

UK voted education innovators

PC Week sizes up competition, Big Blue comes out on top as the nation's measuring stick for computer technologies

you have each semester isn't going to waste? PC Week has named UK as one of the top 100 innovators in government and education.

the top 100 innovators in government and education.

Jeff Moad, assistant editor of the magazine, said this means of all the educational and government institutions they looked at, UK is one of the top innovators in using new computer technologies.

"It's nice to be recognized," said Gene Williams, vice president for Information Systems." I'm very pleased."

Williams said UK employs a state-oft-the-art technology strategy.

"We want to be prepared for anything." Williams said UK has been aggressive about investing in computer labs and networks. UK implemented its technology fee with the idea that none of the computers

or software in the labs would ever be more than two or three years old, and that none of it would be obsolete.

The two main reasons he thought UK had been put on the top one hundred list were its networking capabilities and the computer labs in the new library. Williams said.

"For a long time, our strength has been networking," Williams said. 'I think we're comparable to any institution, and better than most.'

Stephanie Neal, also of PC Week, said the magazine teamed up with Ziff Davis Junishing empire, which also publishes PC Week.

Market Intelligence maintains a database of the technology used at more than 300,000 educational, corporate, private and government sites.

PC Week created a model that award-

ed points for using cutting edge technolo-gies and applied it to sites in state and federal governments and higher educa-tion. The model was plugged into the Ziff Davis Market Intelligence database to get

the results.

"We're shooting for innovation," said Moad, who helped develop the judging criteria. "If a site was doing one of the things we were looking for, they would get a point."

Moad said the magazine tended to favor Internet-based technology.

A few of the criteria were the num-ber of web servers, Internet and elec-tronic commerce applications, the speed of Internet servers and the use of Java to create applications.

Milosevic offers 'concessions'

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia — Slobodan Milosevic said yesterday that NATO air strikes must stop before peace talks over Kosovo can resume. A statement from Milosevic's office, read on state TV after the president had six hours of talks with Russian Prime Minister Yeygeny Primakov, said Milosevic would reduce his forces in Kosovo and allow refugees to return if NATO halts its assault. But the allies rejected calling off the air strikes, with President Clinton saying NATO "must remain steady and determined." Meanwhile, air raid sirens sounded in Belgrade and at least four other cities.

WASHINGTON — NATO's air assault on Yugoslavia is far from accomplishing its goals but the alliance is pressing ahead with an intensified targeting of Serb troop concentrations in Kosovo, U.S. officials said yesterday, To step up NATO's attacks, five Air Force B-I long-range bombers were headed for Europe to Join the B-32 bombers already in use. The B-Is are armed with gravity bombs and cluster munitions that are likely to be used against staging areas of Serb millitary forces in Kosovo, officials said. President Clinton said NATO was solidly behind the strategy of diminishing Yugoslavia's military capacity.

Jury awards \$81M in lawsuit

PORTLAND, Ore. — In the biggest liability verdict ever against the tobacco industry, a jury ordered Philip Morris to pay \$81 million to the family of a man who died of lung cancer after smoking Mariboros for four decades. The victory by Jesse Williams' family was the second major hit against Philip Morris this year. A San Francisco jury awarded \$15 million last month to a smoker who has inoperable lung cancer, Although no smoking liability verdict against the tobacco industry has survived on appeal, Wall Street analysts had been watching the Portland case closely to see if huge damage awards against Big Tobacco were now a trend. LITTLE ROCK, Ark. — A federal judge ruled yesterday that a Virginia woman can testify about her alleged mistreatment by Kenneth Starr's office, dealing a setback to Starr's case against Susan McDougal. The decision by U.S. District Judge George Howard came after McDougal lawyer Mark Geragos depicted Julie Hiatt Steele as a victim of Starr's investigation of President Clinton. Ms. Steele will testify at Mrs. McDougal's trial Friday. Mrs. McDougal refused to give grand jury testimony in Starr's probe of the Clintons in 1996 and

WASHINGTON — Federal Reserve policy-makers left short-term interest rates un-changed yesterday.

The central bank's monetary policy panel
— the Federal Open Market Committee — end-ed a closed-door meeting by signaling it had left the benchmark rate on overnight loans between banks at 4.75 percent. It's been at that level, a four-year low, since Nov. 17.

NEW YORK — The Dow industrials retreated from 10,000 in mixed trading yesterday with Coca-Cola dropping sharply on a disappointing sales forecast. The Dow closed at 9,913.26, down 93.52. On the NYSE, losers led gainers 1,716-1,276. The NASDAQ fell 12.55 to 2,480.29.

She said she does not think either of her daughters were sexually abused.

"You think there couldn't be any safer place to leave your children than at a church. This is just horrible," Jennings said.

