true poets," she said.

Rap music began to surface in New York City in the 1970, mostly among black inner-city youths.

Rappers believe that one has to come from the streets to be able to rap, which is why it is rooted mostly in black American culture, Keyes said.

said.

Rap has received a "bad rap" from its audience because of a language barrier, Keyes said.

"The language is not always the same, and so people don't understand its meaning," Keyes said. "It often depends on the context."

'dope,' 'def' and 'wack' are words

Lisa Stofer, assistant dean of stu-dents for health education, said the fall 1988 creation of PALS resulted rom a survey — sponsored by the Dean of Students and Student Health Service — that indicated students preferred talking about problems to another student rather than a relative or a counselor.

relative or a counseior.

'The organization is "committed to helping other students with a variety of student-related problems," said Stofer, the group's adviser.

-Problems students and PALS have discussed range from disagreements with roommates to feeling "byerwhelmed" by academic presspres, Stofer said.

spres, Stofer said.

Richardson said sudents can contact a PAL and schedule a maximum of three, one-hour meetings.

If students need further help after three meetings, PALS refer them to agencies like Student Health Service, Richardson said.

PALS do not attempt to advise the students, said Joey Holifield, current president.

"We're not counselors," said Holifield, a psychology senior. "We're only there to listen and make a needs assessment. If it's serious enough then we usually make a re-

ferral to the Counseling and Testing Center or somewhere else."

Students, however, are trained by experts when becoming Peer Assistant Leaders, said Nancy Huenefeld,

a gratusa.

"We (the trainers) teach them bagroup.

"We (the trainers) teach them basic counseling skills like attending
and paraphrasing what people say

fraqi leadership, Aziz returned to Moscow late yesterday and hurried to a session with Gorbachev. Early today, the Soviet president's spokesman, Vitaly Ignatenko, went before reporters and announced that the two sides had agreed on a reight-point pacce plan, starting with Iraqi agreement to a full and unconditional withdrawal from Kuwait, monitored by the United Nations. The pullout would begin the second day after hostilities end.

Ignatenko said the Soviet-Iraqi
plan also provides that economic
sanctions against Baghdad would be
ended after withdrawal of two-thirds
of Iraq's forces; all prisoners of war

would be released immediately; and anti-Iraq U.N. resolutions would be canceled after a withdrawal. He said further details would be worked out and presented to the U.N. Security Council later this morning.

Saddam previously had sought to link simultaneous withdrawals of Iraq from Kuwait and of Israel from occupied Arab lands.
But the plan outlined by Ignaten-ko did not include any mention of such linkage to the Palestinian issue.

Fitzwater said the Bush adminis-Fitzwater said the Bush administration would continue to study the plan. He did not specify the U.S. "concerns," but the points announced in Moscow did not seem to answer objections the administration raised earlier to the Gorbachev

plan.

The Americans had told the Soviets a peace plan must also include a continued arms embargo against

Iraq, neutralization of Iraq's nucle-ar-weapons production potential, and a guarantee that Iraq will pay war damages, a Bush administra-tion official said yesterday. After announcement of the plan, one knowledgeable U.S. official said, "The Iraqis are talking about voiding other U.N. resolutions, in-cluding reparations for the damage they did to Kuwait. That, essential-ly, would be letting them get away with it."

The U.S. administration also had The U.S. administration also had told the Soviets the plan must include a withdrawal timetable of less than one week — apparently intended to be too short for withdrawal of all Iraqi heavy weapons from Kuwait.

Ignatenko did not announce the length of the timetable under the Soviet-Iraqi plan.

Some in Washington also suggest the allies make removal of Saddam from power an additional objective.
