





General Orders, No. 2.

May 30th, 1888, will mark the twentieth annual recurrence of Memorial Day; a day set apart by the people of a renewed and perpetuated Union in remembrance of those who, in life, offered all in defense of national integrity and honor. Although originally introduced by the Grand Army of the Republic as a means of strengthening and preserving the fraternal ties incident to our union of purpose and effort in a noble cause, the beautiful ceremonial born of our comradeship has been so widely adopted by the loyal hearts of the land, that Memorial Day has become a great national festival, in which tender memories and patriotic purposes rule the hour.

The spirit and customs of our Order impose upon all Comrades the duty of participating in the public recognition of the day. So far as practicable the usual vocations will be suspended, and the occasion marked by some appropriate observance. Though legally a holiday in this Department, it is to be jealously guarded from all appearance of merry making, and from all forms of frivo-

lous or undignified behavior. Let it not be forgotten that our Comrades dead were earnest, manly men, who voluntarily faced death for a cause worthy of the sacrifice.

Wherever practicable, Posts are directed to attend divine worship in bodies, on the Sabbath preceding Memorial Day. The clergy are invited to facilitate such attendance, and to so order the service of the day as to promote general public interest in the coming anniversary. Let all known graves of the men who fought for the Union, on land or sea, be marked by the pure blossoms of spring, which in all tongues speak the language of gratitude and love. Let the people be assembled for special memorial services, where eloquence and song shall unite to teach and exemplify the duties and rewards of patriotism; and so may "the better angels of our nature," touching "the tender cords of our memory, which stretch from every battle-field and patriot grave to every living heart and hearthstone all over this broad land," so swell the chorus of the Union that no discord shall ever again mar its glorious harmonies.

General Orders, No. 3.

I. The Department Commander is compelled to appeal to Post Commanders, Adjutants and Quartermasters, to exercise the greatest care in the matter of making out reports.

Read carefully the Rules and Regulations on this subject, and note that Posts (see Art. 13, page 24) are required on the first days of January, April, July and October, to report to these Headquarters, and that the Assistant Adjutant, and Assistant Quartermaster Generals are required to consolidate these reports and forward to National Headquarters by the 20th of January, April, July and October. This is rendered impossible by the carelessness and neglect of some of the Post Officers, while other officers are commendably prompt and accurate. Why can not the Post Commander, Adjutant and Quartermaster of every Post make up this report on the last meeting night in December, March, June and September?

This action on your part would enable us to make our returns regularly, and allow our reports to reach the National Headquarters promptly, in place of at the tail end of the last day of grace.

II. The Quartermaster should enter on the line marked "Balance last Report," the actual cash on hand, and this must be the same as what he reported. If he was in error at last report, let him correct by including the difference in "Receipts," if he had more cash than reported, and in "Disbursements," if he had less. Add to this "Balance," the "Receipts from all Sources," and carry forward on line marked "Total."

In disbursements show all expenditures, and extend on the first "Total" line. Add to this amount all cash on hand, and in vested in collaterals, and extend on the second "Total" line, and the amount there extended must equal the "Total" in receipts.

Make the same careful entry of your "Relief Fund," and be sure to enumerate the value of Post Property; being guided in this by your "Cash Balance," and the value of property on last report, with the addition of any purchases since.

When satisfied that your work is correct, make a check payable to S. T. Jack, Assistant Quartermaster General, for the amount of Per Capita Tax due the Department, at ten cents on each member in good standing, and hand this check and report to the Commander of the Post.

III. The Adjutant of the Post will enter on the "Muster Roll" only the names of those mustered in during the current quarter, and under the head "Gained from Suspended or Dropped," the names of Comrades thus gained.

"Losses during the Quarter" should show all the losses, and in the "Recapitulation of Muster Roll," be careful to start with the same number you reported on hand at last report. To this add all gains from all sources, and foot in "Aggregate" line.

Show all losses from all causes, and deduct "Total Loss" from "Aggregate," and this will leave your "Number in Good Standing."

The numbers "Remaining Suspended on Last Report" must be entered accurately, as also those "Remaining Suspended this Date," and those "Dropped, who were previously suspended."

Note the amount "Expended in Charity," and the "Number of Persons Relieved," as from this source alone is made up our report to National Headquarters of the charity work of the Grand Army of the Republic.

When all of this is completed, see that no errors have been made, and hand your report to the Commander.

