Minutes of the Meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees, University of Kentucky, March 22, 1949.

The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in the President's Office at 10:30 a.m., Tuesday, March 22, 1949. The following members were present: Mr. Guy A. Huguelet, Chairman; R. P. Hobson, T. H. Cutler, and J. C. Everett. Absent: Harper Gatton. Judge Stoll, member of the Board of Trustees, met with the Committee, and President Donovan and Secretary Peterson were also present.

A. Approval of Minutes.

The minutes of the meetings of the Executive Committee of January 21 and February 22, 1949, were approved as published.

B. Comptroller's Report.

The Comptroller made the usual financial report, with balance sheet as of February 28, 1949. He submitted operating statement for income and expenditures for all divisions and departments for the period ended February 28, 1949. He read a brief analysis of the report:

My dear President Donovan:

I attach hereto a balance sheet of University funds as of February 28, 1949, together with supporting statements of fund operations for the current period then ended.

The balance sheet indicates the financial condition of the various University fund groups as recorded on the general books as of the date of the report.

The Unappropriated General Fund surplus was \$439,868.47, distributed as follows:

Restricted (Trust) Fund balances amounted to \$1,284,621.51. Included in the balances were funds invested amounting to \$600,744.05.

Unempended Plant Funds amounted to \$3,196,083.60, of which \$2,881,565.00 had been previously encumbered in the form of purchase orders or contracts. The remaining \$314,518.52 represented plant fund appropriation balances for bond redemption and interest, construction of Service Building, Fine Arts Building, Dairy Center, Animal Pathology Building, and other minor construction jobs.

The Student Loan Fund balance was \$74,388.62, which included \$56,297.51 designated as principal and \$18,091.01 unexpended income. Included in the balances were funds invested amounting to \$68,000.00, and student notes receivable of \$1,402.50.

The valuation placed on the University endowment fund principal was \$198,428.18. Endowment funds invested amounted to \$198,081.96. Unexpended income from endowment investments amounted to \$2,143.12.

The Agency funds handled by the University totaled §50,521.49. Agency funds in the amount of §15,000.00 were temporarily invested in securities.

The operating statements show that 81.9% of the total estimated income for the year had been realized. 94.2% of State Appropriations had been allotted by the State Department of Finance. Federal funds received were 93.4% of the budget estimate. Only 31.1% of the estimate of student fees were collected. However, the Veterans Administration has begun payment of Veterans fees and it is expected that most of the budget estimate for student fees will be realized during the remainder of the fiscal year. 95.3% of the budget estimate of other income had been realized.

The operating statements reveal further that 56.9% of the total departmental appropriation had either been encumbered or spent. The appropriation and charges by divisions and the per cent of appropriations charged are indicated in the following statement:

C. Telegram Sent to University of Kentucky Basketball Team.

Members of the Committee took note that the University of Kentucky Varsity basketball team was in New York participating in the National Collegiate Athletic Association tournament, Eastern Division, having defeated the Villanova Basketball team in the first round. It was moved, seconded and carried that the Committee send to Coach Rupp and the team a telegram congratulating them upon their victory, and extending encouragement and best wishes for the game with the University of Illinois.

D. Bids for Construction of Service Building Considered.

President Donovan stated that, pursuant to authorization of the Board, the Comptroller, Frank D. Peterson, had advertised for competitive bids for the construction and erection of the Service Building. The proposals were received, opened and read in public on March 21, 1949, and the tabulation of the bids was available. The tabulation was submitted to members of the Committee. Mr. E. B. Farris, Chief Engineer, was requested to meet with the Committee.

Alternates 1 to 12 on deductions were tabulated and presented.

Brock and Johnson, the architects, and Mr. E. B. Farris, Chief Engineer, recommended that alternates 1,2,3,4,5,6,7,8,9, and 11 be rejected, that alternate No. 10, substituting hollow metal for stainless steel on main entrance door at reduction of \$4,000.00 be accepted, and that alternate No. 12, substituting an oil hydraulic elevator for electric elevator be further investigated.

