

Tensions mounting again in Lebanon; U.S. may find itself involved

BEIRUT, Lebanon — Americans should not forget the frustrating hours they spent awhile back, waiting in long lines for gasoline. Such nightmares may recur if events here remain out of hand. Most college professors would probably flunk a quiz on the intriguing, complex and seemingly endless conflict in Lebanon. But every American should understand at least one important fact: This is the scene where the next Arab-Israeli war could start—the kind of war that could easily bring the United States to the side of its ally. Israel.

In the past week, the Phalangists, a major faction of Lebanon's Christian community (Israeli-backed), has been fending off an intense ground and air attack by the so-called "peace-keeping" army from neighboring Syria (Soviet-backed). The once-serene Beirut, former gem of the Mediterranean, has become a 24-hour-a-day hell. While Syrian and Christian militias have been blowing up buildings with rocket exchanges, civilians have been huddling in their basements without adequate food, water or plumbing.

Only during short lulls in the battle do war-weary men and women dare scramble out to buy rice and bread. Many of the wealth have recently fled from the country.

But Beirut, whose Moslem and Christian districts have been feuding for years, sin't the only battleground. Twenty miles to the east, the Christian city of Zahle (pop. 200,000) has been encircled by the Syrian army. The shelling of the town began after the Christian Phalangists refused to halt construction of a road connecting Zahle with heavily-Christian western Lebanon.

But they should a highway right-of-way squabble erupt into an international incident, which has already left more than 200 dead and over 700 wounded?

The U.S. and European press, which has sympathetically reported the struggle of the beseiged Christians here, has speculated that the Soviet-backed Syrians started the fight to divert world attention from

the crisis in Poland.
There has also been talk among embunkered dilplomats here that the Syrians timed their brutal attack with Secretary of State Alexander Haig's visit to the Middle East Syria may have been warning the U.S. that it can't be excluded from future Middle East peace negotiations.
According to our Beirut-based reporter, Terry Wrong, however, the Syrians' recent attacks were promped by fears of a late-spring Israeli-Christian offensive against the Palestinian Liberation Organization (PJ.O) strongholds in Lebanon.
It's no secret that, despite its stan-

(PLO) strongholds in Lebanon.
It's no secret that, despite its standing in the Arab world, the PLO is in troubled waters.
The Palestinians have never been popular with the dominant Christians in Lebanon. More recently, the PLO has brought suffering and death to Shi'tie Moslems, Lebanon's largest minority, which has harbored them in villages near the Israeli border. The

political arm, Amal, has clashed frequently with the PLO in the last few months.

With the PLO under fire here and its Arab allies busy on other fronts, Israel and its Christian friends are in a relatively safe position to conquer PLO guerilla strongholds as far north as Beirut and kick the Syrians out of Lebanon.

Had the Israelis outguessed the Syrians, Prime Minister Menachem Begin's ruling Likud Party would have pulled off an ingenious election-eve surprise.

use its ports and profit fom its legal and illegal markets.

If the Syrians feared a potential Israeli offensive, their "preemptive" strikes in Zahle and Beirut have succeeded. But, in many ways, the Syrian offensive has backfired-because it should ensure Israeli countermeasures.

There's no way for an American to understand the passionate intensity of the fighting in Lebanon. But we ought to try.

The crucible of conflict here is heating up again, and could erupt into a full-cale war involving every Middle East nation. And that would disrupt the life of every American.

Pirst, I would seek professonal help if I really thought had a health problem requiring stimulants or sleepnids. Physicians and/or pharmacists could help a pernew this such a judgement.

Second, I have a profound respect for the pharnacologic action of drugs and the consequences of unnecessary use, misuse or abuse. Most users have very

Third, rarely do legitimate users need drug products in containers of 1,000. The suggestion I receive through the ad is that these capsules and tablets could be "ped-ded," which I regard as an unsafe and unsavory ap-proach to distribution of medicines. People should regard their bodies, and like itself, so precious that they would never take a chance on consuming drug chemicals provided by unauthorized persons. Fourth, one ought always have confidence in the pro-vider of medicinal products. I have never heard of Alters Pharmaceutical, Inc. I would not entertain the idee of purchase of medicines for human use, from an organization for which I don't have good supportive in-formation. We know the managers of the company, their motives, and the quality of what they sell?

As medical students and future doctors, we are concreted about the continued appearance of the Akers harmaceutical Company's ad for "stimulants." The apsule colors and tablet shapes and sizes are almost entical to many of the "street drugs," which cannot a purchased legally without a prescription. 


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More sound, less energy

Center, which was initiated in 1946, now has a full-time staff of five, with an additional full-time intern, and five part-time interns. While almost every university has some form of counseling center, Harman said UK's sees more clients per counselor than any other benchmark institution is the surrequiring states.

Last year, more than one-fourth of the counseling clients received aid for some type of personal or emotional problem. Harman cited depression, homesickness, isolation and loneliness, and anxiety as pro-

disproportionately represented, according to Learing Skills Coordinator Ada M. Payne.

"Predominantly, I see freshmen," Payne said. She added, "My feeling is that study skills would be a good course for freshmen."

Harman said while depression is a common problem in counseling, it usually involves an event rather than a long-term psychological problem. Students do, however, complain of amiety about academies and from being away from their homes and families.

Educational and academic counseling is the third major service the Counseling and Testing Center provides. And again, freshmen are

Payne stressed that most students who use the center for educational guidance are those who have average and above average skills and wish to do better academically. "There is no way in which what I do is remedial," she said.

"I would like to have a group called "Procrastinators Anonymous," "she said. "I get a lot of emergencies on tests. Those are the people I try to hook for longer time counseling. If students don't realize they need help.

Payne estimated that the center aids about 200 students per semester in study skills alone. "We have a lot of one-shot contacts (also)," she said.

study skills, they may do so in the space of an hour with a visit to the center. "This might save them a lot of grief down the road," Payne said.

While counseling in vocational, personal, and educational areas is an important objective for the center, testing of non-clients remains a major function.

In addition to giving tests to in-dividuals for counseling purposes, the center administers national and institutional-related exams.

Tests such as the Medical College Admissions Test (usually ad-ministered twice a year), the Law School Admissions Test, the Graduate Management Admissions Test, and the Graduate Record Ex-am (usually administered four times am (usually administered four times a year) are given through the center. In addition, the Scholastic Aptitude Test and the American College Test are given. The General Education Degree test is administered almost daily at the center.
