### Dr. Finer Will Be Speaker At General Convocation

First Assembly Of Semester To Be Held Third Hour In Memorial Hall

Political Science Authority Will Address Students On Democracy

Dr. Herman Finer, world-famous political scientist, will deliver the first convocation address of the current semester at 10 a. m. Monday, February 14, in Memorial Hall. "The Hope of Democracy" will be his subject.

Third hour classes will be dismissed in order that all students who wish to attend may do so.

Informal talks will be given to classes in political science throughout the day by the lecturer.

The international relations class, a student organization composed solely of women from AWS, will hear Doctor Finer at a dinner meeting at 6:30 o'clock Monday night in the University Commons, where he will speak on "The Italian Dictatorship."

The speaker, who has been connected with the London school of economics and political science at the University of London, is at present the head of the department of public administration and chairman of the board of administration and examiners for the university diploma in public administration.

He is one of the foremost authorities on economic and political life in government, and has been consulted by delegations from the government of the United States, the East, and the United States on their constitutional and administrative problems.

Doctor Finer is also a correspondent for "The New York Times," "The Statesman," "The Spectator," of London, England, and the author of books dealing with international affairs.
