

LCC students gain campus computer access

Chris Hatfield, a Lexington Com-munity College sophomore, learned the hard way that LCC students had been denied access to UK Microlab

When a student creates an account on the web, his or her enrollment is verified via the UK computer system. However, information on LCC students is not in the system's memory. Therefore, LCC students could previously only use LCC computers, which are located on South Campus.

Hatfield, a resident of Boyd Hall on North Campus said this was "totally unacceptable" in his letter. As a sophomore who used these same computers last year, he said he felt "cheated," like "a second class student" at UK.

In response, Hamperian told Schuler that "a change would be forthcoming," Schuler said. UK Information Systems was in the process of determining how to allow LCC students access while keeping the general public out, Schuler said.

The change put into effect last week was initiated prior to Hatfield's letter, Hamperian said. To obtain an account, LCC students must visit McVey Hall. After their enrollment has been verified, they can use their PAC account for a cesset to all of the UK computer labs.

LexTran officials could not be reached for comment, but Thornton said. LexTran is doing a good job handling the campus load for disabled students. "If there is a problem with the buses, it is probably the drivers' fault because they have the responsibility to check their equipment before they go on their runs. Again, I have not heard of any of these problems," Thornton said.

The black community must keep its faith in the things that it has worked for and not give up in the face of opposition, Renita J. Weems told a crowd of nearly 201 last night in Memorial Hall.

The speech, which Weems delivered as part of the annual Roots and Heritage Festival, was met with thunderous applause.

Weems began her speech by commending the sponsors of the Roots and Heritage Festival for their efforts to keep black history alive.

Weems spoke of the importance of knowing your roots and taking from your relatives and friends the history that makes a person who they are.

She is currently working on another book about women and spirituality which will be published in 1998.

Weems who is also an ordained Minster, received her masters degree and doctorate from Princeton Theological Seminary in Priceton, NJ. She was ordained an elder in the African Methodist Episcopal Church in 1984.

Weems also has a bachelor's degree in Economics from Wellesley College in Wellesley, Mass.

Berkeley plans to defy Proposition 209 laws

BERKELEY, Calif. — The city of
Berkeley has announced that it will defy
Proposition 209, which bans race and
gender preferences in public institutions,
by retaining its current hiring and contracting practices.
As the American Civil Liberties Union
and other civil rights advocates take the
controversial law to the Supreme Court,
Berkeley administrators said they will
continue policies that encourage diversity
in the workforce.

"We will continue doing what we are
doing," said Mayor Shirley Dean. "There
is no need for change, but we will keep an
eye on things. We're going along with
what we have because it has worked. We
have achieved a diverse workforce."

City Council members unanimously
voted to defy the measure when it was
originally passed by 54 percent of California's voters last November. The proposition became law last Thursday.

"We hope to set a better example that
fair and equal treatment can work," said
council member Polly Armstrong. "The
Berkeley staff is a good example of that."

Armstrong and Dean both participated

We see it as vitally important, "Amstrong said. "If fairness, equality and diversity ren't the underpinnings of Berkeley, then I wouldn't know where it would work."
But City Attorney Manuela Albuquerque said that since Berkeley has never used quota systems, Proposition 209 will not affect the city's hiring and contracting practices.

"We have no practices of race and gender-conscious hiring," Albuquerque said. We're not allowed to do that, and we don't do that. We engage in various programs that target groups to get an adequate applicant pool so that we can hire a diverse staff. Outreach programs even out the playing field."

City officials said they will encourage diversity by drawing applicants from minority associations and favoring contracting companies with a large proportion of minorities.

Berkeley's policies have led to legal disputes over reverse discrimination in the past, but council members said they do not see lawsuits as a threat.

"Any time, any day, you can't make bad decisions base flowed and decisions base flowed and decisions baseful policies."

Mayor Shriety Dean added that the city's stand against Proposition 209 would not influence state funding for Berkeley.

Although Gov. Pete Wilson, supports the proposition, he cannot use his position against Berkeley since the city's funding is mostly determined by population and competition for state grans, Dean said.

"We're able to be competitive for (state grants) because we have good proposals," she said. "If the governor would interfere with a good proposal because of a political dispute, the howls would be enormous across the state. Pledge at LSU sues school, fraternity

Student says SAE forced him to binge

BATON ROUGE, La.

— A Louisiana State University student who nearly died after a night of drinking that killed a fellow fraternity pledge filed a legligence suit Tuesday against the school, the fraternity and the bar where they drank.

Donald Hunt, 20 was hospitalized for nearly a week after the Aug. 25 binge that ended with the death of his friend and roommate, Benjamin Wynne, also 20.

Hunt's lawsuit, which seeks unspecified darnages, alleges that end of drinks, and that the fraternity did not do enough to help nearly two dozen drinks, and that the fraternity did not do enough to help nearly two dozen drunk pledges.

Paramedics said Hunt was not breathing and was near death when they arrived at the fraternity dust.

With tobacco companies facing a \$368.5 billion tab from state health departments, smokers and tobacco farmers might encounter inflated costs and declining demand.

Tobacco industry analysts who met on campus Monday say companies may raise prices as much as 60 to 80 cents per pack to help alleviate new costs.

Freshman Chris Young, who smokes one to one-and-a-half packs a day, said he plans on switching to cheaper foreign cigarettes if domestic costs rise as much as expected. The

For Kentucky tobacco farmers, a smaller demand for domestic cigarettes could cost them anywhere from \$40 to \$70 million, according to Will Snell, an agriculture economist at UK and an adviser to burley advocates. Snell was out of his office for the week and could not be reached for comment. Because the deal applies only to tobacco markets inside the United States, foreign sales would be unaffected.