President Donovan stated that the University had insurance funds, received upon loss of the Service Building and Norwood Hall, aggregating approximately \$300,000, and that he thought it desirable to issue revenue bonds in amount of \$500,000 for the purpose of completing this structure. The proposal and the question of issuing revenue bonds were discussed, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Executive Committee recommended to the Board of Trustees of the University, which meets on April 5, 1949, that the Service Building be constructed, that the low bid of George H. Rommel, 958 Logan Street, Louisville, Ky., be accepted, and that the additional funds required be secured through the issuance of revenue bonds.

E. Bids for McLean Stadium Extension, Stoll Field, Considered.

President Donovan stated that, pursuant to direction of the Executive Committee, the Comptroller had advertised and received bids for extending McLean Stadium on the south side, by adding 17 rows across the top of Sections L, M, N, O, P, and the construction of a press box on the south side. He stated that the extension would increase the seating capacity by approximately 4,000 seats.

Bids were received on March 21, opened, read in public, tabulated, and presented to members of the Committee. Proposals were submitted by the following contractors:

It was explained that Item 2 provides for the completion of approximately 200 box seats on both sides of the Stadium.

The bids were discussed, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, it was recommended to the Board of Trustees of the University, which meets on April 5, 1949, to extend McLean Stadium, if funds can be provided.

F. State Requisitions, Emergency Purchases, etc., Approved.

President Donovan submitted the following letter from the Comptroller listing State requisitions, advices of emergency purchase, special purchase orders, food contracts and departmental purchase orders, which have been made by the Comptroller's Office since October 1, 1948. He read the following letter:

## H. Public Employees Honesty Blanket Bond.

President Donovan stated that the University at the present time carries a primary commercial blanket bond, in amount of \$10,000 for each loss, on all employees of the University. He stated that this is an honesty bond covering cash and property for about 1700 employees. The premium is \$515.54 annually.

He also stated that the University had received from the Director of the Division of Insurance, Frankfort, Ky., the Public Employees Honesty Blanket Bond written on all employees in the Department of Education and divisions thereof, as follows:

Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky
Board of Regents of Eastern Kentucky State College
Board of Regents of Western Kentucky State College
Board of Regents of Morehead State College
Board of Regents of Murray State College
Board of Commissioners of Kentucky School for the Deaf, and
State Textbook Commission,

in the amount of \$100,000 each loss.

He stated that the Director of the Division of Insurance had notified the school that the proportionate cost of the blanket bond for the University of Kentucky would amount to \$1189.75. He stated that the University had not requested the additional insurance but that, upon the expiration of the primary commercial blanket bond which is carried by the University on employees in the amount of \$10,000 per loss, the current bond was substituted. He submitted the question for consideration by the Committee. After general discussion, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Comptroller was authorized to investigate and determine the proportionate cost and to transfer such premium as may be determined.

### I. Insurance on Trucks.

The Comptroller reported that it had been the practice to take fire and tornado insurance on a part of University owned trucks. However, recently the Division of Finance has notified the University that fire and tornado insurance on trucks must be carried with the State Fire and Tornado Insurance Fund, and that if the University could not secure theft insurance separately, that it would be necessary to carry fire and tornado insurance with the State Fire and Tornado Insurance Fund, and fire and theft insurance with a commercial concern. This would amount to double insurance for fire on trucks.

After a general discussion, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Comptroller was directed to drop theft insurance on University owned trucks unless theft insurance could be secured with liability coverage policy.

# J. Proposal to Establish a Hanufacturing Pharmacy Laboratory in General Hospital, Louisville, Ky.

President Donovan stated that the General Hospital, Louisville, had proposed to the College of Pharmacy of the University of Kentucky, located in Louisville, Ky., to furnish a room behind the pharmacy in the main building. This room is approximately 12 x 20 feet with a 12-foot ceiling. All utilities are to be furnished by the Hospital, including heat, light, power, telephone, hot and cold water, steam, and sewage disposal. He stated that the College of Pharmacy of the University of Kentucky will move in the machinery and equipment for a manufacturing pharmacy laboratory, such equipment to remain the property of the University. The College of Pharmacy of the University of Kentucky is to maintain and service this equipment.

