Hazing Was Ordeal In Patterson's Reign

Disaffection is being expressed in various quarters over the methods used by fraternities and campus organizations in hazing their pledges. But compared to the ordeal of hazing that students underwent during President Patterson's reign, these groups have their pledges with kid gloves.

An example of what a "green" student could expect in those days occurred when one upper classman represented themselves as officers and sent a freshman to guard a fish pond. They told the freshman this was necessary to protect the rear from the "enemy." All night long on the hour, the faithful freshman could be heard shouting, "All is well at the fish pond!"

An incident which turned out to be a phenomenal hoax almost disrupted the University.

On the night of Sept. 22, 1908, Willis Smith, freshman, disappeared. The next day when Smith failed to appear, his brother became alarmed and reported the case to University and city officials.

Matter Not Taken Seriously
Having been the victims of so many student pranks, city officials failed to take the matter seriously. The faculty accepted the general opinion that Smith was being held by hazers and appealed to the students to release him.

There was no scarcity of theories and clues, most of which originated with cranks who delighted in muddying the waters.

Award To Be Given For Copyright Essay

Competition for the annual Nathan Burkan Memorial Award for the best essay on Copyright Law was announced this week in the College of Law. Prof. Paul Ober is in charge of the competition.

The contest, which continues until Aug. 31, offers prizes of \$150 and \$50 for the two best essays on some phase of Copyright Law. The announcement is made early to allow for preparation, study, and research.

UK law students have competed for the honor since the contest was begun in 1938. Gerald R. Griffin, now a first lieutenant in the Air Force, was last year's winner.

Sponsored by the American Society of Composers, Authors, and Publishers among law schools throughout the country in honor of one of its founders, a noted copyright lawyer, the awards are made available for the best two papers submitted on the subject in each of the nation's law schools. From those winners the national "sponsor" selects the best five papers which are printed in a book entitled "The Copyright Law Symposium." Initial judging in the contest is left to the dean of each of the law schools which enter the contest.

"Recognizing your striking ability as a journalist and your devoted application of this talent to a vital Air Force program, I express my earnest commendation and gratitude," said General White.

Tilley Tallies Line Coach Carnie Lasie Leaving UK; Cats Will Be Giving Height Advantage In First Round Of NCAA Tourney Play

Carnie Lasie is leaving Kentucky. The man highly responsible for the great Wildcat lines for the past six years has accepted the assistant position at the Military Academy at West Point.

Lasie will begin his new duties Monday when the Cadets open spring drills.

Rumors have been alive for the past week which indicated the soft spoken and mild mannered North Carolina native and Alabama graduate would leave UK.

Army, in the midst of a re-building program resulting from the cribbing scandal last summer, selected Lasie over a number of applicants. The job is known as one of the highest paid assistantships in the country.

The silver-haired mentor, obviously sentimental over severing relations with Coach Bear Bryant and the University said, "Bryant is the greatest boss one could ever have. The friends I have at the University are the kind you can never forget. I'd like to stay here for the rest of my life but this offer is one you can't overlook."

The departure of Lasie leaves Edna Allen as the only original member of the coaching staff Bryant formulated when he came to Kentucky in 1946.

Captain Bobby Watson and his basketball mates will be hand-capped by a height advantage in the opening round of NCAA play tonight. Coach Adolph Rupp will be sending his charges against the disadvantage he drinks most right off the bat.

The short man listed on the 12-man Penn State roster stands an even six feet. He is Hardy Williams, co-captain. The tallest man on the roster is the other co-captain, Jay MacMahon, who stretches to 6-7.

The hot shot of the Penn State club is Jesse Arnelte, freshman center. Arnelte stands 6-5, weighs 218, and is only 19 years old. In 24 games, the New Rochelle, N. Y. flash threw in 448 points for a new school record. That averages 18.7 points per game. The game average is also a school record. Arnelte scored 40 points against Georgetown to set another Penn State record.

Following Arnelte in the point-getting department is Herb Slezdek with 92 per game, Williams, 49, MacMahon, 64, and John Sherry, 66.

Penn State has averaged 66.5 points per game while holding their opponents to a 54.2 average.

The most impressive wins of the season were victories over the strong West Virginia quintet, Penn State downed the Mountaineers by scores of 61-60 and 67-61.

The highest single game total racked up by the Pennsylvanians was 89 against Dickinson.

Statistically, Kentucky has an edge. The Wildcats averaged 83.2 points per game in 30 games while their opponents were held to 55.2. The opponents were the century mark three times, the highest single game total being 116 points against Mississippi at Owensboro.

Three players, Cliff Hagan, Frank Ramsey, and Watson, have averages in double figures. Hagan leads with 21.7, followed by Ramsey with 16.1, and Watson, 13.8.

Coach Seaton Expects Strong Distance Field

All out practice has been on the agenda for the UK track squad this week.

Optimism was written all over Coach Seaton's face as he mused over the chances of his charges in the forthcoming season.