Let no Commander be satisfied with any reports that are not promptly and correctly made out and signed by himself, and he will deserve and receive the hearty thanks of these Headquarters.

CIRCULAR, No. 1.

For the information of all concerned, the following announcement is made by the Committee on Headquarters, Transportation and Badges:

The Headquarters of the Department Commander and his Staff during the Encampment Week will be located in the southeast corner of the Capital Building, Columbus, Ohio, where an admirable room, amply sufficient for this purpose, has been placed at our disposal by courtesy of the officers of the State.

The Wm. Nelson Post Drill Corps, and the F. C. Miller Drum Corps, of Newport, have established Headquarters at the Council Chamber in Columbus, and will act as escort to the Department Commander and Staff during the Encampment Week.

The Department train will start on Monday evening, September 10th.

The meeting of the National Encampment will be held in the Metropolitan Opera House, which has been engaged for that purpose.

The entire city is being canvassed for the Encampment, at fixed prices of meals and lodgings for the officers and delegates, and such other Comrades of the Grand Army as may not desire to sojourn at the hotels, or go into camp. The price of meals in pri-

vate families and boarding houses is 25, 35 and 50 cents per meal, and of lodging, 50 cents per day.

It is very desirable that all applications for private accommo dations, both for Officers and Comrades of the Grand Army, and for ladies of the Relief Corps, should be made by June 10, or earlier if possible, stating the kind of accommodations wanted, and the number of persons to be accommodated. This is of the utmost importance, as there will be an enormous attendance at Columbus, and we must know whom we are to provide for; and be sure to indicate how many ladies will be in your party, and whether cots or beds must be provided.

Admirable grounds for camping purposes have been engaged, sufficient for this Department. The grounds lie within easy reach of the Central Railway Station, and are near the State Capital, where all the headquarters will be. This arrangement will spare the Comrades the fatigue and inconvenience of traveling long distances to find each other, or to visit the headquarters of their respective Departments.

A large number of halls have been engaged for the use of such organizations as may desire to hire them for reunion, lodging, or other purposes. Organizations desiring to have hall reserved for them should apply at once.

The tents will be pitched ready for occupation, and will be provided with straw for bedding, and wood and water for camp use, all free from charge. The camps will be illuminated all night with electric light, and will be thoroughly drained and policed, and will be arranged with suitable platforms and open spaces where openair campfires may be held.

All Comrades intending to go into camp are earnestly enjoined to bring with them a sufficiency of blankets, but no other baggage when it can be avoided, which may not readily be carried in the hand.

Extensive dining halls will be erected at the large camps, where good meals will be furnished at a moderate price. There will also be numerous public dining halls throughout the city for general accommodation.

The railways have agreed to issue tickets to all persons attending the Twenty-second National Encampment at the rate of one cent per mile, going and returning, based upon the shortest railway distance.

The Grand Parade of the Grand Army of the Republic will

take place on Tuesday, September 11, and the National Encampment will begin its session at the Metropolitan Opera House on Wednesday, September 12. Further particulars as to the programme for the week will be communicated to the Grand Army in due time.

The National Meeting of the Woman's Relief Corps will be held in the Second Presbyterian Church, beginning on Wednesday, September 12. Arrangements will be made by which the ladies attending the meeting as officers or delegates may have a noon lunch served to them near the Church, thus saving their time, and greatly facilitating the transaction of their business.

The Headquarters of the Department of Kentucky, Woman's Relief Corps, will be located in the Chapel of the First Presbyterian Church, on Third near State Street, opposite the place of meeting of the National Convention.

Post Commanders are respectfully requested to give this circular prompt and thorough publicity in their respective Posts.

All communications should be addressed to these Headquarters, Covington, Kentucky.

We urge upon all Comrades who are to visit Columbus, a careful perusal of this announcement—and do not fail to report to these Headquarters not later than June 10, 1888.

CIRCULAR, No. 2.

I. Owing to the awakened interest in Kentucky among old soldiers who have not yet joined the Grand Army of the Republic, and to answer the many inquiries addressed to us, the Department Commander takes great pleasure in giving the following information, and appealing to the ex-union soldiers of this State to organize Posts in every county.

At the beginning of my administration there were fifty counties in which there were no Posts, and it would indeed be a proud day for me, and a glorious day for the Grand Army of the Republic, if I could say to my successor, there is a Post in every county;

no county left in Kentucky without a rallying point for loyalty to cluster around and teach patriotism to the coming generation.