He stated that the primary object of this manufacturing pharmacy laboratory is for the training of students in large-scale production of pharmaceuticals. It is proposed, where applicable, that the College of Pharmacy will manufacture pharmaceuticals for the General Hospital dispensary. The General Hospital is to furnish all drugs, chemicals and materials used in the manufacture of pharmaceuticals for the General Hospital. The supervision and control of the students working in the laboratory are to remain under the College of Pharmacy, and the pharmacists of the General Hospital are to maintain the necessary records and advise with the head of the Pharmacy Department of the College of Pharmacy concerning the instruction of the students of the College of Pharmacy.

The College of Pharmacy will not use the materials of the General Hospital to make pharmaceuticals for instruction only, but will manufacture only those preparations which are required by the General Hospital and which illustrate production methods deemed important to the standard training program of the College of Pharmacy.

It was further proposed that the laboratory would be in operation during the academic year only and that the agreement might be terminated by either party on two-months notice.

President Donovan stated that he had talked over the proposal with Dean Earl P. Slone, of the College of Pharmacy, and wished to recommend that the laboratory be established. The Committee was further advised that such arrangement was thought to be of mutual interest to the General Hospital and the College of Pharmacy, and, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation of the President was concurred in.

## K. Light Horse Husbandry Horse Rental Contract Approved.

President Donovan stated that he had received from Dean Cooper contracts for rental of horses belonging to Mrs. Billy Jackson Bower, Mrs. H. V. Rouse, Jr., Mr. Eugene Scott, and Miss Elise Hartman, to be used in Light Horse Husbandry courses during the second semester of the current year. He read the rental contracts as follows:

### Horse Rental Contract

Be it known that the University of Kentucky desires to obtain by lease the use of such a number of horses as may be required for class purposes in the course in Light Horse Husbandry the period of February 14 through May 30, 1949 (16 weeks). The University proposes to take charge of such horses as may be leased to it during that period or such part of it as the use of them may be required. It will stable them, feed and care for them adequately and have full control over them during the period of the lease.

In consideration of the above stated terms and conditions the University of Kentucky, first party, agrees to lease one horse, 3 saddles, 3 bridles, 1 set of light harness, from the second party, Mrs. Alex Bower, Preston Arms Apts., Lexington, Ky., at the rate of compensation of \$6.00 per week. The first party assumes responsibility for any accident growing out of any negligence in respect to the care or use of the horses used. It does not assume liability, however, for any harm due to the inherent and not apparent condition of the animals nor for injury due to acts of God or the disposition of the animals. The second party agrees to lease to the first party 3 saddles, 3 bridles, 1 set of light harness, one horse on the above terms.

## L. Contract with Hillside Riding Club.

President Donovan stated that the Department of Physical Education had submitted agreement between the University and Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Reynolds, of the Hillside Riding Club, R.F.D. 5, Lexington, Ky. He read the following contract:

### CONTRACT

This agreement made and entered into by and between Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Reynolds, Hillside Riding Club, R.F.D. #5, Lexington, Kentucky, and the University of Kentucky:

TO WIT: Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Reynolds agree to furnish horses to be used in Course Physical Education 15 (horseback riding) during the second semester of the school year 1948-49 (February 1 to June 7, 1949).

The rental fee of one dollar (\$1.00) per hour per horse shall be paid for each student using a horse in connection with the above course. It is further agreed that the Hillside Riding Club will furnish a horse free to the instructor of the course.

Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Reynolds agree to release the University of Kentucky of all responsibility for any accident or damage to themselves, their horses or their equipment which may occur while this agreement is in force, but Mr. and Mrs. Reynolds do not agree to assume any responsibility for accidents occurring to students enrolled in the ownerse or to instructors engaged therein.

