Lexington's MCC Installs Pastor



The Mankind Project is an international, non-profit organization dedicated to the healing and empowerment of men, men of all stripes, races, beliefs, and sexual orientations. The Project has centers throughout the US along with a few cities in Canada, as well as London, England and now growing throughout Europe and in South Africa. The nearest Mankind Project center to Lexington is in Louisville.

A key feature of the work of the ManKind Project is a powerful weekend experience- The New Warrior Training Adventure Weekend. It's a dynamic, intense men's training in which participants take a hard look at what's working in their lives and what isn't. Many men claim it to be the most powerful experience of their lives. It's not easy, the Friday night through Sunday afternoon is full of risk, challenge, breaking through fear, and incredible reward. The weekend is a journey from head to heart and becomes a rite of passage into a worldwide community of men who value integrity, accountability, and boldly living with purpose in the world. There is ongoing work and support after the Weekend.

The evening on August 9 will be a chance for gay men to have a dialogue with gay and straight men from the ManKind Project, to come together and speak with depth and honesty about our lives as men in this world. More detail about The

Councilman George Brown joined us for dinner and gave an after dinner speech, cancelling another engagement in order to do so. He is an inspiring speaker and we appreciate his willingness to participate. We also thank Another Note and The Lexington Men's Chorus for their musical entertainment.

It is an important aspect of any community to acknowledge the work of individuals and groups that give of their time, talent, and energy to pursue a healthier, happier, more just and more free future for its members. People do not do this work to receive praise, but to hear that your work is seen as valuable and that you are appreciated gladdens the heart and lightens the spirit. It also inspires pride in our community and empowers us to move forward.

The Winner of the Wasson Award for the person who has contributed the most to our LBGT Community in the past year or years is Jennifer Crossen. Jennifer has worked with cheerful determination for Fairness, organizing the phone tree, planning fund raisers, orchestrating our parade efforts, testifying in Frankfort, and working to pass the Lexington Fairness Ordinance. Not to mention the extra work she takes on in order that we may gather at her farm for picnics and frivolity. For all these reasons Jennifer also won the Fairness Volunteer of the Year Award. She is a true gem. Thanks Jennifer.

The Rainbow Community Service Award was gratefully given to Fairness, Bluegrass Chapter. The tremendous amount of work done by members of this organization over the last seven years has raised our state's consciousness about civil rights for LBGT people, has given us candidate information for voting decisions, has helped keep anti-gay legislation from passing in Frankfort, and has given Lexington a Fairness Ordinance passed on July 8 last year. Many people have been a part of this work and our community is stronger and our state more just as a result of those efforts.

GLSO's Volunteer of the Year is Ginger Moore. Ginger has been active in our community for only a little more than a year and in that time she has started new programs (Social Concepts and Mentoring), become the GLSO Secretary, given new life to the Pink Pages, served

on the Pride Committee, worked on the Gill Grant, and in general pushed us out of some comfortable ruts with her new ideas and boundless energy. Thank you Ginger.

Movable Feast awarded two Volunteer of the Year Awards. With over 300 volunteers, you can understand that it can be a difficult choice for them! Our House

Well, Kat and I dug up the can of pennies from the backyard and added a handful of quarters to it and bought us a house. We have been in the place a couple of weeks and all of the boxes are unpacked and everything has been put away. With luck, we will soon find an extremely long ladder to reach the vents and lights in the cathedral ceiling. Climbing ladders (short or tall) is not my specialty. The high ceiling was one of those things that we didn't think through before we got all dewyeyed and fell in love with the house.

Another detail we overlooked was the clothes dryer cord, which had to be replaced because the plug had three prongs and the wall outlet required a four-prong plug. We called Sears and the woman on the other end said it would be a simple thing to replace the cord. She sounded so confident in our abilities, that we actually tried to change the cord ourselves.

About midway through the process my hand slipped and all the screws went flying through the air and some four-letter words landed down behind the washer along with the screws. The washer weighs a ton; we had already moved it once when one of the screws rolled behind it.

Well, the day wasn't getting any younger and my daughter said the flying screws was her cue to go home. And she told me to don't even think about asking her to help move that big butt washer again, because she was a little woman and I knew that sweating and straining were never her strong points. Plus, she

had to get ready for a date and couldn't risk chipping another nail.

I looked at Kat and she said that she wouldn't be moving the washer and dryer again either, because it was late and we didn't know where to attach the extra green wires anyway. And tomorrow she was going to call Sears and have them send someone to finish the job. I couldn't believe that they were giving up, we could do it!

