Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, Tuesday, April 10, 1984.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met at 2 p.m. (Eastern Standard Time) on Tuesday, April 10, 1984 in the Board Room on the 18th floor of the Patterson Office Tower on the Lexington Campus.

# A. Meeting Opened and Roll Called

Mr. William B. Sturgill, Chairman, called the meeting to order at 2:05 p.m., and the invocation was pronounced by Mr. T. A. Lassetter.

The following members of the Board of Trustees answered the call of the roll: Mr. William B. Sturgill (Chairman), Mr. William R. Black, Mr. David T. Bradford, Professor Timothy A. Cantrell, Governor Albert Benjamin Chandler (Honorary Trustee), Mr. Albert G. Clay, Mr. George W. Griffin, Jr., Mr. R. Larry Jones, Professor James D. Kemp, Mr. T. A. Lassetter, Mr. W. Bruce Lunsford, Mr. Robert T. McCowan, Mr. Frank Ramsey, Jr., Mr. Bobby Watson, and Professor Constance P. Wilson. Absent from the meeting were Mr. Thomas P. Bell, Mr. Tracy Farmer, Mr. Ronald G. Geary, Mrs. Edythe Jones Hayes, Mr. Brereton C. Jones, and Mr. A. Stevens Miles. The University administration was represented by President Otis A. Singletary; Mr. James O. King, Vice President for Administration; Chancellors Peter P. Bosomworth and Charles T. Wethington; Mr. David I. Carter, Associate Vice President for Business Services; Mr. Edward A. Carter, Associate Vice President for Planning and Budget; Mr. John C. Darsie, General Counsel; Mr. Henry Clay Owen, Controller and Treasurer; and Dr. Paul G. Sears. Special Assistant for Academic Affairs.

Members of the various news media were also in attendance. The Secretary reported a quorum present, and the Chairman declared the meeting officially open for the conduct of business at 2:08 p.m.

#### B. Minutes Approved

The Minutes of the March 6, 1984 meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees were approved as written.

# C. President's Report to the Trustees (PR 1)

President Singletary reviewed briefly some of the items in his monthly report to the Trustees, calling particular attention to (1) the recipients of the 1984 University of Kentucky Alumni Association Great Teacher Awards: Professors Dibakar Bhattacharyya (College of Engineering), Joseph L. Fink, III (College of Pharmacy), Daniel L. Fulks (College of Business and Economics), and Mike Zalampas (Jefferson Community College, Southwest); (2) the gift from Mr. John R. Gaines to help launch a new humanities center; (3) the 43 National Merit Semi-Finalists who have announced their intentions of entering the University of Kentucky in the Fall of 1984; and (4) the number of patents attributed to the research efforts of Professor Anwar Hussain, College of Pharmacy, which last year returned \$75,000 in license fees to the University and this year is expected to return more than \$100,000.

He also called attention to the Hecht S. Lackey, Sr. Administration Building which was dedicated at Henderson on March 19, and reported that he had received a letter from Mrs. Lackey thanking the members of the Board for naming the building for her husband.

President Singletary recommended that the report be received and filed. Without objection, it was so ordered.

# D. Professor Constance P. Wilson Reelected to the Board

President Singletary indicated his pleasure in announcing Professor Constance P. Wilson's reelection to the Board of Trustees for a three-year term ending June 30, 1987. He congratulated Professor Wilson, and Mr. Sturgill welcomed her to another term of office on the Board.

# E. Mr. David T. Bradford Honored

President Singletary also indicated his pleasure in reporting that Mr. David Bradford received the Outstanding Senior Male Award at the Honors and Recognition Program on April 8.

# F. Kentucky Kernel Receives Honors

President Singletary also called attention to the honors recently awarded the <u>Kentucky Kernel</u> by the Kentucky Intercollegiate Press Association: Special Projects Editor John Voskuhl received a first-place award in investigative reporting; Editor-in-Chief Andrew Oppmann received second-place honors in continuing news; and Day Editor Robbie Kaiser was awarded second place in personality profile. The <u>Kernel's</u> design was presented second-place honors for front-page design and layout, and Artist J. Tim Hays received third place for original story illustration.

#### G. Personnel Actions (PR 2)

After noting that the personnel actions in PR 2 were routine in nature, President Singletary recommended its approval. On motion by Mr. Black and second by Mr. Jones, the appointments and staff changes recommended in PR 2 were approved. (See PR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

#### H. Acceptance of Gift from Mr. John R. Gaines (PR 3A-1)

President Singletary noted it was with much pleasure that he recommended the Board formally accept the gift of \$500,000 from John R. and Joan B. Gaines to endow the Gaines Fellowships in the Humanities. Professor Wilson so moved. Her motion was seconded by Mr. Clay and passed unanimously. (See PR 3A-1 at the end of the Minutes.)