It is further agreed that this contract will be null and void in the event insufficient students enroll for the course. This decision shall be left to the sole discretion of the Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, Dr. M. M. White, and Dr. Don Cash Seaton, Head of the Department of Physical Education.

The rental fee per hour per horse will be due and payable at the end of the period herein covered.

President Donovan recommended that the contract be approved and executed, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the contract was approved and authorized executed.

## M. Change-of-Work Policy of the University.

President Donovan stated that some modifications had been made in the Change-of-Work policy as provided in Resolution of the Board of Trustees December 11, 1928, and suggested that the policy be restated in conformance with current administration.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the policy was re-stated as follows:

Whenever any teacher or administrative officer shall have reached the age of seventy years, or at or after attaining the age of sixty-five years, as provided in the resolution of the Board of Trustees of December 11, 1928, he shall no longer perform the duties that he has theretofore performed, but he shall perform such duties as may be designated by the President of the University. For the performing of such other duties he shall receive a sum equal to twenty per cent of the salary received by him at the age of sixty-five plus one per cent of the salary for each year of service in the University. The salary so modified shall be paid as salaries of the faculty of the University are paid.

# N. Increase in Fees for Graduate Students.

President Donovan submitted a letter from the Comptroller concerning increase in fees of graduate students who receive master's degrees. He read the following letter:

February 16, 1949

Dr. H. L. Donovan, President University of Kentucky

Dear Dr. Donovan:

On July 8, 1948, I wrote the following to you:

"For some time past, there has been a charge of fifteen dollars to graduate students who are ready to receive their Masters' degrees. Of the fifteen dollars, three is paid for rental of cap and gown, and twelve dollars is used to pay for the hood which becomes the property of the recipient of the degree. The price of the hood, to the University, has been increased from twelve dollars each to fourteen, so that the University is losing two dollars on each hood.

"I recommend that the fifteen dollar fee be raised to seventeen, to cover the increased cost of the hood, effective the Fall 1948 semester."

I recall that we discussed this question. We also discussed it at one of the Deans' meetings, but in looking through the minutes to substantiate our Veterans: Administration contract, I can not find that the increase was ever submitted to the Board of Trustees for approval.

If you still agree, I believe my letter of July 8, 1948, should be submitted to the Board at its March meeting for ratification retroactive to the Fall 1948 semester.

The Committee spoke with gratification of this annual award by Mr. Weil, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, ordered that the gift be accepted and requested President Donovan to convey their thanks to the donor.

## P. Scholarships and Awards.

Yeager, Ford and Warren.

President Donovan reported receipt of \$50.00 which is the annual award to an outstanding accounting student in the College of Commerce, sponsored by the accounting firm of Yeager, Ford and Warren of Louisville, Ky.

### Time Finance.

President Donovan reported receipt of \$200.00 from the Time Finance Company, representing two awards to students in the College of Commerce, the recipients to be selected by a committee composed of faculty members appointed by the University and one representative of Time Finance.

### Cincinnati Gas and Electric Company.

President Donovan reported receipt of check for \$300.00 for fee scholarship to a freshman entering the University as a graduate from a high school located in the area served by the Union Light, Heat and Power Company in Kenton and Campbell Counties, the recipient to be selected by the University of Kentucky scholarship committee.

President Donovan recommended that the award of \$50.00 of Yeager, Ford and Warren; the \$200.00 from Time Finance Company; and the \$300.00 scholarship award from the Cincinnati Gas and Electric Company be received under the conditions stipulated.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation of the President was concurred in and he was requested to write letters of appreciation to the donors.

# Q. Scholarships to Foreign Students.

President Donovan stated that the Committee on Foreign Students had recommended that free fee scholarships be granted to Mr. J. J. Balzola, Mr. Si-lin Pan and Miss Mercedes Trujillo for the second semester of the academic year 1948-1949. President Donovan recommended that the request be granted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation of the President was concurred in.