Will all the Comrades assist me in this noble work?

OBJECTS.

- II. The objects to be accomplished by this organization are—
- (1.) To preserve and strengthen those kind and fraternal feelings which bind together the soldiers, sailors, and marines who united to suppress the late Rebellion, and to perpetuate the memory and history of the dead.
- (2.) To assist such former Comrades in arms as need help and protection, and to extend needful aid to the widows and orphans of those who have fallen.
- (3.) To maintain true allegiance to the United States of America, based upon a paramount respect for, and fidelity to its Constitution and Laws; to discountenance whatever tends to weaken loyalty, incites to insurrection, treason or rebellion, or in any manner impairs the efficiency and permanency of our free institutions, and to encourage the spread of universal liberty, equal rights and justice to all men.

ELIGIBILITY TO MEMBERSHIP.

III. Soldiers and Sailors of the United States Army, Navy, or Marine Corps, who served between April 12th, 1861, and April 9th, 1865, in the war for the suppression of the Rebellion, and those having been honorably discharged therefrom after such service, and of such State Regiments as were called into active service and subject to the orders of United States General Officers between the dates mentioned, shall be eligible to membership in the Grand Army of the Republic. No person shall be eligible to membership who has at any time borne arms against the United States.

FORMATION OF POSTS.

IV. (1.) A Post may be formed by the authority of the Department Commander, on application in writing, signed by not less than ten persons eligible to membership in the Grand Army of the Republic; and no Post shall be recognized by the Grand Army of the Republic unless acting under a legal and unforfeited charter.

OFFICERS.

(2.) The officers of each Post shall be a Post Commander, a Senior Vice Post Commander, a Junior Vice Post Commander, an

Adjutant, a Quartermaster, a Surgeon, a Chaplain, an Officer of the Day, an Officer of the Guard, a Sergeant-Major, and a Quartermaster-Sergeant.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

(3.) The Post Officers (except the Adjutant, who is appointed by the Commander, and the Sergeant-Major and Quartermaster-Sergeant) shall be elected by ballot—unless a ballot be dispensed with by unanimous consent—and they shall be installed in their respective offices by the Mustering Officer, in accordance with the form laid down in the Service-Book.

BLANK APPLICATIONS.

V. Blank Applications for the formation of Posts will be furnished from these Headquarters, and when returned, signed by at least ten eligible recruits, and a fee of fifteen dollars to cover expenses of Charter, a Department Officer will be sent to muster and instruct the new Post, without additional expense, as the Department pays the traveling expenses of the Mustering Officer.

SUPPLIES

VI. The least possible supplies a new Post can get along with at the time of muster-in, amounts to two dollars and twenty cents (\$2.20), and it is best for that amount to accompany the Charterfee, making the total cost seventeen dollars and twenty cents (\$17.20).

MUSTERING OFFICER'S INSTRUCTIONS.

- VII. The Mustering Officer will proceed as follows:
- (1.) Ascertain that all the recruits are eligible to membership by the examination of their discharges or certificates, and ascertain from the Acting Quartermaster or Treasurer, that all present have paid the required fees.
- (2.) The obligation can then be given to all, and the officers elected and installed.
- (3.) The officers will then be required, with the Mustering Officer's assistance, to open the Post in due form, and go through the business as laid down in the Ritual. One of the newly made Comrades can apply for membership as a recruit, and thus have the entire work exemplified, including the muster-in of a recruit, with the charges and the unwritten work.
 - (4.) Be careful to instruct the new Post in the proper forma-

tion of the lines at opening, during muster-in, and at closing; the posting of the Guards, and the position of the Officer of the Day during the progress of the ballot, namely: three paces to the left of the altar, and facing the Post Commander.

(5.) Remember that on the thoroughness of your work depends to a great extent the success of the new Post; and do not hesitate to tell the boys all you know about our Order. It will do them good to hear it, and you will be a better Grand Army man for giving the information.

(6.) Take with great care the names of the members, with Company, Regiment, Rank, &c.; the names of the officers, and the name that is selected for the Post, and forward the same to the Department Headquarters, with the statement of your expenses, and a draft will at once be sent to you for the same.

VIII. The Charter will not be sent out until the names of the Charter Members have been received from the Mustering Officer, and only the names of those who were mustered in at the time of organization of Post will appear in the Charter. In the selection of the name of the Post, remember that you should do honor to Kentucky, and if possible select the name of some dead soldier of your county.