Nude games plan sent

Committee recommends putting strict standards in place to enforce prohibition

DISTRIBUTION N.J. — The Committee on the Nude Olympics submitted recommendations to President Shapiro Monday afternoon that include plans for apprehending runners and for creating an "extraordinary" disciplinary process to enforce the event's prohibition, according to a draft of the report. — The Nude Olympics recommends to the President and the Board of the Nude Olympics recommends to the President and the Board of the Nude Olympics resonance of the Nude Olympics resonance of the Nude Olympics of the Nude Olympics or that circulated among committee members for final approvial tate last week. — The draft calls for a one-year suspension from the University for "any activity that is deemed an attempt to perpetuate the nude olympics" or "behavior that in the past had been associated with the nude olympics."

Dean of Student Life Janina Montero said the committee attempted to make descriptions of the ban flexible to end the olympics, no matter what form the event may take.

"I would say that the committee wrestled with that for some time," Montero said "We are not going to be able to predict, in any way that makes sense, what (the Nude Olympics) might look like in the future without seeing it. We would have to see what happens."

According to the commit-tee's proposal, Montero will re-view cases of alleged participa-tion in future instances of the Nude Olympics.





Cornell U. professor sued for academic misconduct

Angry that her work was plagiarized, prof takes to the legal system against university


The Academic Rights Committee

The Academic Rights Committee, in conjunction with Jason Johnson, Executive Director of Academic Affairs for SGA, serves to expound students' interests before administrators and faculty. This year proves to be an exciting time for undergraduates, rich in opportunity to shape our future curriculum through the President's Initiative on Undergraduate Education (www.uky.edu/UGS/Init/prospect.html). In light of UK's vision to become a top 20 research institution, the University has presented its Strategic Plan. Within this document are several specific indicators, which enhance directly the stature and importance of undergraduate education (www.uky.edu/Pubs/StrategicPlan/indicators.html). The Academic Rights Committee is working with the University Senate Council, in addition to other key administrators and faculty to elevate students' educational experience by embodying the University's Mission and Values.

Environmental Concerns Committee

Acting as the chair for the SGA environmental concerns committee has given me the opportunity to not only utilize the skills I have obtained through my course of study, but also to explore the environmental problems and possibilities on UK's campus. Though our membership has been small, the committee has managed to get quite a bit accomplished. Last semester's focus was placed mainly on revamping UK's recycling program through repeated visits with the program's director and attendance at a recycling conference in North Carolina. This semester, we have helped to co-sponsor a forum with the Appalachian Student Council on the Black Mountain mining issue. In accordance with this, the environmental concerns committee hopes to organize a group to attend the hearing in Harlan, Kentucky on April 6th to declare lands on Kentucky's highest peak unsuitable for continued mining. Our committee has also been working with the environmental organization Green Thumb to collaborate for the Earth Day festival which will be held on the 17th of April at the Arboretum. The festival will display a variety of workshops on environmental issues and opportunities available in the community, nature walks, and a performance by Louisville based band, JavaMen. Earth Day events will also feature a forum addressing the issue of sustainability on UK's campus. The forum will feature several UK professors, as well as a representative from the Nature Conservancy. By working with other student organizations and expanding our capability for campus influence, the environmental concerns committee hopes to bring both awareness and change to UK.

The Community Service Committee



How has SGA been "The Advocate" for

Students this year?

Presented the proposal for a new campus recreation center to more than 25 organizations, including residence halls, club sports, sororities, fraternities, and others. Because of the 90% of students who favored a \$50 or less fee increase started after the facility opened, we have persuaded Pres. Wethington to fund architectural planning to start construction. He has also agreed to make the rec center top priority on the list of requests to the state of the capital construction not supported by general fund.

Provided an avenue to the administration to propose that the university provide free health insurance for all graduate students funded full-time as TAs, RAs, and Fellows, which UK has agreed to cover starting next fall. This health benefits package would cost about \$500 per student.

Organized student protest against city council's proposal to limit the number of non-related residents to three in an off-campus house. Almost 1500 attended the rally on POT plaza, and 200 marched downtown to speak in opposition. The strong student reaction and comments led the council to withdraw the proposal and to establish a committee that included students to develop solutions.

Researched the problem of the 28 parking spaces for disabled students, faculty, and staff that will be destroyed due to construction of mechanical engineering building. SGA adopted a resolution to forward to UK administrators asking that an equal number of similarly adequate spaces be located.


Persuaded the UK Registrar to make summer advising phone-lines in first floor of Whitehall classroom building available for students' free use all year long.

Developed ideas and gave student input on the President's Initiative on Undergraduate Education over several months. Many SGA members helped prioritize these recommendations which make learning more effective, including have small seminar classes for all freshmen, and a information resource center where students can call or visit to avoid being given the run-around.

Surveyed the students in Residence Halls and on-campus apartments to find out what percentage favor a proposal to add two unlimited internet access and cable TV outlets per room for a \$20 per month fee increase to each student living in on campus. We had a relatively high response rate (900 students) with more than 75% in support of the increase. Concern was expressed to the president regarding the extra costs of ethernet cards and installation fee for students and he said UK could cover this cost.

Fought for residents of the German House not to be required to move out in the middle of the school year due to UK and the city condemning it. After a few phone calls, administrators agreed to allow the students to stay until this summer due to their year-long scholarships and their limited housing budget.


