Back Thru The Wildcat Years

ONE YEAR AGO

*Ole Miss held leads for most of the first part of each half, but lost the lead in the stretch and fell to Kentucky 61-58 in Oxford. The Cats could not contain Carlos Clark, but Mississippi could not stop Melvin Turpin or Kenny Walker, and that proved to be their undoing. Turpin scored 23 points and Walker added 17 points to go along a team-high nine rebounds. Clark scored 26 points to lead all scorers. The win was UK's eighth in a row.

*Melvin Turpin has been selected to

the three-state All-District 7 team. The team is comprised of NCAA Division 1 players from the states of Kentucky, Tennessee and West Virginia. Senior guard Dirk Minniefield was named to the second team.

*For the second straight year, Kentucky finished regular season play being handed it's worst defeat of the season at Tiger Den in Baton Rouge, 74-60. Both teams came in hot, with LSU winning seven of nine and its last four, while the Cats were on an eight-game winning streak. LSU came to play early, making the Wildcats look as though they wanted to get the game over in a hurry and head back to Lexington. LSU outscored the Cats 16-2 and it was not until the 8:20 mark in the first half that UK could get into double figures. Kentucky was down 34-23 at the half. At the start of the second half, the Tigers picked up by jumping out to a 13-point lead and never letting Kentucky get any closer than ten the rest of the way. Howard "High C" Carter, playing his last game before the home folks, led all scorers with 23 points. Teammate

Leonard Mitchell pitched in 20. Jim Master led Kentucky with 19 points.

*For the first time in history, every SEC team has placed a player on the coaches All-SEC team. On the first team were Dale Ellis of Tennessee, Jeff Malone of Mississippi State, Carlos Clark of Mississippi, Howard Carter of LSU, and Kentucky's Melvin Turpin.

FIVE YEARS AGO

*The UK baseball team had two first-inning explosions to chalk up wins over local rivals Georgetown and Kentucky State at the Shively Sports Center as the Cats opened their 1979 season.

*Charles Hurt, a 6-6 power forward at Shelby County High school, announced he will attend the University of Kentucky next year. Kentucky already had commitments from Dirk Minniefield of Lexington and Derrick Hord of Bristol, Tennessee.

*Using slowdown tactics for much of the game, Clemson defeated UK 68-67 in overtime in the first round of the

NIT before a capacity crowd at Rupp Arena. Kentucky Coach Joe B. Hall called it a "confusing game. I thought the officiating undoubtedly destroyed the ballgame. It was the same for both teams." With the score tied 55-55, UK's Jay Shidler missed a last-second shot from 25 feet. Clemson jumped out on top early in the overtime. Fred Cowan got UK within one point with 14 seconds left but Clemson's Billy Williams sealed the win with two foul shots. Kyle Macy led UK with 20 points.

TEN YEARS AGO

*Vanderbilt became the SEC champion when they defeated UK by a score of 71-69. It was the fourth loss in a row for the Wildcats.

*In the season finale, Kentucky defeated Mississippi State by a score of 108-69, saving the Cats from a losing season. Kevin Grevey led Kentucky with 25 points, and Ronnie Lyons, playing his last game as a Cat, scored 16. Kentucky finished the year at 13-13.

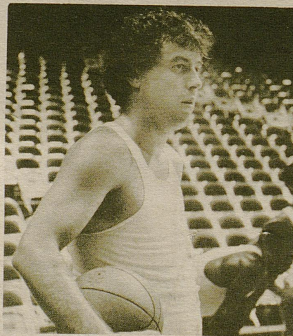

The SEC Race Is Tough, Believe You Me!

It may be the final week of the regular season, but nothing stirs excitement in Big Blue Country like the arrival of Dale Brown and his LSU Tigers.

They'll be coming to town this Saturday after a Thursday visit by the Ole Miss Rebels and coach Lee Hunt. No, the Russians aren't coming!

There were those who said back in November the SEC race would be decided long before the final weekend of action. They were wrong.

Quite frankly, the surprisingly tight race has come more from Auburn and Florida's strong play than Kentucky's three early season losses.

Anyone who thought UK would wade through the 18-game SEC schedule unbeaten wasn't giving other SEC clubs very much respect.

You just don't whitewash a league as tough as the SEC. True, UK didn't play particularly well in some of those games, but I doubt that very many people will beat the likes Alabama, Auburn and LSU on the road.

There were two major surprises. First, UK's bombing of LSU in Baton Rouge was a shocker, not because UK won, but by the margin of it.

The second big eye-opener (especially after the first surprise) was the manner in which both Auburn and Florida dominated Kentucky. They didn't just beat UK in a nip-and-tuck game, UK was manhandled. For a Wildcat fan, it wasn't a pretty sight.

But then, you have to give some credit to people like Charles Barkley, Chuck Person, Ronnie Williams, Vern Delancy and etc. Their legitimate A-A.

I point to those people because Auburn and Florida are not ignored by everyone. Auburn's national image suffered early when the Tigers lost to Wake Forest, UAB, and South Alabama (a blowout) during the pre-conference.

Auburn was playing at the time with an injured Charles Barkley who contributed very little. Once he became healthy, it was a different story. I don't think Wake Forest, South Alabama or UAB wants to mess around Auburn today.

And Florida. Ah, yes, those Gators! They're not that good, you say.

There's a fellow by the name of Dick Dunkel who makes his living by predicting the outcome of games and ranking college basketball teams the country over. His top team, North Carolina, comes as a surprise to no one.

His system of ranking teams digs deeper than won-loss records and name players. For instance, he ranks UNLV as No. 2 with Oklahoma third, Kentucky, Houston, Illinois and Georgetown follow in line with DePaul as No. 10.

Guess who is No. 8 and No. 9!

You won't find either of them in most Top Twenty polls, not even in a Top 25. But Mr. Dunkel places these two clubs in the top ten for the same reason he puts Oklahoma No. 2.

He goes below the surface to rank the clubs.

Because Oklahoma is in the relative weak Big Eight Conference and because you hear of only Wayman Tisdale, there are many who believe Oklahoma is only a one-man team. NCAA tourney-time will teach a few people a great lesson. The Sooners are for real.

But back to No. 8 and No. 9. Unfortunately for these two teams, neither will probably be invited to the NCAA unless they win their conference tourney and that cannot happen for both because they are members of the same conference.

One club has already lost ten games during the season and the other has been beaten seven times and could lose two more before the league tourney. Yet, they are two of the finest in their part of the country.