IX. As this circular is destined to reach the soldiers outside of the Grand Army of the Republic, I will say in conclusion, that our Order rests on the three great principles of Fraternity, Charity, and Loyalty; a Fraternity that was born of trials and dangers in camp and in battle, and that follows our Comrades through life and unto death; a Charity that leads us to the noblest sacrifices for the de-titute and needy families of our Comrades in arms; and a Loyalty that will never cease to be watchful of our flag and coun try, nor fail to do honor to both the dead and living heroes of that supreme struggle which settled forever that this country should be one and indivisible, welded together under God's all-seeing eye in the fire of battle into one great brotherhood, that will stand to gether though the whole world assail.

II. I. For the convenience of the Comrades from the interior of the State, the Department Headquarters Special Train will leave the Pan Handle Depot, Corner Pearl and Butler Streets, Cincinnati, on Monday, September 10th, at 1 o'clock P.M., and all Posts, Delegations and Comrades are earnestly requested to reach Cincinnati in time to go on this train.

II. The Headquarters of the Department Commander and his Staff will be in the S. E. corner of the Capitol Building, in the office of Inspector of Workshops and Factories.

A Department of Kentucky Encampment Badge will be issued September 10th and 11th, by Assistant Quartermaster General S. T. Jack, to the Commander, Adjutant or Quartermaster of each Post, for every Comrade of his Post in Columbus on the day of the Grand Parade, September 11th, and Mrs. Cora Davis, Treasurer of the Woman's Relief Corps, Department of Kentucky, will receive one for each member of the Order from Kentucky, in Columbus during Encampment week.

III. The Headquarters for the Delegates and Alternates will be at the Arlington Hotel, on South High Street, and Comrades desiring rooms can be accommodated there at two dollars per day. Comrades who have not yet secured rooms will notify us at once.

IV. Lodgings for one hundred and fifty Comrades have been secured at corner Main and High Streets, with F. H. Sells, at fifty cents per night, and meals can be had in the immediate neighborhood, at fifty cents per meal.

V. Tents for five hundred Comrades have been assigned to this Department, in Section 5, Dennison Camp, which is on Neil Avenue, just West of Goodale Park, one third of a mile Northwest of Union Depot. Capt. Thomas Jeffrey is the commandant of this Camp.

All Comrades intending to go into Camp, must bring with them a sufficiency of blankets and a cup. Straw for bedding and wood and water for Camp use are all free of charge. Take Neil Avenue (Green) Cars at Union Depot.

VI. All the Railroads in Kentucky have agreed to sell tickets

from all points, at the rate of one cent a mile each way, and the fare by Steamboat from Maysville to Cincinnati and return, is \$2.50. From points above Maysville, the fare is \$3.00.

VII. The ladies of the Woman's Relief Corps, Department of Kentucky, have been assigned to Mrs. M. E. Harris, 236 East Town Street, and they will on arrival go immediately to her residence.

Rates, \$2.00 per day.

Comrades accompanied by ladies can be assigned to Camp Hayden, where especial arrangements have been made for them. No ladies can be accommodated in other Camps. Col. E. J. Pocock is the commandant. Long Street line of Cars go to North side, and Oak Street Cars within one block on South side of Camp.

VIII. The Wm. Nelson Post and Drill Corps and the F. C. Miller Drum Corps, of Newport, have established Headquarters at the Council Chamber in Columbus, and the Geo. H. Thomas and W. A. Whitaker Posts, of Louisville, have their Headquarters at Enoch Lodge of Perfection Rooms, in Carpenter Block. 121 East Town Street.

We send with this order the Blank Reports for the Officers of the Posts, in this Department, to fill out for the quarter ending, September 30; and, as the Delegates to the next Department Encampment will be chosen on the basis of these Reports, we hope a great effort will be made to get all the Comrades to pay up their dues, and thus help to make the best possible showing for Kentucky.

II. We also send herewith "Instructions for Officers," and ask that it be read in Posts, and that some Comrade inquire why such instructions have to be sent out from these Headquarters.

In answer to that we want nine-tenths of the Commanders to be honest enough to say that they never as yet looked at the Reports to see whether they were correct; never cared to ask whether they were sent off; never signed them, and really did not know enough to tell whether the Reports were made out according to the Rules and Regulations.