While international markets might alleviate on of the diminishing domestic demand, the Kentucky Tobacco Research Board is also researching alternative uses for the tobacco leaf. During the meeting, Tom Little, former director for the Council for Burley Tobacco, discussed a board-funded research project that varies from popular alternative research. "Hundreds of relatively pure chemical extracts ... from leaves of fresh tobacco" have potential pharmaceutical value, Little said. This project aims to discover "(chemicals) in tobacco plants which contain no nicotine but act (like it)."

Study says college students lacking calcium

As college freshmen adjust to their new "home away from home," many develop new eating habits.

A recent survey revealed that milk is the number one beverage which students stop drinking when they leave home.

Less than 30 percent of college-age men and women report drinking milk regularly, and those who do, on average, drink only one-half the recommended daily amount.

The National Institute of Health recommends college-age men and women consume at least 1,200-1,500 mg of calcium each day.

Drinking at least three eight-ounce glasses of milk will help meet this daily calcium requirement.

When students leave milk at home with mom and dad, many fill the gap with soda.

J.D. Perkins, a music education freshman, said when he lived at home, he normally drank four glasses of milk a day. "Now I normally drink three to four carbonated beverages and hardly any milk," he said.

Many health experts are disturbed by

bonated beverages and hardly any milk," he said.

Many health experts are disturbed by the trend of college students drinking soda instead of milk because people need milk during their college years.

Although many students do not grow taller after they start college, bone growth occurs until age 30.

Milk and dairy products provide 75 percent of the calcium available in food. It is unlikely that students will get enough of this bone-building mineral without milk in their diex.

"Too often, college-age men and women don't think before they drink," said Susan Barr, a nutrition professor at the University of British Columbia. "They're trading nutrient-dense beverages, like milk, for nutrient-vaarnt ones, like soda and coffee, at school." "Trading milk for soda or coffee may have a bone draining 'effect." Barr said. "Excess consumption of caffeine, found in beverages like soda and coffee, as well as a high sodium intake, can cause your body to lose calcium," Barr said. "In fact, a high-soffeine, high-sodium diet may actually increase your calcium requirements."

Studies show that three in 10 college students gain weight when they leave home.

The extra calories tend to sneak on

The extra calories tend to sneak on during late-night cramming sessions or whenever students eat on the run.

Health experts are encouraging students to drink a glass of fat free milk instead of a soda or potato chips.

A glass of fat free milk has 80 calories. Other food items with just 80 calories include: eight potato chips, one and a half cupcakes, one-third of a milk chocolate bar and seven sips of beer.

"I don't drink as much milk as I did when I lived at home," Heather Combs, a music education freshman said.

"But since I have been at school I have begun to eat more milk products, like grilled cheese sandwiches."

'Lovesongs' marks start of solo career

In the personal dictionary of the music industry, allegiance is no where to be found. The industry is similar to professional sports because from year to year, you rarely see the same guys with the same groups. Tanya Donelly is one of those pricey free agents who has dritted from team to team before finally finding a home. After successful stints with Throwing Muses, the Breeders and Belly, Donelly's newest team is without reammates. Her unmistakable voice and pop savy took the solo route with the debut album Lovening for Underslog.

The talented singer, songwriter and guitar player makes her first appearance on the music scene since Belly's disappointing sophomore effort, King.

The result is an extremely enjoyable listen that challenges Star as the best work of her career.

"Pretty Deep," the first single off the album, starts things in vintage Belly form with a guitar-driven chorus occasionally slowing down to highlight Donelly's unique singing talents.

The first five songs are delivered without dull moments, each showing a bit of experi-



t's survival of the fittest and UK students are on the verge of extinction. A recent report has confirmed what students have known for years: ampus recreation opportunities are prehistoric. The report also finds that UK is below average

The report also finds that UK is below averages in seven of eight indoor categories and in six of nine outdoor categories when compared to similar benchmark universities. Even Western Kentucky University is light years ahead of UK thanks to a donation from an alumni who wanted students to have a place of their own.

On the property of the problem is UK does not have a modern facility that's sole mission is to serve a large student body with a variety of recreational needs. Instead, we have students competing with classes, the Wellness Program and athletic teams for time and space in one building. There simply is not enough room or time in the day for each to have satisfactory use of the center.

Not that Campus Recreation is ignorant of the situation or doesn't want to do anything about it. Rather, it just doesn't have the money to make things right. It might surprise students to know that no money is specifically earmarked from tuition or

fees to fund the department. Instead, the University makes a meager allotment of \$401,496-a-year to Camus Recreation. Compare that to the \$2 million comparable schools spend.

In part, the spending disparity is the result of significant student fees at our benchmark schools that often help pay for new and renovated buildings. Ultimately the fate of future facilities may depend on the willingness of students to fork over an additional \$20, \$40 or even \$50 a semester. Students who already pay local gyms \$20 or more monthly may not mind, but other students could be resistant to paying for facilities they may have no interest in using. In the end, we may simply need to wish upon a star for that special donor who flies in to save the day with a substantial donnation to get the ball rolling on a new center.

Perhaps the administration will wake up to the real needs of students and put a new facility on the fast track with a beefed up budget. Not only would students be dancing in the streets but such a project would go a long way towards improving UK's dismal student retention rate: A rate which has publicly been a major concern of this administration.