They are Florida and Alabama respectively. And while one may argue the validity of a top ten ranking, you cannot deny they are of top twenty caliber. When you consider they have lost a combined 11 games in the SEC, then you have to realize just how tough this league is.

The only major college team to survive its league schedule at this point without a loss is North Carolina and there are a couple of good reasons.

It's practically unanimous that the Tar Heels have, by a wide margin, the most and best talent of any team in

America. The team doesn't have just one "Player of the Year" candidate in Michael Jordan, but a second in Sam Perkins, not to mention more players of the seven-foot variety than UK and Indiana combined.

While many preach the ACC is the toughest this season, one has to judge more than a lofty winning percentage against the likes of Maryland-Eastern Shore. Another advantage the ACC has is that its teams play only 14 games instead of 18 like the SEC, Big 10 and Pac-10. League foes, regardless of strength, are tougher than non-conference foes of the like strength. League teams get after your butt, so to speak.

Those ACC people quickly point to Duke's win over Auburn and Vandy and Tennessee, North Carolina's win over LSU, Clemson's win over Vandy, and Georgia Tech's win over Alabama, although Georgia defeated Georgia Tech.

Of the SEC losses, all of them except Vandy's two losses were either on the road or at a neutral site.

True, North Carolina would probably win anywhere and is rightfully the No. 1 team in the country, but the strength of the ACC talent drops after that. If the other ACC clubs were so good, you wouldn't see North Carolina undefeated in the ACC at this time.

As the SEC season winds down, it's apparent an 18-game league card plus a post season tourney is going to cost some SEC teams a spot in the NCAA. It could very well mean that one school which wouldn't ordinarily qualify will come on strong and win the Nashville Bash. The last five years, there have been five different champs.

In the end, the NCAA will have to take at least three SEC teams and I

wouldn't be surprised at all to see all three advance as far as the Final Eight. Who will they be? I don't know, but there are some pretty good basketball teams in the SEC right now.

Ole Miss will come to town preparing for next season. With so many freshmen and sophomores on the roster, Lee Hunt probably has a tough time deciding whether he should take a trainer or a baby-sitter on the road with him.

The Rebs got off to a tough start and Hunt quickly decided to go for the future after he had to take care of some disciplinary matters in January. The Rebs will be a better program for it in the long run, but there's suffering right now.

Ole Miss still is a quality ballclub, just a very young and inexperienced one. It's good enough to make Kentucky play hard, but not good enough to beat the Wildcats yet, at least in Lexington. Kentucky should win this one by 10, if the Cats aren't thinking LSU.

It really doesn't matter if the league race is over or not. This game will be a war. In fact, about the only SEC team left for Kentucky fans to hate is LSU. And in a way, that's healthy. At least so long as fans behave themselves and limit their actions to cheering and booing, free of foul language.

While most of the conversation around the SEC has surrounded the likes of favorite Kentucky and newcomers Auburn and Florida, the LSU Tigers have quietly worked their way back up the league ladder.

Those Tigers are a pretty darn good club, believe you me.

Despite injuries to Derrick Taylor and Leonard Mitchell and the disciplinary problems of Stefford Johnson, LSU continues to give everyone fits. LSU played North Carolina to the hilt and deserved to win when you consider a couple bad officiating calls at Carolina's home court.

There's no question LSU is a better team with Leonard Mitchell, but the Tigers have always seemed to fight back from such adversity. You can bet LSU will be at the top of its game when the regular season's final battle is played before nationally televised audience over NBC-TV Saturday.

It will be a time when the Tigers and Cats should be at their best. And it'll be a time when Al McGuire and Dick Enberg will be saying, "this is what college basketball is all about."

It will be one of the top three games of the season for Kentucky, in the

Dawgs Fall Inches Short

Closer To The Title

The Kentucky Wildcats took a gigantic step toward their 35th SEC title Saturday with a 66-64 win over the Georgia Bulldogs in Athens, Georgia.

The Wildcats' 21st win of the season did not come easy and the Cats had to withstand some poor free throw shooting at the end to come up with the victory.

There was no greater contribution for the Wildcats than the floor leadership of senior point guard Dicky Beal, who completely manhandled the Bulldogs' full court pressure in the game's final minutes.

Offensively, it was a balanced UK scoring attack with five starters scoring in double figures.

Melvin Turpin led the way with 18 points, followed by Beal's 14 points and Jim Master with 12 points. Sam Bowie and Kenny Walker had 10 points each.

Beal's play was truly outstanding as he dished out nine assists, hit six of seven shots from the field and logged 37 minutes as he continued to show his renewed strength.

The Cats had to withstand a torrid first half from Georgia's outstanding guards as UK fell behind by ten.

It was a first half of red-hot streaks in Athens, Georgia, as the Bulldogs came out hot, hitting their first seven shots and racing out to a 16-6 lead before the Wildcats realized what hit them.

Georgia's all-star guards, Vern

Fleming and Gerald Crosby burned up the nets in the early going and staked the Bulldogs to the early lead.

When Crosby and Fleming were not doing a number on the Cats, forward Joe Ward was taking over inside.

Georgia's offensive onslaught was so quick that UK coach Joe Hall was forced to call a valuable time-out before the automatic television time-out at the 16:00 mark of the first half.

With the Dogs on top at 17:02 with a score of 12-4, UK went to the sidelines for regrouping. It was more of the same for the next four minutes as Georgia led by 20-10 as Crosby scored on another long range bomb at 14:41.

At that point, UK caught fire. Melvin Turpin stuck in a short baseline jumper and Jim Master hit back-to-back jumpers to cut the deficit to four points, 20-16.

Dicky Beal scored off the fast break. Sam Bowie slammed home one on an alley-oop pass from Beal and UK had tied the game at 20.

From there on, the game was nip-and-tuck the remainder of the first half.

One Shot Short

The final twenty minutes of action were just as furious as the first half, although the shooters cooled off considerably in the second period.

The game was tied eleven times in the last half and the lead exchanged hands four times.

Although leading early in the second half, Georgia caught up and actually

never trailed from the 11:23 mark until UK went in front at 60-58 on James Blackmon's 14-footer from the baseline at 6:50.

Ironically, UK never trailed after that. UK went up by four at 62-58 on Kenny Walker's jumper, but Georgia came right back to tie the score when Horace McMillan and Don Hartry connected on long missiles.

Kentucky took the lead for good on Turpin's turn-around at 3:50, but two missed bonus free throws by Bowie and another by Walker prevented UK from salting the game away at the end.