He said this year's distance field will be the strongest since the late 1930's when Dave Rogan, and Ben Willis were coveting on the UK tracks. Both set records, most of them yet unequaled in the history of UK and SEC track.

Rogan set a record in the 880 of 1:54 which was only five seconds off the world record of 1:49 set by Sidney Wooderson in 1938. Another UK record, still in the books, is the 4:13.3 set in 1937 in the mile run. And still another is the UK record of 10:41.4 for the two-mile run also set by Rogan. The first two marks are recognized by the SEC.

Willis set a mark of 2:14 in the 200 in 1936. This time was only one second off the world's record set by Jesse Owens, famed Olympic sprinter, one year previously. In the 32 squad will have only four letters on the roster. (Wallace Price, Wiley and Richel) but none are seniors and all will be back next year.

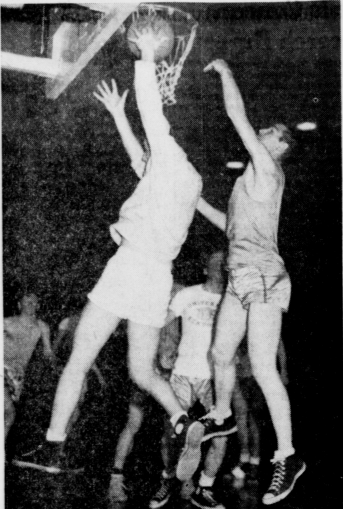

Bill McCubbin Burning Candle At Both Ends While Serving As Play Director At Kentucky

For the last eight years, William E. McCubbin, intramural director, has burned his candle at both ends to let Kentucky students get a maximum of enjoyment from "playing the game for fun."

Besides carrying a full load of instruction hours in the Department of Physical Education, McCubbin spends his free hours in mapping the course of coming intramural events. Almost any night during the week will find "Mac" in and around Alumni Gym until nearly 12 o'clock.

It wouldn't be true to say that McCubbin doesn't have enough things to worry him; things that make the "sleeting rough" at times. In fact, about the only thing apparent to provide him with enjoyment is the fun the students derive from playing the game.

The intramural program at Kentucky is financed by entrance fees for the various sports. Each participant in the individual sports, and each group taking part in the team sports must post a small sum to qualify for entrance.

Another, and perhaps more important, obstacle is the lack of space in fields and courts on which to run the program. One small field, located behind the Student Union, is made to suffice for a great variety of purposes, including almost all of the football and softball games.

Sports events require complete officiation, says McCubbin, but referees and umpires are hard to get for intramurals, especially experienced ones. He has only praise for the referees who do work the I-M games, but the pay doesn't attract enough of them.

Equipment for the program is bought from the small entrance fees for the sports, which must also pay

for referees and trophies. Even a small increase in income for intramurals would help greatly, McCubbin stated. In the case of last year's swimming meet, the fees were insufficient for renting the University pool.

With all of the restrictions on the program, figures compiled for 1950-51 show that over 1,000 matches were played in the various sports, involving a total participation of 3,025 persons. This includes the largest part in more than one sport, but does not count WAA.

Intramurals embrace 19 separate phases of athletics. Included on the fall agenda are touch football, tennis singles and doubles, volleyball, ping pong singles, the Turkey Run, a swimming meet, and the free snow contest.

McCubbin found that basketball tips the largest number of entrants, polling over 300 University men. He said that the state-wide reputation for basketball in Kentucky probably had a great deal to do with this popularity.

Louisville was the site for the beginning of McCubbin's athletic career, where he played football for the duPont Manual Citizens. He entered Kentucky in '36, tipping the scales at 135. During his stay at the University, in which he gained about 10 pounds every year, McCubbin played end on the football team and pitched for two seasons on the baseball team.

McCubbin graduated in the class of end coach under A. D. Kirwan, present Dean of Students, and worked toward a masters degree in education. In the spring of '41, Mac joined the Air Corps.

After a try at flight school, McCubbin switched to the bombardiers. He trained at San Antonio and Albuquerque, N. M., and was awarded the gold bars of a second lieutenant.

McCubbin served in the Pacific theatre and was a member of one of the first Yank units to try against the Japanese from Australia.

Wrestling Weigh-Ins Start At 3 Today

Intra-mural Director Bill McCubbin said he expects about 100 entrants in the events.

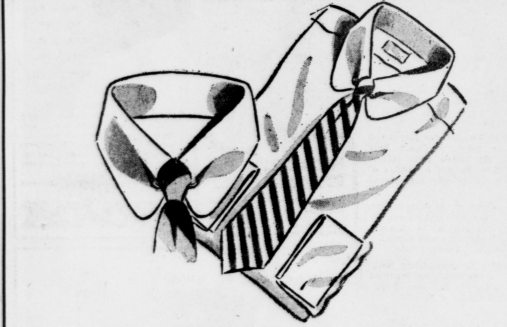