We want the Adjutant to say he fails to write in the names of the Officers—the time or place of meeting—never shows correctly how many members he had at last Report—nor the gains, nor losses during the quarter, and sends the Report off without knowing whether it will agree with the Quartermaster's, and without the Commander's signature.

The Quartermaster can then say that he never starts his Report with the same balance that he showed at last Report, and that no rule of addition nor subtraction would ever leave such a balance on hand as he claims he has; that he never thinks to tell whether the Post has any property of any kind on hand; and that he does not show his Report to either the Commander or Adjutant, lest they might by some possibility find some of his errors.

After this we hope some Comrade will request all such Officers to resign, as they never ought to have been elected, and should never be allowed to obtain the honors of Past Officers.

III. Owing to the existing confusion as to the rights of members in arrears for dues, we quote from the Rules and Regulations (Chap. V. Art. IV.): that any member who is six months in arrears in the payment of dues, shall be notified in writing by the Quartermaster, and, if he does not pay within two months thereafter, he may be suspended from all privileges of membership by vote of Post, until such dues are paid, and shall be so reported in quarterly report to Department Headquarters, and when one year in arrears, he shall be notified in writing, and on failure to pay within two months, he may, by vote of Post, be dropped from the rolls.

Post Officers will see, for example, that as dues are assessed and payable in advance, a member who has not paid for the Quarters beginning in January and April, *shall* be notified on April 1st that he is six months in arrears, and then if he does not pay by June 1st, he *can* be suspended by vote of Post and be so reported to the Department on June 30.

On October 1st, he shall be notified that he is one year in arrears, and then if he does not pay by December 1st, he can be dropped by vote of Post and be so reported to Department, December 31st.

IV. We can but congratulate the Comrades of Kentucky for the splendid work they are doing in increasing the membership of the Grand Army, and a continuance in that same helpful spirit will still further advance our Department to the position that is ours by reason of the thousands of soldiers living within our borders. We appeal to our Comrades to never rest till every soldier has been mustered into our ranks, or has given a satisfactory excuse for not belonging to our organization.

If you can not see all those you know, personally, then write to them wherever they are, to join the nearest Post, or take the necessary steps to establish one in their own town.

We have over forty counties in Kentucky in which there are no Posts, and at least twenty thousand soldiers who have not yet joined us, and we must make a strong and grand effort to get them to come in and help us in this work we have undertaken of Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty.

V. We request Comrades who know of soldiers living where there are no Posts to send their names and addresses to these Headquarters, and we will appeal to them to at once attempt to awaken all the soldiers they know to the importance of being members of the Grand Army of the Republic, and to once more stand shoulder to shoulder, arm touching arm, in our march to the front, with hearts warmed by the glorious Comradeship which comes of knowing that we stand, five hundred thousand strong, pledged to our Comrades, our flag, and the widows and orphans of those who died that the nation might live.

VI. At the National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, held at Columbus, Ohio, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Encampment that the time has come when the soldiers and sailors of the war for the preservation of the Union should receive the substantial and merited recognition of this government, by granting them service pensions. And further,—

Resolved, That this Encampment favors the presentation to Congress of a bill which shall give to every soldier or sailor who served the United States between April, 1861, and July, 1865, for a period of sixty days or more, a service pension of \$8 a month, and to those whose service exceeded 800 days, an additional pension of one cent per day per month for service in excess of that period.

Your Committee also earnestly recommend the preparation of a bill placing the widows of Union soldiers and mariners on the pension list, without regard to the time of service, or the cause of the soldier's death.

Your Committee further report that we do not withdraw our

DEPARTMENT COMMANDER'S ADDRESS.

The Senior Vice Department Commander took the chair, and the Department Commander read his address, which was as follows:

COMRADES:

NE year ago, at Maysville, when you elected me your Department Commander, I said that I would take up the burden that Comrade Bowman had laid down, and try to carry it as creditably as he had done.

At that time it looked to me as a burden, but so many helpful hands all over the Department came to my aid that there was no burden left for me to bear; and in looking back now it seems a pleasant and happy year spent amongst you, and in rejoicing with you that the Grand Army was still progressing in Kentucky.

The growth of our Order during the year will be fully set forth by the reports of the officers of my staff; but I might add that during the year we have reclaimed nearly one-half of the counties in which we had no Posts, and I confidently expect that my successor will not rest till he has established a Grand Army Post in every county in the State.

FINANCES.

Our finances are in a very good condition, and we would have had a larger cash balance at this time except that we felt it our duty at Columbus, Ohio, to make a more extensive display than we would have done only that it was "Ohio's Centennial Year."