Georgia missed a chance to tie when Beal stripped Fleming at the top of the key. UK took the ball out-of-bounds but almost lost it. After a scramble, it was ruled UK's ball at midcourt with one second left.

UK's Walker lofted a pass towards Bowie. At the same time, Banks grabbed Beal to the floor. There was no whistle. Corhen picked off Walker's inbounds pass and turned to shoot. As the horn sounded, the ball bounced high off the front of the rim and over the backboard.

The Coaches Comment

"It was a great win for us," said UK coach Joe Hall. "We hung in there and did the things we had to do. Dicky was just super out there today."

"It was the type of game we expected. Georgia came out strong and got off to a great start, but it was a credit to our team the way we came back and took the lead."

"Dicky was the man of the hour for us. He was just sensational. Kenny Walker got off to a slow start but had a strong second half. His rebounding and shooting was one of the keys for us in the second half."

Just minutes before tip-off, Hall learned of Auburn's one-point 81-80 loss to LSU in Baton Rouge. Said Hall, "yea, we found out the score right before the game, but we didn't tell the players until after the game. They were pretty excited."

Georgia coach Hugh Durham wasn't interested in close finishes and a moral victory, as some Georgia writers suggested during his post game press conference.

"We played well but we can't get carried away with just playing well."

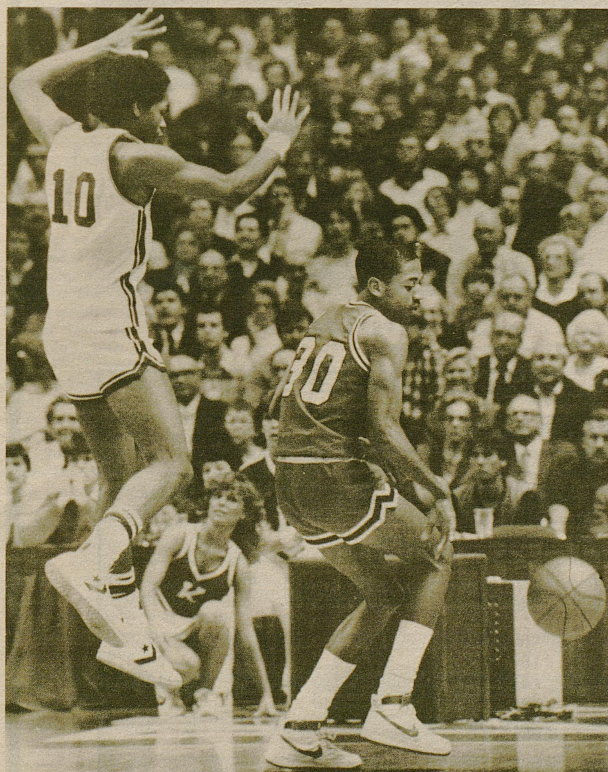
But Durham said he didn't want to take anything away from Kentucky adding, "Kentucky has a great team and a lot of great players."

Look At The Stats

In the end, Kentucky won the game of statistics, but its most decisive edge came in field goal accuracy, an area which Georgia dominated early.

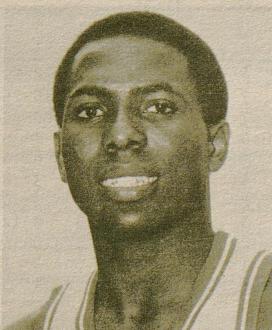
The Bulldogs canned their first seven shots and then hit ten of their first 13 for a blistering 77 percent before cooling off. By intermission, the Dogs had cooled down to 50 percent on 18 of 36, meaning that the Dogs hit only eight of their last 23 attempts in the first half. A lot of credit to the latter statistic is the result of a multitude of changing defenses which UK began employing midway through the half.

Kentucky, which hit only two of its first four, found the range more (Continued On Page 10)

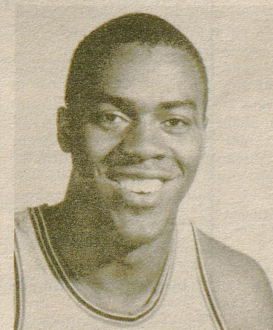

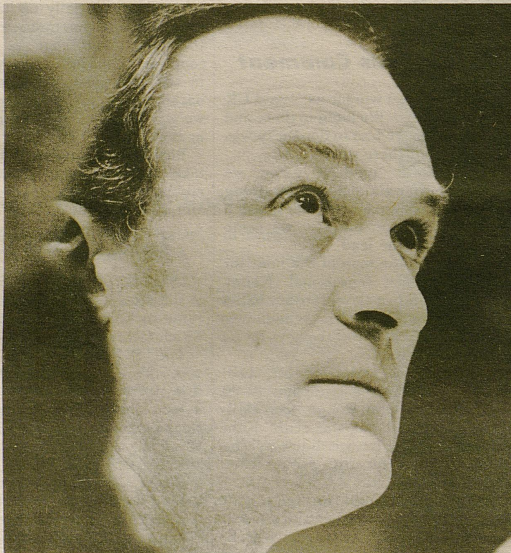

*2,000 tickets did become available when UC students did not use their allotted amount. These tickets were sold on a first come, first serve basis.

I regret the slow down game that was played, but Coach Yates was playing within the rules of the game. There are many UK fans in Cincinnati and a healthy relationship between the two schools is good for both sides. The

slow down game did not help this relationship, but articles like this one did not help either. Let's hope the two colleges have a bright future together.

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Winston Walks The Same Road Kenny Did

"It is very interesting to parallel Winston's progress with Kenny's progress a year ago. They started hitting the basket around the same time and their improvement has been about the same."

In late February of '83, Walker was a freshmen turning senior. Now the impeccable wonderkid of the Cats, Walker transformed as the ideas of March approached. He finished as SEC Freshman of the Year, now he is knocking on the door of Player of the Year.

Bennett has shown a similar metamorphosis, in his own style. His game has improved, or in this case refined, with the season. If now not the best freshman in the league, perhaps it is only because he toils for a team on which stats are not a priority for him.

Hall has a point, paralleling the season of the two former prep greats. The chart below compares the two as rookies. Some things become appar-

most talented. It was only a matter of time before he rose. It became a case of necessity and by season's end, many felt he was the team's best player.

Bennett's situation is different. He plays on a frontline many feel is the

nation's best. Like Walker, he is needed as a sixth man catalyst. Unlike Walker, his importance came from development rather than out of emergency.