# I. Acceptance of Gift from the Estate of Gertrude B. Robinson (PR 3A-2)

President Singletary also indicated his pleasure in recommending that the Board accept the gift of \$469,264.89 as partial settlement of the Estate of Gertrude B. Robinson. This gift, per the instruction in Mrs. Robinson's will, is "for the purpose of establishing and endowing the Earl Parker Robinson Chair in Engineering. The area of Engineering to which this chair shall apply shall be designated by the Dean of the College of Engineering in conjunction with the President of the University." On motion made by Professor Wilson, seconded by Mr. Clay, and passed unanimously, the Board accepted the gift from the Estate of Gertrude B. Robinson as recommended in PR 3A-2. (See PR 3A-2 at the end of the Minutes.)

# J. 1983-84 Budget Revisions (PR 3B)

Mr. Watson moved that the 1983-84 budget revisions recommended in PR 3B be authorized and approved. His motion was seconded by Mr. Griffin and passed without dissent. (See PR 3B at the end of the Minutes.)

# K. Proposed Amendments to the Governing Regulations (PR 3C)

With President Singletary so recommending, Professor Wilson moved approval of the proposed amendments to the Governing Regulations in PR 3C. Her motion was seconded by Mr. Jones and passed without dissent. (See PR 3C at the end of the Minutes.)

#### L. University Research Professorships (PR 3D)

President Singletary said it was with much pleasure that he was recommending approval of four University Research Professorships for 1984-85 to be awarded to Professor Lance Banning, Department of History; Professor Richard R. Clayton, Department of Sociology; Professor Robert E. Rhoads, Department of Biochemistry; and Professor Thomas L. Roszman, Department of Medical Microbiology and Immunology, in recognition of their outstanding research achievements. He reminded the Board that the first Research Professorships were awarded in 1977.

Following introduction of the four recipients by President Singletary, Professor Kemp moved approval. His motion was seconded by Professor Cantrell and passed unanimously. (See PR 3D at the end of the Minutes.)

#### M. Honorary Degree Recipients (PR 3E)

President Singletary recommended that approval be granted to awarding the honorary degree of Doctor of Letters to Dr. Carl B. Cone and Mr. William S. Monroe; the Doctor of Science to Dr. F. Story Musgrave; and the Doctor of Laws to Mr. Warren W. Rosenthal. The Committee on Honorary Degrees has recommended to the Graduate Faculty and the University Senate that these honorary degrees be awarded, and these two bodies have expressed their approval of the recommendation. On motion made by Mr. Ramsey, seconded by Mr. Lunsford, and passed unanimously, approval was granted for the awarding of the honorary degrees as recommended in PR 3E. (See PR 3E at the end of the Minutes.)

# N. Naming of University Building (PR 5A)

On motion made by Mr. Clay, seconded by Professor Kemp, and passed, approval was given to the name of AGRICULTURAL MACHINERY RESEARCH LABORATORY for the new Agricultural Engineering research facility. (See PR 5A at the end of the Minutes.)

#### O. Name Change of Educational Unit (PR 5B)

With President Singletary so recommending, Mr. Black moved a change in name of the James W. Martin Graduate Center for Public Administration to the James W. Martin School of Public Administration. Mr. Black's motion was seconded by Mr. Jones and passed unanimously.

Mr. Sturgill recognized Dr. James W. Martin and thanked him for attending the meeting. Governor Chandler praised Dr. Martin for his help in running State Government during Governor Chandler's terms of office as Governor of Kentucky, and expressed his profound gratitude for his monumental contributions to the Commonwealth. Dr. Martin responded by expressing his thanks to Governor Chandler and by extending best wishes to Governor Chandler and his family. Dr. Martin was given a round of applause. (See PR 5B at the end of the Minutes.)

## P. Naming of University Building (PR 6A)

Actng on President Singletary's recommendation, Mr. Bradford moved that the new building for the College of Pharmacy be named the COLLEGE OF PHARMACY BUILDING. His motion was seconded by Mr. McCowan and passed without dissent. (See PR 6A at the end of the Minutes.)

# Q. Amendment of Bylaws, Medical Staff, University Hospital (PR 6B)

President Singletary recommended that the amendment of the Bylaws of the Medical Staff, University Hospital, in PR 6B be approved. Professor Kemp so moved. His motion was seconded by Mr. Lassetter and passed unanimously. (See PR 6B at the end of the Minutes.)

# R. <u>Interim Financial Report (FCR 1)</u>

Mr. Clay, Chairman of the Finance Committee, reported that the Committee had met on the morning of April 10 and considered three routine items to be presented for action, the first of which was the interim financial report for the eight months ended February 29, 1984. The Committee found the University to be "on target," and Mr. Clay moved acceptance of the report. His motion, seconded by Mr. McCowan, carried and the financial report was accepted. (See FCR 1 at the end of the Minutes.)

# S. <u>Disposal of Personal Property (FCR 2)</u>

With the concurrence of the Finance Committee, Mr. Clay moved that the Board approve the disposal of personal property as recommended in FCR 2. His motion was seconded by Mr. Griffin and passed without dissent. (See FCR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

# T. <u>Delegation Authorizing the Treasurer to Approve</u> Documents Relating to Donor Life Insurance Policies (FCR 3)

The Finance Committee so recommending, Mr. Clay moved that the Treasurer be authorized to sign and execute appropriate documents related to donor life insurance policies, and that the Treasurer also be authorized to surrender life insurance policies for cash value and direct reinvestment in a new replacement policy upon request of the donor as recommended in FCR 3. Mr. Clay's motion was seconded by Mr. Black and passed without dissent. (See FCR 3 at the end of the Minutes.)