INSPECTION.

We have had but one Inspection this year, and the Reports of Comrade O'Riley will show you that our Department is making creditable progress in all that appertains to drill, equipment, and organization.

PENSIONS.

At our Maysville Encampment our Department indorsed the "Disability Pension Bill," and our delegation were instructed to press it upon the National Encampment; but in the intervening months my own convictions in this matter underwent a total change, and when called upon at Columbus to decide what my Department was in favor of, I stated what you had done, but that many of you had since changed your minds, and that I thought the only honorable thing for the Grand Army of the Republic to advocate was a Service Pension Bill. I am still of this opinion, and hope you will adopt suitable resolutions favoring the bill advocated by the National Encampment.

COLUMBUS ENCAMPMENT.

The Encampment at Columbus was the most largely attended of any, and Kentucky was creditably represented, having over three hundred men in line. The William Nelson Post, and F. C. Miller Drum Corps, of Newport, and the George H. Thomas Post, of Louisville, deserves the thanks of every G.:A.:R.: Comrade for the splendid display they made on the day of the parade, and the manner in which they conducted themselves throughout the week.

MEMORIAL DAY.

At no time during our history was such a marked respect given to the observance of the sacred duties imposed on us by the customs of Memorial Day. Much of this is no doubt due to the fact that Comrade Hillis had secured the passage of the bill making the day a Legal Holiday; and much of it to the feeling that we are all nearing the other side, and our hearts go out more and more to those who are at rest.

PROCEEDINGS.

I recommend that steps be taken to have the Proceedings of this Encampment printed.

the year 1888 printed, and a contract was made with Hawthorn, Hill & Co., for the work, but after an expenditure of over fifty dollars, the firm made an assignment. It was then so late in the season, and we had already been to so much expense that, with the consent of the Council of Administration, we decided to do nothing further in the matter.

SALARIES.

To avoid the delay in settling the expenses of the Department for each quarter, I recommend that the salary of the Assistant Adjutant General be forty dollars per quarter, and that of the Assistant Quartermaster General be thirty five dollars per quarter for the ensuing year, as this is the same amount allowed them during this year by the Council of Administration.

This of course is no adequate compensation for the work they have done, as they have spent at least three evenings each week during the entire year at Headquarters, and more than three thousand letters have been written, besides all the General Orders, Circulars and Reports that have been sent out.

CHATTANOOGA NATIONAL CEMETERY.

We learn that nearly five hundred Kentucky soldiers are buried at the National Cemetery at Chattanooga, and recommend that five hundred flags be sent there by this Department for use on the graves of our dead who are buried there.

WOMAN'S RELIEF CORPS AND SONS OF VETERANS.

We are sorry to note that neither the Woman's Relief Corps nor the Sons of Veterans have the growth in our Department this year that they should have had.

These organizations can be of such service to us that we hope every Comrade whose Post has not these auxiliary aids will secure them at once. We need them to carry forward our work, for with us the night cometh quickly, and our work is nearly done.

CONCLUSION.

In conclusion I wish to thank all my Comrades for the splendid work they have done for the G.:A.:R.: this year; whatever success I have had is due to their willing hands. I can not designate you all by name, but I can not do less than to say of Comrades Newton, Jack, and Chiesman, that there were never three Staff Officers in any Department who worked more faithfully than they have done, and they have thair reward in the success that has crowned our administration.

I thank you all, Comrades, for your treatment of me, and hope that the richest blessings of this life may be yours, and that in dying you may hear the approving sentence, "Well done thou good and faithful servants."

ASSISTANT ADJUTANT GENERAL'S REPORT.

To O. A. REYNOLDS, Commander Dep. of Ky., G.: A.: R.::

Comrade—I have the honor to submit my report of the work of the office of the Assistant Adjutant General, for the year ending April 24, 1889.

On assuming the duties of this office I found, per the reports of March 31, 1888, that there were eighty-seven Posts on the rolls of the Department.

Post No. 88 had been mustered, but the report of the Mustering Officer did not reach us till after the first of May; and Post No. 58 had been carried on the Quarterly Report of December 31, 1887, as in good standing, although no per capita tax had been paid, and I had to show them as delinquent in reports of March 31, when they should have been suspended.

Forty-two Posts have been mustered and reported, and the forty-third was mustered April 20, but no report has been received from the Mustering Officer. Two Posts have been re-mustered, and nine reinstated.