The growth of the two has differed. Walker seemed to blossom overnight.

He realized his talents, he realized his needs. He took over. Bennett's formation has been more of a gradual process.

Bennett played more early because he was ready earlier. Always the intrepid one, he came in with the fundamental and physical maturity. Fear not was his motto.

The problem was he played so hard he sometimes got out of control. Not showboat out-of-control, mind you, but enthusiastically out-of-control. He fought too hard for position, he took the ball to the basket too fiercely, he growled for every possession.

The result was quick foul problems and poor shooting. He would make a great move to the basket, then overshoot because he could not slow down his momentum. He charged over people on drives, rather than pull up and shoot.

"It has been a problem toning down the aggressiveness," says Bennett. "Now I am starting to mature a little, especially on offense. At first, I would

*Bennett has played slightly more, due mostly to playing a lot more time in non-conference games. Therefore, Bennett has scored slightly more, again with the difference coming outside the league. The difference in scoring has also come at the foul line, where Bennett has camped almost twice as much.

*Walker shot much better from the field, Bennett from the line. Bennett got off to an horrendous start from the field (one of 14) and has since shot well. Walker shot infrequently early but stayed over 60 percent from the beginning. At the line, Walker spent all season making up for a three for 12 start. Bennett has been in the 65-75 percent range all year.

*Walker has rebounded a little better. Of course, Walker also played on a shorter team and there were more rebounds to be gathered.

*The SEC stats of the two are strikingly similar. After 14 league games, Walker had taken one more shot than Bennett had, was playing less than a minute a game more and was averaging about a half-point more a game. Also at this time (14 SEC games, 23 overall,) Walker had scored in double figures six times and all were in SEC games. Bennett has scored in double figures eight times, five in SEC contests.

The roles of the two on their respective teams are alike but diversified. Walker was taller than UK's starting forwards and probably the

take the ball to the basket and get the charge. Now I am pulling up."

Hall had little worry. From day one, he said he had seen nary a freshman who played so hard. Auburn Coach Sonny Smith said the same. For the coach, toning down is much easier than turning meek into mean.

"Winston wants to play but he wants to play aggressive. That is sometimes difficult," says Hall. "But he is learning and coming along. He is doing a good job."

The difference shows in the shooting. Since uno for 14, Bennett has hit 52.2 percent. Once a bricklayer, he has lately been a mason.

After 17 games he was still hitting just 36.9.

Five games later, that percentage was over 46 percent. A streak of 17 for 20 from the field brought a one-time single digit shooting percentage to respectability.

"Winston is beginning to hit the basket, which gives him confidence," says Hall.

Confidence makes the decision-making process a breeze. Bennett has begun to realize what to take and when to take it. Instead of forcing his shots, he is picking his spots.

"It is all a credit to my confidence," he says. "I've felt a lot looser and have been getting into the flow of the game. I've not been debating whether or not to take the shot. If I'm open, I'll take the shot. If I'm not, I will pass it out."

Success Is In The Eyes Of The Beholder

Four years ago, the University of Georgia basketball staff coveted the services of one Dicky Beal. Like dozens of other schools, Georgia beat a path to Covington, KY in an effort to lure the 5-11 star.

Georgia already had freshmen like Dominique Wilkins and Terry Fair. They were about to land James Banks and Vern Fleming. Beal, they felt, could get them all motoring and winning.

Of course, Georgia did not land Beal. At first, it was thought DePaul would after Beal verbally committed to that school. Then, after a change of heart, Beal decided he wanted to play for Kentucky. The Cats decided likewise and the signature was made.

Beal's career at UK has been an up-and-down one, mostly due to injuries. However, when playing, he most often had played well. He has done what the college scouts thought he could do - speed up the pace, penetrate and dish off, be a nuisance for an opposing offense.

Georgia Coach Hugh Durham had watched Beal in high school and the past four years. Earlier this year, a reporter asked Durham to analyze Beal's career. The question seemed to hint that Durham might think things would have been different if Dicky had

chosen another school, say Georgia.

Durham said the only difference might be that fans and media would accept Beal for his accomplishments rather than not living up to their unrealistic expectations. Said Coach Durham...



"If Dicky Beal had gone to DePaul and done the same things he has done at Kentucky, everybody would say he had a good career. If he had gone to Georgia and played good defense, pushed it up the floor and maybe not shot the lights out, everybody would say he was good.

"He comes up here and does not make All-America and you ask what is wrong with Dicky Beal when he is out

there playing as hard and as good as he can."

Durham says some people seem to feel that if Kentucky signs a player, then he is better than everyone else. That stigma is an unfair one, according to the veteran Bulldog coach.

"A guy goes to Kentucky and you

guys automatically say he is the greatest player in the world. He signs with Kentucky and if he is not an All-American (in high school), then you say everybody else made a mistake. You think that if he wasn't an All-American, Kentucky would not sign him."

consistently as the game wore on and finished the half at 54.5 percent.

For the game, UK hit a hot 56.4 percent on 31 of 55 shooting. Dicky Beal hit six of seven and Melvin Turpin canned eight of 12. Jim Master re-discovered his shooting eye and found the range on six of ten.

Especially attractive to Hall was the team total of only 10 turnovers, one less than Georgia's 11. It's rare when you can cause more turnovers than committing when on the road in the SEC.

For a while it appeared UK would control the rebounding department, but Georgia took command of an 18-17 mark at the half and won that stat going away, 37-30.

Still, Bowie was the game's top ace, recording 10 while Kenny Walker and Georgia's Richard Corhen were next at nine each.

Game Notes

Freshman Winston Bennett saw 10 minutes of action, but wasn't real effective, still suffering from a sprain-

Madison Hopes Pitching Heads Bat Cats To Top

(Keith Madison is entering his sixth season as baseball coach at Kentucky. His record entering '84 is 147-101-1. The Bat Cats open this season March 2, with the first home game March 6 against Georgetown.)

Question: Tell us about the strength of your 1984 ballclub.

Madison: The strength is going to be the pitching. I don't say that to take away from the rest of the team. We were 13th in the nation last year in earned run average and we have all those pitchers back but one (Jeff Parrett, now in the Milwaukee Brewers organization). I also feel we will have a good offense, considering we have Brandt Ely coming back. He is our nucleus, hitting .442 last year, which was second in the SEC. We feel with people like Ely, Wayne Able and JC transfer Randy Clark, that we will score some runs as well as keep the opponent from scoring.

Question: Can you expect the pitching to get better?