# R. Mr. E. B. Farris to Do Off-Campus Work.

President Donovan submitted request from Mr. E. B. Farris to make a survey for insurance purposes of the property of the Frankfort city schools. He read letters from Mr. Farris and Mr. Frank D. Peterson recommending approval of the request.

# S. Resolution on Death of Mr. L. H. McCain.

President Donovan stated that he regretted to inform the Committee of the death of L. H. McCain, who for thirty years was connected with the Business Office of the University.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the following Resolution was ordered spread upon the minutes and a copy sent to the bereaved family.

#### IN MEMORY

Linn Hemingway McCain was born in Bedford, Kentucky, October 5, 1877, the son of Joseph and Katherine Bartlett McCain. He was educated in Trimble County public schools and attended the University of Kentucky. After leaving the University of Kentucky, Mr. McCain practiced Law with his father and later went to Louisville, Kentucky, where he was associated with the Seelbach Hotel and the Bell Telephone Company.

On September 15, 1918, he became associated with the University of Kentucky as Accountant in the Business Office. He was appointed Assistant Comptroller in 1945, which title he held until his death. He discharged his duties with a mixture of good taste, good humor and good accounting which endeared him to all who met him. "Mac" gave of himself freely and graciously to his friends and associates. He will be affectionately remembered at the University as a friend and good companion.

Linn H. McCain died at the Good Samaritan Hospital on February 13, 1949, after an illness of two weeks.

BE IT RESOLVED, that in the passing of Linn Hemingway McCain, the University of Kentucky has sustained the loss of an able, loyal and valuable member of its staff.

AND BE IT RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to Mrs. McCain as an expression of the high regard in which Mr. McCain was held by members of the staff and faculty of the University, and as an expression to her of their sympathy with her loss.

### T. Sale of Piano.

The Comptroller reported that the Department of German Language and Literature has a piano which is no longer needed by the Department and that Dr. A. E. Bigge, head of the Department, recommends that the piano be sold for \$50.00. Mr. Ed Gabbard, of the Comptroller's Office, and Dr. Edward E. Stein, head of the Department of Music, have inspected the piano and recommend that the \$50.00 be accepted. The Comptroller requested that permission be given to dispose of the piano.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the sale of the plano belonging to the Department of German Language and Literature was approved.

U. Control of Smoking in Certain Buildings on the Campus.

President Donovan read a letter from faculty members officed in one of the buildings on the campus. The letter follows:

March 5, 1949

President H. L. Donovan University of Kentucky

Dear President Donovan:

We have an everlasting problem of fire hazard in Frazee Hall. We have over the years conducted campaigns against students smoking in this building. You can appreciate that asking students not to smoke in a building is a problem that really arises with the meeting of every class. The Student Government Association undertook to curb this threat to human life and welfare by fining offenders \$5 for the first offense. A few cases were handled in this way, but this puts the instructors in the awkward situation of having to appear as a witness against the students. In our opinion it has not been an effective curb of this menace.

Within the last ten days the Lexington fire inspectors have gone over Frazee Hall and they have repeated what we have been told before--that this building carries entirely too large a load of students for the safety precautions which are now in use. The halls are jammed during the changing of classes and the building itself is highly in-Our first concern is with the protection of human life, but we likewise have large personal stakes in the records and books which we have to keep in the offices for the effective functioning of the various departments. We do not wish to have a repetition in Frazee Hall of Norwood Hall, Guignol Theater and the Buildings and Grounds building, nor do we wish to have the tragedy which occurred at Kenyon College. We have agreed among ourselves to conduct a campaign each semester before our classes, appealing to students to observe the rules necessary to the protection of their lives. Then we would like to have the authority to bar from class for one semester any student who persists in violating the elementary rules of safety by smoking in the building.

President Donovan stated that there are many buildings on the campus which are not fire-resistant. Smoking in any of these buildings presents a hazard to the lives of the students frequenting the building, as well as to the property. It was stated that whatever policy was adopted should apply to a group of buildings. President Donovan recommended that smoking be prohibited in all buildings designated by installing signs in each building reading "Smoking Prohibited in This Building by Order of the Board of Trustees."