I wish to call the attention of the officers of the various Posts to the matter of making out, promptly and accurately, the Quarterly Reports.

A large number of you do this, and I wish to say to all such, that I appreciate the faithfulness with which you have attended to your duties as Post officers, and had all done the same, the work of this office would have been materially lessened.

About one-third of the officers always neglect to forward their reports on time, and that necessitates the writing of forty to fifty letters; and I think if they could realize the annoyance and extra work that they cause at Headquarters, it would cause them to be more prompt in the future.

If the time that I have spent in appealing to them to attend to their duties had been given to looking after new Posts, our gains might have been much larger during the year.

CONCLUSION.

I wish to return thanks to all the officers of the Department for the uniform courtesy and kindness with which I have at all times been treated.

And to you, Commander, with whom the Assistant Quartermaster General and myself have been so intimately associated during the past year, with whom we have sat around the Headquarter's table night after night in the performance of the duties of our positions, I wish to say, that no one except ourselves will ever know the amount of time that you have given to the building up of the G.:A.:R.:, in the Department of Kentucky. None except ourselves knows the amount of midnight oil that has burned, nor the interest that you have taken in all the details of the work.

You are leaving behind you, as a monument of your labor, forty-five charters of Posts with your name attached; and in years to come, when our numbers are growing small instead of increasing, when old age has come upon us, or we have answered to the last Roll-Call, the Comrades that are left will look at their Post Charter and talk of the time of their muster-in, and your name will not be forgotten until the last Post has been mustered for the last time on earth, and has joined the great majority in the great camping ground of Heaven.



REPORT OF DEPARTMENT INSPECTOR.

W. A. NEWTON, Assistant Adjutant General:

Comrade—In General Orders announcing the Staff of the Department Commander, I was named as the Inspector of the Department of Kentucky. In accepting this office I have tried to bring to the discharge of its duties my best energies, and beg leave to submit the following report:

In compliance with General Orders, recommendations were sent to the Inspector for the position of Assistant Inspectors from the Post Commanders. In compliance with the wishes thus expressed, and from personal knowledge and other recommendations, the Inspector made up a list of Inspectors who were appointed by the Department Commander on the recommendation of the Inspector. Some months passed after the appointment of the Assistant Inspectors before an order came from National Headquarters for the inspection of the Department. This was caused from the fact that the National Encampment being held in September, and the appointment of the Inspector General was made at later date, thus throwing the National order for inspection into the closing months of this administration. As soon as the order was received, all haste was made to get the blanks into the hands of the Assistant

Inspectors, who received them with instructions to make the inspections and report by March 31st. The Assistant Inspectors responded to the emergency, and the Inspector is indebted to their energy for the fact that he is able to present reports from most of the Posts of the Department. I note the following facts:

First—A very large increase of membership and of Posts.

Second—Increased interest in the work and ritual, and many officers have memorized the work, and great enthusiasm on the subject of uniforms, whole Posts uniforming who have never considered the subject before.

Third—I found increased interest among the members, and more members are regular in attendance at Post meetings than ever

before.

Fourth—I find the orders regularly received and read to Posts. and obeyed.

Fifth-I find in only a few of the Posts a Relief Fund.

Sixth—As to the prospects I have found the most unbounded enthusiasm in the work of the Grand Army, and the future of the G.: A.: R.:, for the Department, never was more promising than now.

Resolved, That we are in favor and heartily approve of the measure known as the "Robinson Ex-Prisoner's War Bill," (as amended), now pending in Congress, the principle provisions of which are to pay every Union Soldier who was confined in Southern Prison Pens thirty days or more, \$2.00 per day, for each and every day so confined—this (now) wealthy Government cannot "square

books" with her defenders until this meritorious class are compensated, to some extent, for the untold suffering and heroic sacrifice they endured and made to keep 60,000 Confederates in prison and off of the battle line—therefore, we ask and shall expect our Senators and Representatives in the 51st Congress, to use their influence and votes to secure the enactment of this just law.

Resolved, That our Adjutant General be requested to place a copy of this and all resolutions adopted by this Encampment in regard to legislation effecting Old Soldiers' interest. in the hands of some one member of the Kentucky delegation to the 51st Congress.

A vote of thanks was given to the Comrades of William Nelson, and James A. Garfield Posts, for their entertainment of the Department Encampment.


PRINTING OF THE JOURNAL.