Madison: It is possible it could be better simply because most of the pitchers who had good years were sophomores last year. People like Jay Ray, Chris Carroll and Jeff Hellman all had positive experiences in the Southeastern Conference last year as sophomores. They now know they can be successful in the league and that confidence could carry over into this year. Confidence is such a major part of pitching. They should be up for every game and that could enable them to be more consistent. We are also getting good leadership from Paul Kilgus, our only senior pitcher. This is his fourth year of pitching in the SEC and I feel he is the best lefthander in the league. I also feel Jay Ray is the best righthander in the SEC. I feel we

have the best staff in the SEC and if history repeats itself, that should carry us a long way.

Question: Tell us about some new players to watch that can help now?

Madison: Randy Clark (first base) will help our club tremendously. He has the ability to not only hit for power but hit for a high average. John



Kuester, our freshman pitcher, should contribute more and more as the season progresses. Rodney Martin may also play some at shortstop, depending on how Rick Campbell comes back from an ankle injury. We had hoped to redshirt Rodney and we will redshirt Robbie Buchanan, who is a freshman catcher.

Question: What do you have to improve on from last year?

Madison: Defense. I felt last year we played good defense outside the conference games but during the conference, there was a problem making the big play. We are going to

definitely improve in that area and I have seen improvement throughout the year. Just the fact that our infield is more mature now will help that situation. One thing that hurt us last year defensively was when second baseman Terry Ryan broke his leg, we had to move Ely from third to second. Brandt had only made one error at third base but did not have a great deal of experience at second and made some errors there. Then John Sikes, who had been our DH, moved to third base and he really struggled there. Now Ely is back at third, Ryan is back

at second and Campbell is playing the best shortstop he has ever played. So our infield should be solid. We had no problems defensively in the outfield last year. As a matter of fact, we had one of the better defensive outfields that I saw. No one is gone from that outfield. We also have all three catchers returning. That should give us stability defensively.

Question: Could this be your best club yet at Kentucky?

Madison: This is our best club, potentially. But games are not won on

Veteran Squad Should Benefit Bat Cats' Season

The Kentucky baseball team is coming off a fine season and chances appear good the Bat Cats will be even an improved squad in 1984.

Kentucky finished the 1983 season with a .31-14 mark. Only one starter does not return from that team and this year's team has the experience of 20 juniors and seniors.

Kentucky should have one of the top pitching staffs in the Southeastern Conference, if not in the country. Kentucky hurlers had a team earned run average of 3.37 in '83, which was good enough to rank 13th in the nation. Only one pitcher is gone from that staff and the top three starters and top fireman from the bullpen return.

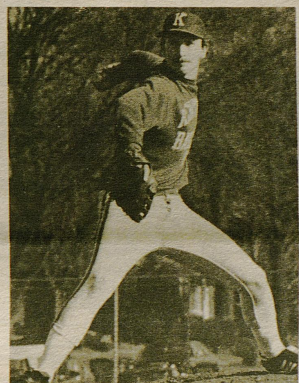
The staff is led by senior lefty Paul Kilgus, who has been in the UK top three rotation for most of his four

years. Kilgus was 6-5, with a 2.39 ERA last year. Junior Jay Ray is one of the top righthanders in the league, coming off a 6-3 year with a 2.81 ERA. Rounding out what should be the weekend rotation against SEC teams is righthander Jeff Hellman. He was 4-2 and had a 2.66 ERA last year and the hard-throwing junior is one of 44 finalists across the country still competing to make the Olympic squad which will play in Los Angeles.

The stopper in the bullpen for the Cats should be junior Chris Carroll, who was 1-0 with a 1.86 ERA last year. Carroll did not allow an earned run in UK's fall schedule. Help should also come from sophomore Jack Savage, who was 2-0 as a freshman. He could be used as a spot starter or reliever.

While pitching is a strength, the offense does not look to shabby either.

Eight players return that hit over .300 a year ago. Heading that group is third baseman Brandy Ely, and All-SEC



choice a year ago when he hit .422, behind only All-American David Magadan of Alabama. Ely hit at a .395 pace against SEC teams.

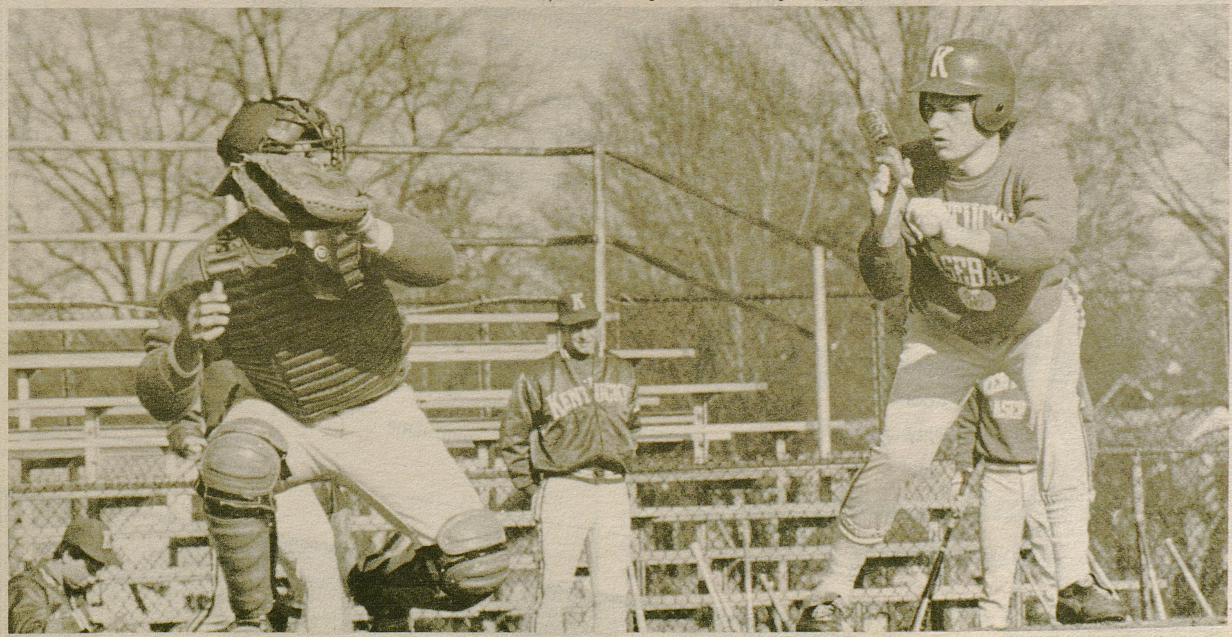
Junior Rick Campbell (.313) should

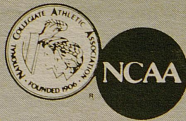
anchor the double play combination at shortstop. Also up the middle is second baseman Terry Ryan, who hit .327 last year before being sidelined with an injury. At first base will be JC transfer Randy Clark, who should add punch and power to the UK lineup.