After some further discussion, a motion was made, seconded and carried adopting the following resolution:

WHEREAS smoking in the buildings of the University of Kentucky is contrary to law and to regulations previously adopted by this Board; and

WHEREAS it is imperative that every possible protection against the hazard of fire be given both life and property on the Campus: THEREFORE BE IT

RESOLVED, That the Board of Trustees lend full support to any reasonable effort on the part of the faculty and staff to reduce the hazard from smoking; and be it

RESOLVED further, That the faculty and staff assigned to a particular building may prohibit a student from attending any class in that building for a maximum period of one semester, when the student is adjudged to have violated, in the building in question, the regulations of the University governing smoking.

# V. Fraternity and Sorority Housing.

The members of the Executive Committee discussed the desirability of the University's assisting sororities and fraternities in acquiring suitable housing. It was recalled that a committee was appointed to investigate and formulate a program. The committee has been at work for some time, but due to the war and economic conditions, the report has been delayed. Some discussion was presented relative to the University's assisting in the issuance of revenue bonds, which indebtedness would be paid during a long period. Others suggested that the sororities and fraternities should furnish land or cash equal to some percentage of the cost of construction as a consideration for receiving long term leases. It was also mentioned that the location of the houses or lots, as well as the house plans adopted, should meet the approval of the University authorities.

After some further discussion, a motion was made, seconded and carried requesting the Committee on Fraternity and Sorority Housing to complete its work as soon as possible.

### W. Luncheon.

At 12:45 p.m. the Committee recessed for luncheon, which was served in the President's Office, and at 1:35 p.m. returned to the business on the agenda.

## X. Claim of Dr. Waldo R. Williams.

President Donovan read a letter from the Comptroller concerning claim by Dr. Waldo R. Williams, Louisville, Ky., for services rendered Mason White, an employee of the College of Pharmacy.

February 7, 1949

Dr. H. L. Donovan, President University of Kentucky

My dear President Donovan:

I submit statement of Dr. Waldo R. Williams, Louisville, Kentucky, in the amount of \$34.00 for treatment of abrasions and lacerations of the scalp suffered by Mason White, a colored employee of the College of Pharmacy.

On September 2, 1948, while standing on a scaffold, painting the ladies lounge, Mason White lost his footing and fell approximately ten feet to the floor, damaging his left wrist. He was immediately sent to the Louisville General Hospital for medical examination and treatment and was advised to secure the services of a private physician. On the next day, September 3rd, the employee was sent to a colored physician, Dr. Waldo R. Williams, for treatment. Neither Dean Slone nor Mr. Fleming were in Louisville on the day of the accident, but they have the assurance of Mr. Clifton Nelson, Building Superintendent that the accident occurred while the employee was working as described, and that the employee was not under the influence of alcohol.

Dr. Williams originally submitted a bill in the amount of \$63.00 for treatment of the lacerations, four office visits and re-X-ray of the wrist. Mr. John Fleming, Bursar of the College of Pharmacy, questioned the amount of the bill and was advised by Dr. Williams that the employee had also been treated for allergic dermatitis. Mr. Fleming forwarded the statement for \$63.00 with Dr. Williams' letter to this office. I wrote Mr. Fleming as follows:

"Mr. White was not referred to Dr. Williams for treatment of allergic dermatitis, and Dr. Williams should look to Mr. White for payment in connection therewith. Mr. White was referred to Dr. Williams for medical attention to a fracture of the left wrist. Since a cast had been applied at the general hospital, I think it was proper for Dr. Williams to take an X-ray to check the fracture and the condition of the wrist after the cast had been applied."

I recommend that Dr. Williams! bill in the amount of \$34.00 be approved for payment as follows, with the understanding that the University does not admit negligence or liability:

September 3, 1948
Wrist X-rayed, treatment of wrist and lacerations of scalp and suture placed in cut over eye \$20.00
Two office visits at \$7.00 each 14.00

Dr. Williams corrected statement is attached hereto.