My daughter left. Kat went to bed. I cussed and fumed for two more hours until my head starting hurting and my Meniere's Disease knocked the world off kilter and I had to go to bed too. Two days later the Sears man was real nice about putting the cord on our dryer, and reattaching the wires in the right place, and replacing the screws.

Ok, so what if he did it the right way, we would have gotten to that point eventually. Isn't that what being a new homeowner is all about? I don't give up that easily. Our next simple project was fixing the leak at the kitchen faucet. We did the right things, we bought a book, and we asked the Lowe's sales guy about the parts, then we took our \$1.50 purchase home and took the faucet apart. The parts to our faucet didn't look anything like the book diagram or the diagram on the package. But being the adventuresome women that we are, we replaced the parts anyway. I turned on the water and Kat watched the water spray across the kitchen.

We went back to Lowe's and tried to talk to a sales guy who looked at my breast and didn't seem to hear a word. There was no time for tomfoolery; we had a faucet to fix, so we found another sales guy who could look us in the eyes and we told him about our dilemma. We bought another \$1.50 worth of parts, then we went home and put them on our faucet. I turned on the water and Kat watched it gush toward the ceiling. We had advanced from a side spray to an upward gush; we were really making progress.

Another trip to Lowe's, another sales guy, and the wrong parts. To make matters worse, we put the faucet back together wrong. The water only leaked, just like it was doing before we tried to fix it. At this point I did not want to go back to Lowe's; I could live with the leak. I wasn't giving up; I was only giving myself time to think of a way for us to do without the entire kitchen sink. Kat said that she would take care of the faucet tomorrow and I shouldn't let it get me down.

Overnight the leak turned into a stream. The next morning I marched into Lowe's, bypassed all the sales guys, and bought the entire kit for Delta faucet repairs. That evening Kat put the parts on the faucet while I sat across the room and watched. The faucet works just fine now.

Our next project is the gutters. Kat has suggested that I be the consultant on this job too. Given our last two experiences, I think that means that she loves me best when I am not helping to fix things that I know nothing about.

Rev. Mel Bailey ... continued from page 1 where she spent 18 years as a teacher.

When Rev. Mel received her calling to pastor, she pursued training though Samaritan College, affiliated with the Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Church. She spent her early years in training in one of the largest churches in the MCC denomination, King of Peace, in St. Petersburg, FL. (membership 450ish-wow). She met her partner, Bonnie, while she was there. They had a holy union and have been living in a committed relationship for about 7 years now.

They answered a calling to minister in Savannah, Georgia, where they spent four years. While in Georgia, Rev. Mel served as a case manager in a non-profit for persons living with AIDS. Mel was appointed to the Mayor's Human Relations Commission and served on the board of directors for the Savannah AIDS Network. Congressman Jack Kingston appointed her to his Race Relations Committee. We hope the greater Lexington Community also finds ways to use her talents and her dedication to social justice.

In 1998, Rev. Mel was diagnosed with breast cancer and underwent a full mastectomy, chemotherapy, and radiation. "I simply learned to see the blessings that surrounded me at every turn. Breast cancer has been an opportunity for me to "FROG, or Fully Rely on God." Bonnie supported me every step of the way. We often forget about the

spouses in those trying times."

Rev. Bailey accepted spiritual leadership of the Lexington Metropolitan Community Church as a result of their ministerial search. Bonnie and Mel moved here in March. Rev. Mel has become active within our community, participating in the work of Kentucky Fairness, attending public functions supporting gays, lesbians, bisexuals, and the transcommunity. She says "Bonnie and I have had a loving and supportive welcome here in the Bluegrass State. We can't wait to get to know everyone as we provide ministry for many who are seeking a spiritual journey, hungry to hear about God's unconditional and eternal love."

"Never doubt that we will create this world, because, my friends, we are fortunate to live in a democracy, and in a democracy, we decide what's possible."

"So, what do we do when one of us loves a house and the other one doesn't?" she asked, in a rather not so nice tone, in my opinion.

And I became afraid. Here was yet another area of my life when I was hearing and feeling those same old words I've heard so many times: "I'm afraid I'll have to ____ whether I like it or not." Like:

- take a job I don't like to make more money;
- live in a house I don't like so my partner will be happy;
- · have sex; or
- buy something I don't like as much as something else because it's cheaper.

I realized that we had not been thorough enough when we wrote down our expenses. I believed that I needed more information before I could agree to make a leap in "rent".

Tam didn't. Big surprise! We'd already done this twice, we had it on paper, she didn't know where that extra money was going, but she was ready to proceed. "And, another thing," she added, I needed to quit saying "nope" the minute we pulled up into a driveway. It was driving her crazy!


wanted this house so much and so soon, that I've wanted you to just stop looking at the money part even though, I agree with you, we need to know more before we can really make a decision."