A group of five veterans return to patrol the outfield. Scott Knox (.280) will definitely play center. Mike Agnich (.329) will most likely be another starter. That leaves Wayne Able (.313), Kevin Gothard (.368) and Clint Arnold (.324) to platoon between the other outfield spot and the designated hitter role.

Three quality players are battling for the catching duties. Senior Brad Walls (.333) started most of last year while Dan Selhorst (.250) also got a lot of valuable experience. Pushing both for playing time is sophomore Greg Stephens.

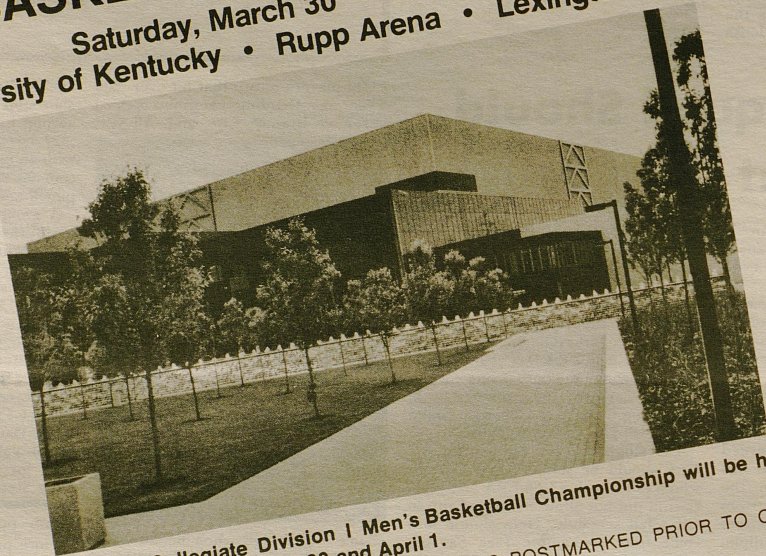

To Tell The Truth, Stats Don't Lie

You've heard the old saying, statistics never lie!

Well, sometimes they don't tell the entire truth either. Nevertheless, statistics are great fun to play with and the Southeastern Conference statistics are no different.

After fourteen league games, Kentucky stood at the top with an 11-3 record, followed closely by Auburn at 10-4 and Alabama at 10-5. LSU is hanging tough at 9-5.

More interesting is how the teams have fared at home as compared with playing on the road this season.

Early in the conference race, teams on the road were winning better than half the games. As the season wore on, all that has changed and the home team has now won 47 and lost only 24, a hot 66.2 percent. That compares much better than the league's overall 58.2 winning percentage when including non-conference games as well.

As the season winds down to the final week, it's apparent SEC teams would rather play at home than on the road, if for no reason other than seven of the ten teams have winning records at home while only two clubs have winning records on the road.

Only The Cats Are Perfect At Home

Entering last weekend's play, only Kentucky owned a perfect home record in conference play. UK is 7-0 on the season when playing SEC foes at Rupp Arena.

Next best was Alabama at 8-1. The Tide's lone loss was their first SEC home encounter when Auburn upset the Crimson Tide. Since then, Bama hasn't lost in Tuscaloosa. The Tide will have the opportunity to return the favor in the season finale this Saturday at Auburn. Those other SEC clubs

wanting to move up in the standings wouldn't mind the upset either.

Also playing great basketball at home this season has been LSU. The Tigers were bombed out by Kentucky in the Tiger's first home SEC game and then rallied to win six straight. Just like Alabama, LSU will have the opportunity to return the favor to UK in the season finale this Saturday.

Three other clubs owned 5-2 marks (Auburn, Florida and Georgia) while Tennessee was 4-2 with three home games left.

Auburn has been upset twice at home, by Vanderbilt and Tennessee while Florida coughed up games to Tennessee and Auburn. Georgia was unable to beat Florida or LSU at home. Tennessee has been upset by both Alabama and Auburn at home.

Saturday-Monday

Swings Favor Vandy

Numerous coaches and fans have been talking about the Saturday-Monday swings in SEC play where two teams are paired on the road.

In Kentucky's situation, Vanderbilt is the traveling partner and there are those who claim Vandy enjoys an advantage in being paired with UK because opponents will prepare more for UK and take Vandy for granted.

Whatever it's worth, Vanderbilt is the only team in the league (other than Auburn) which is playing as well on the road as it is at home. Vandy is 3-4, both at home and on the road.

On The Road In The SEC Is Tough

Playing on the road in the SEC is another matter. Only Ole Miss has a perfect record in that department and it isn't one the Rebs are too proud of.

Ole Miss is yet to win a game on the road, having lost seven straight. The Rebels' only two wins came back-to-back at home against Tennessee (Continued On Page 22)

When the Southeastern Conference post season tournament begins next week in Nashville, it will be the first sell-out since the tourney was reinstated back in 1979.

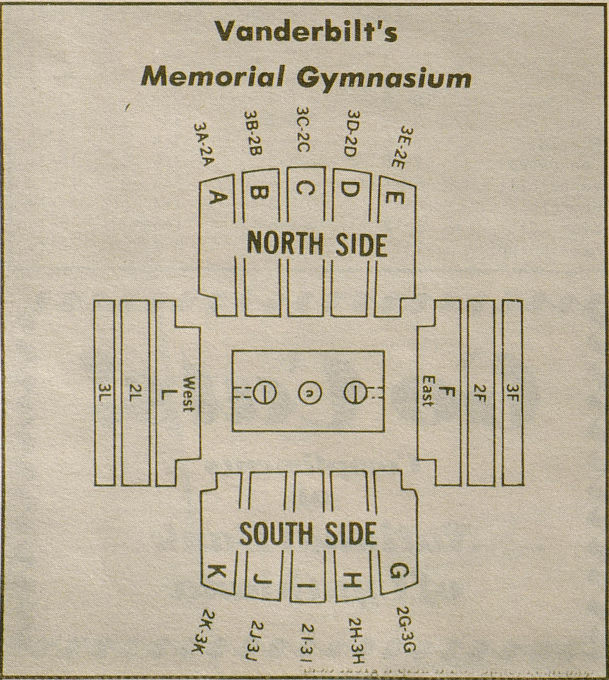
All 15,000-plus tickets have been sold and, without doubt, this will be the most balanced tourney in history.