After some discussion, the Committee declined to approve the bill of Dr. Waldo R. Williams.

### Y. Injury to Joseph Wathen.

The Comptroller reported an injury to Joseph Wathen, who fell off of a ladder when the ladder slipped. The stepladder was leaning against a wall, with no one holding it. Ir. Wathen fell to the floor, tearing a tissue loose from a shin bone. He reported to Doctor McChord at the Infirmary for first aid, and the patient was sent home.

Mr. Wathen requests pay for 77 hours' absence from work, due to injury on the job, without deduction of time lost from sick leave.

After some discussion, on motion duly made, seconded and carried, it was directed that the time lost be taken from sick leave, if available, and, if not available, that request he re-submitted.

# Z. Injury to Dan Welch.

President Donovan read the following letter from the Comptroller:

March 21, 1949

Dr. H. L. Donovan, President University of Kentucky

My dear President Donovan:

It may be recalled that Dan Welch was injured on the job, and that various reports have been made concerning his recovery.

Mr. Welch had accumulated sick leave of fifty-nine days. He has used forty-nine days during the period from February 19, 1944 to January 1, 1949. He had ten days left to apply on his sick leave accrual, but has used nineteen days, a deficit of nine days, if the interpretation is that sick leave is to be used for on-job accidents.

We believe that Mr. Welch should be carried on the payroll for the nine days over and beyond the sick leave he had accumulated, but to do so, we feel that Board action is necessary. Will you please give this recommendation your consideration and request action of the Executive Committee?

Possibly, I should add that in industry, compensation cases do not affect the sick leave allowed. In some cases, sick leave insurance policies are carried in addition to the compensation policies. I mention this because it represents the thought and belief of our service personnel.

# A-1. Injury to D. L. Ray.

President Donovan reported an injury to Mr. David Ray and read a letter from Mr. Peterson, Comptroller.

March 21, 1949

Dr. H. L. Donovan, President University of Kentucky

My dear President Donovan:

I submit hereto attached a report from Dean Cooper concerning an on-job accident to David Ray. Mr. Ray has been a regularly employed workman on the farm since July 5, 1947. While in the pursuit of his duties, he was struck on the head by a bale of hay pushed without warning from the loft of the dairy barn to the walkway below by Mr. Bastin, the dairyman. Mr. Ray was knocked unconscious, revived and thought he was not hurt. He declined medical attention at the time. The next morning, he awoke in considerable discomfort and went to his family doctor, Dr. Lawrence Hurt, 204 Security Trust Building, Lexington. It was then determined that he had sustained an injury to the back of his head and neck and to his right shoulder. An X-ray was made by St. Joseph's Hospital.

Dr. Hurt states that no sign of recent injury to the spine or right shoulder was in evidence, that there are moderate arthritic changes in the bones of the spine, and that in his judgment, Mr. Ray suffered considerable damage to the supportive structures of the spine plus trauma to an old arthritic condition, which accounts for his prolonged convalescence.

Dr. Cooper submits a request to pay the hospital bill, \$27.50, plus loss of time \$170.50, plus additional medical attention since February 12th, the amount of which is not known. I recommend that the obligations be paid without admitting negligence or establishing a policy on the part of the University.

### A-2. Repair of Farm Roads

President Donovan read a letter from the Comptroller.

March 21, 1949

Dr. H. L. Donovan, President University of Kentucky

My dear President Donovan:

Dean Cooper has submitted a requisition for furnishing material, labor and equipment for construction of roads serving the Experiment Station Farm, in accordance with plans and specifications. The amount involved is \$85,600.00. Dean Cooper recommends that \$65,600.00 be taken from account 2005-B (Fertilizer) and \$18,000.00 from 2005-D (Farm Fund).

So far as I know, no provision has been made through an authorization of the Board for this large expenditure of funds. May I have direction?

After some discussion, a motion was made, seconded and carried that the matter be deferred, and that Mr. Tom Cutler, member of the Board, be requested to make a survey of the farm roads and report to the Board.

### A-3. Budget Increases for Telephone Installation.

President Donovan stated that the work for installing new telephone system on the campus has progressed slowly, and that a part of the work has been done. He stated that it would take approximately \$3,500.00 to complete campus work now under contract by the Lexington Telephone Company prior to the cut-over. This does not include funds for the connection of the Fine Arts Building, the Colosseum, or the Stadium.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, \$3,500 was appropriated from unappropriated surplus of the University General Fund, and the Comptroller was directed to make the necessary transfer.

# A-4. Audit of Property Held in Custody of the Military Property Custodian.

President Donovan reported receipt of an audit made by the Army Department on the Military Property Custodian. He stated that the audit reports that all military property is accounted for and that the accounts are in order, and recommended that record be made in the minutes.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the audit report on the Military Property Custodian was received and ordered filed.

## A-5. Proceedings Contract.

President Donovan stated that, pursuant to authorization of the Executive Committee, the Comptroller had advertised and received proposals for proceedings contract necessary in connection with the issuance of revenue bonds for completing the Service Building.

The Comptroller reported receipt of two proposals from firms as follows:

No. 1 The W. C. Thornburgh Company )
Charles A. Hinsch and Company )
Walter, Woody & Heimerdinger )
Pohl & Company )

The proposal of the Cincinnati Syndicate was to guarantee a bid of 102 for 34% coupon, less a 2% proceedings fee, which fee is to be payable to the Syndicate whether or not they are the highest bidder the day of the sale, bonds optional from five to ten years at 103, from ten to fifteen years at 102, and thereafter at 101.

The Cincinnati Syndicate made an alternate bid to guarantee 100 for a 3% coupon, less a 1.95 allowance for proceedings, such bonds to be optional from five to ten years at 102, from ten to fifteen years at 101, and thereafter at 100.

It was explained that the first proposal was equivalent to par for 32% coupons, and that the alternate bid was equivalent to purchase price of 99 for 3% bonds, or a discount of \$10.00 per \$1,000 bond.

The Louisville and Lexington Syndicate submitted three proposals:

(1) To pay \$1,017.50 and accrued interest for each \$1,000.00 bond, these bonds to bear interest at not exceeding the following rates:

For bonds maturing April 1, 1951, to April 1, 1956, inclusive, 2-3/4%.

For bonds maturing April 1, 1957, to April 1, 1964, inclusive, 3%.

For bonds maturing April 1, 1965, to April 1, 1969, inclusive, 3\pm\( 3\pm\).

This proposal is the equivalent of bid of 101-3/4 of the face amount of bonds bearing interest as enumerated above. This proposal gives an average interest rate of approximately 3.09%. The fiscal agents are to be paid for their services, expenses and risk a sum equal to 1.75% of the face amount of all bonds actually sold.

(2) The Louisville and Lexington Syndicate proposes to bid \$1007.50 and accrued interest per \$1,000.00 bond, the bonds to bear interest at not exceeding the following rates:

For bonds maturing April 1, 1951, to April 1, 1962, inclusive, 2-3/4%.

For bonds maturing April 1, 1963, to April 1, 1965, inclusive, 3%.

For bonds maturing April 1, 1966, to April 1, 1969, inclusive, 32%.

The fiscal agent proposes for compensation a sum equal to 1.75% of the face amount of the bonds. This proposal is equal to par plus .75 per 100 less 1.75%, fiscal agents fee, which is equivalent to a purchase price of 99.

(3) The Louisville and Lexington Syndicate proposes that if they are relieved from making a guaranteed bid, they will serve as fiscal agent and the compensation will be limited to 1% of the face amount of all bonds sold and delivered.

After considerable discussion, and on motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Committee accepted proposal No. 1 as submitted by the Louisville-Lexington Syndicate and set forth herein.