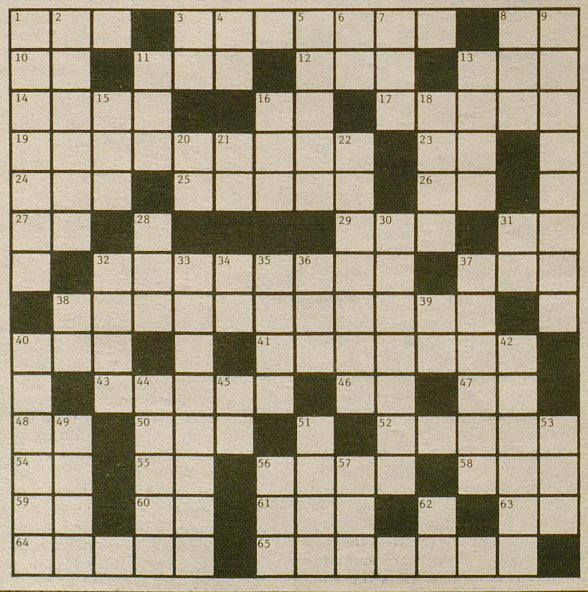
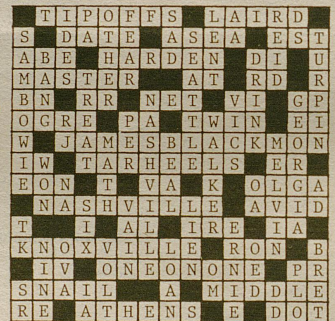

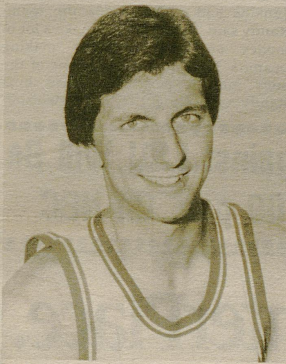
Five Are Leaving, Another One Is Staying

You will be reading, hearing and seeing a lot about the Kentucky seniors within the next week. Of course, Saturday night will be their last home appearance, at least before the regular season ticket holders (UK could play in Rupp Arena in the Midwest Regional).

This is a special night, always one of the most memorable of each season. And while the whole affair may seem a little trite to some, anyone who has been at a senior farewell will tell you it gets a bit emotional.

This senior class is certainly deserving a fond farewell. They have upheld the winning tradition of Kentucky basketball, off and on the court.

You'll read about the maturity and courage of Sam Bowie, not to mention his slam dunks. You'll read about the incredible progress of boy-turned-man Melvin Turpin, the offensive machine. You'll read about Jim Master, the sharpshooter who often comes up with the right play at the right time. You'll

read about Dicky Beal, perhaps the most exciting player to ever wear snickers in Rupp Arena who has fought adversity in an effort to go out on top.

You probably will not read much about Tom Heitz. Compared to the other four, his statistical contributions rank somewhere above nil. And graduating with those four is something like dying in a plane crash with the Jackson 5. You are lucky if you make the final paragraph in the next day's paper.

It's been that way since Tom came to UK five years ago, a gawky farm boy out of northern Indiana. He talked soft and slow, and still does. He looked clumsy on the court, and still does. He spent a year not playing at all as a redshirt, and sometimes practically does the same now without redshirting.

Yet, Tom Heitz is my kind of guy. He's a blue-collar worker. He reports at 7:30 and leaves at 5:30. His paycheck of playing time is minimum wages, his effort is of maximum heart.

Tom did not have to return to play this year. Financially, the scholarship meant little. Certainly, he knew his playing time still would be next to nothing. Yet he wanted a championship and he knew to get that, a team needs workers and sacrificers.

That is what Tom is. He's the kind of guy who goes to the coach and airs out the team's feelings. He's the kind of

guy who volunteers for the duties no one else wants. He's the kind of guy who sits and never complains.

Nowhere is he appreciated as he is by his coaches and teammates. I doubt if any player is more respected than Tom.

If Tom Heitz is fortunate enough to make it to Seattle or even win it all, you may think Tom Heitz had little to do with it. You may be right but for every championship team, there is a Tom Heitz.

Pat Etcheberry told the UK administration last Monday that he was resigning. 'Etch' technically was the UK strength coach, track coach and cross country coach.

For months, he has been considering leaving Kentucky. Several well-to-do Lexington businessmen, including longtime track booster Alex Campbell, to open an executive-type health center in Lexington. They wanted 'Etch' to run it.

I understand the commitment to do so was strong from both sides. 'Etch' also told UK athletes he was leaving.

When the media got hold of this, a campaign began to keep 'Etch'. 'Etch' and UK Athletics Director Cliff Hagan began negotiating. That was late last week. By Thursday an agreement was made. 'Etch' is staying at UK, only as strength coach.

I have always held 'Etch' in the highest regards. He is an extremely dedicated person and has been invaluable to both the Kentucky football and basketball teams. He also has that knack for driving an athlete to his limits while still maintaining the respect of that athlete. His loss would indeed be a tremendous one.

However, 'Etch' could not be both the track coach and the strength coach. Most major schools have a full-time strength coach, some have two. His title as track coach has been somewhat of a farce for years.

The track program and its athletes have suffered as much as the other programs have gained. Don Weber, who is listed as a part-time assistant, has been coaching the track and cross-country programs the past few years. I don't know whose choice ('Etch' or Hagan) it has been to leave 'Etch' with the title of track coach in recent years but it should have been resolved before this.

I understand Etcheberry's salary has been in the \$20,000-plus range, not counting benefits such as camps, etc. I hear his recent offer was around the \$40,000 mark. What Hagan had to do was try and keep 'Etch' while also

being fair to other coaches at Kentucky.

Hagan is to be commended for solving the situation and keeping Etcheberry at UK. The school's major programs will continue to benefit, as well as the track program.

* * *

UK is still advertising the job vacated when John Devlin left to take a job with the Houston Oilers. Devlin was the linebacker coach who called defensive signals. Legally, I don't think UK can announce a replacement until March 9.

Don't be surprised if changes are made within the present staff. Defensive back coach Terry Stroock may replace Devlin and Chip Garber (receiver coach who primarily recruited) will take over the secondary. Dave Likens, now a part-time coach, may replace Garber on the road.

TWO GOOD ONES: One of the nation's best recruiters who is not from the state of Kentucky said if he could pick any two prep seniors, he would select **Al Lorenzen** from Cedar Rapids, Iowa and **Cedric Jenkins** from Georgia. Lorenzen, a 6-9 power player, is headed to Iowa. The 6-9 Jenkins is coming to UK. Neither is ranked among most Top Five lists or even most Top Ten... Vandy Coach **C.M. Newton** says he feels 6-10 **Brett Burrow** will be one of the best inside players in the Southeastern Conference. Burrow, whose dad was an All-American at UK, has come a long way since he played for North Hardin High School, which lost in the state tournament finals. Many questioned whether or not he was even major college material at that time. The star of the show at North Hardin then was **Robbie Valentine**, who is riding near the end of the pine for Louisville. I recall the UK staff liked Burrow in high school but weren't sure he could provide them the type of inside play it takes to go all the way, which of course is UK's goal every year... I saw former Wildcat **Mike Ballenger** play for Western recently. On that night, Mike came off the bench and helped turn the game around for an eventual Hilltopper win with some key passes inside. Mike seems happy at Western and that is what it's all about. His playing time varies with each game. He is still running into the same problems he had at UK, in the sense that the coaches feel he could help a great deal

more if he would pick up his intensity.

Filing through the trash here on my desk (this could take all year), I found a column I can't help but comment on before burning. It was written by Charles Hollis and appeared in an Alabama paper the day UK played at Auburn. The title was "Five reasons why Auburn won't beat 'Cats'" so we see real quick Mr. Hollis didn't qualify as an expert on the game (won by Auburn by 19). I'm sure Mr. Hollis is a friendly gent but I still can't believe this. Skipping four of the reasons, one was that "Joe Hall has a gift for intimidating conference officials and, whether he admits it or not, will assign one of his players to a search-and-destroy mission to get an opponent's best player either in foul trouble or frustrated beyond contribution." He went on to say Joe B. does this by ranting and raving on the sidelines. Gimme a break - that may be the most ludicrous thing I've ever read - and you wonder why SEC fans don't like UK and Joe B. Oh yes, another reason Hollis gave for Auburn losing was he said Charles Barkley "was not playing like an All-SEC center," and referring to Barkley's back problems, "I have it on reliable information that he's healthy, out of shape and uninspired." Wonder if he told Charles that? ... Maybe Kentucky should get a share of the Big Ten Conference trophy. The Cats went 3-0 against the three teams (Indiana, Illinois, Purdue) battling for the league lead. I remember after playing the three, Joe Hall said he felt all were teams capable of winning a league and apparently, he knew what he was talking about.

THANKS TO THE VOLS: Tennessee pulled the shocker of the year when they won at Auburn last Monday moving UK into sole possession of first place in the SEC. At his Thursday press conference, Joe B. was thanking his friends from K-ville. "I want to thank Tennessee for giving us a boost. You need that and we got it when we needed it most," said Hall. "Now if we can take care of ourselves and win our next four games. It relieves some pressure but we can't let up with the possibility of winning the conference squarely in our hands. Before, we were waiting for Auburn to get beat. Now it is up to us to seal the championship." Of course, Tennessee was also sending a warning to UK, who visited K-ville Monday, where UK wins once every other world's fair... Recent losses by most of the high rated teams can do nothing but help UK's seeding in the NCAA later. Hall says it also points out every team is beatable. "With DePaul and Georgetown getting beat, it is good to know we are not the only team that loses. Sometimes I think from my critics that we are the only team that gets beat. It takes the heat off when Dean Smith loses and Bobby Knight loses to Northwestern. It proves we are all bad coaches," said Hall... Joe B. said so long as Dicky Beal remains healthy, he has a starting job. Hall had been worried about breaking up the team chemistry by moving Beal into the starting lineup so late. Of that, Hall says he feels it will work out and notes "I see signs now. There is a good spark flowing on the team." And what about Roger Harden, who had started all year? "I think Roger will come back and play

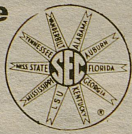

But Ole Miss isn't in a sinking boat by itself. Georgia and Mississippi State have just a single win on the road to show for their travels.

In fact, only two SEC clubs have won more than three games on the road this season. Auburn leads the conference in that department with an

Kentucky is the only other team playing .500 or better on the SEC road this season. UK held a 4-3 mark entering the Georgia contest last Saturday.

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

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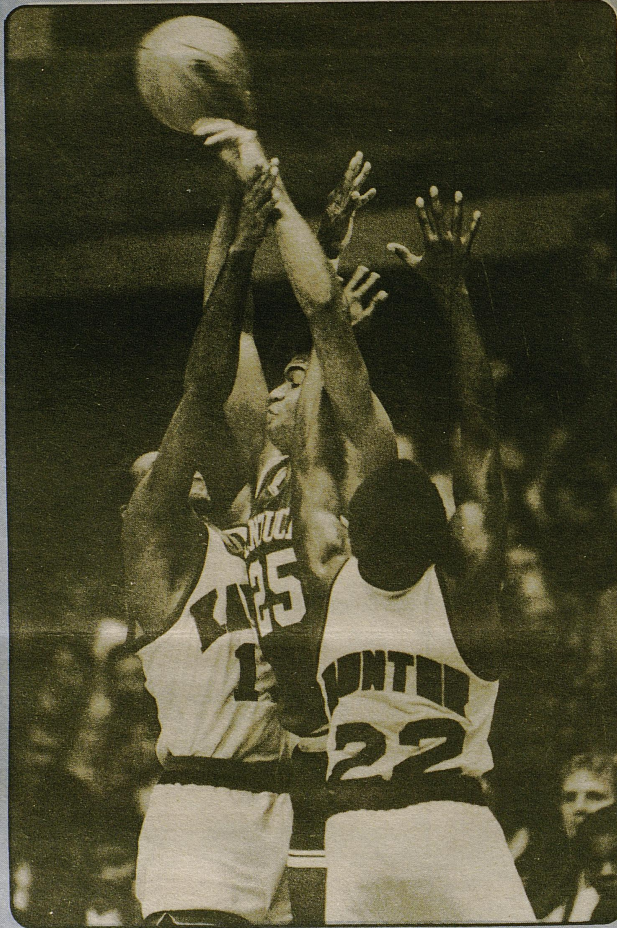
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