# U. Amendment of Code of Student Conduct (SCCR 1)

Mr. Griffin, Chairman of the Student Code Committee, reported that the Committee had met on the morning of April 10 and considered the proposed revisions in the Code of Student Conduct. He added that Mr. Bradford, who is a member of the Committee, is also a member of the Advisory Committee on Student Code Revision, a committee composed of faculty, administrators, and students. Mr. Bradford indicated there was no opposition to the suggested revisions and stated that he heartily supports the proposed amendment.

The Student Code Committee so recommending, Mr. Griffin moved adoption of the proposed revisions to the Code of Student Conduct. Mr. Griffin's motion was seconded by Mr. Bradford and passed unanimously. (See SCCR 1 at the end of the Minutes.)

# V. Meeting Adjourned

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 2:32 p.m.

# Acceptance of Gift from Mr. John R. Gaines

Recommendation: that the Board of Trustees formally accept the gift of \$500,000 from John R. and Joan B. Gaines to endow the Gaines Fellowships in the Humanities.

Background: This gift, from Joan B. and John R. Gaines, will endow the Gaines Fellowships in the Humanities. #### Proposed Amendments to the Governing Regulations

Recommendation: that the following proposed amendments to the Governing Regulations of the University of Kentucky (March 1983), which were received by the Board of Trustees for preliminary consideration at its December 1983 meeting, be approved.

(Proposed additions are underlined; proposed deletions are bracketed.)

# First Amendment - Change Part IV, ninth paragraph, to read:

The President shall be the chairman of the Senate and shall be the presiding officer except as the President may delegate this function. The Dean of Admissions and Registrar shall serve as ex officio secretary. A member of the [voting] University faculty (not necessarily a member of the Senate), appointed by the Senate Council, shall serve as parliamentarian. The two sergeants-at-arms appointed by the Senate Council, shall be [a] members of the [voting] University faculty [who is not a member of the Senate] and/or staff.

Rationale: This amendment has been recommended by the University Senate to provide more flexibility in appointing the parliamentarian and the two sergeants-at-arms of the University Senate.

Second Amendment - Change Part X.A, second paragraph, to read:

Members of the Board of Trustees, except those elected to the Board as faculty representatives or as a student representative. and relatives by blood or marriage of any member of the Board of Trustees are ineligible for appointment to any position in the University. No relative by blood or marriage of the President or [the] any vice president[s exercising University-wide jurisdiction7 shall be employed in a position [which carries responsibility for a part of the academic program of ] at the University. Similarly, no relative of a chancellor or any vice chancellor in a sector shall be employed in a position in that Waiver of the above regulation may be permitted by the Board of Trustees on a stated temporary basis, not to exceed two years, when it is otherwise impossible practicably to fill a position with a fully qualified person. The same individual shall not be eligible for reappointment under the terms of this exception unless approval is given by the Board of Trustees. No relative by blood or marriage of any administrative officer of the University, or of any member of the University faculty  $\angle$  holding the rank of associate professor or higher, may be appointed to any position in the University over which the related officer or staff member exercises supervisory or line authority. Employment of persons related by blood or marriage the same department or division shall be approved specifically by the President chancellor in a sector or the Vice President for Administration in the Central Administration. as appropriate. "Relatives by blood or marriage," as used above, includes parents and children, husbands and wives, brothers and sisters, brothers- and sisters-in-law, mothers- and fathers-in-law, uncles, aunts, nieces and nephews, and step-relatives in the same relationships. The employment of relatives by blood or marriage whose relationship was not a violation of this section of the Governing Regulations prior to its amendment on April 10, 1984, does not constitute a violation of the amended policy provided the relatives are regular employees of the University and remain in the University employment positions which they held on April 10, 1984. However, the transfer of any such employees (whose employment relationship was not a violation of policy prior to its amendment on April 10, 1984) to any other regular University position shall require approval of the President.

Rationale: This amendment incorporates needed changes in policy on appointments related to modifications in University organization and administrative titles implemented on or after July 1, 1982. The preceding version of this amendment dated December 13, 1983, is now viewed as being too broadly encompassing, i.e., it included many administrative staff officers who more appropriately should be subject to the less

restrictive anti-nepotism regulations contained in the University of Kentucky Staff Personnel Policy and Procedure Manual. The principle that no relative by blood or marriage of any faculty member may be appointed to any position in the University over which the faculty member has supervisory or line authority should be independent of the academic rank held by the faculty member. The specific approval of employment of persons related by blood or marriage in the same department or division by a chancellor or the Vice President for Administration rather than by the president is consistent with the decentralization of certain authorities and responsibilities which was a major objective of the recent reorganization of the University. The last two new sentences in this paragraph are designed to provide a reasonable transition from previous policy to the amended policy.

Third Amendment - Add a new Part XII.B to read as follows:

It is the policy of the University of Kentucky that sexual harassment of students, faculty, and staff is prohibited. Complaints of sexual harassment will be treated and investigated with full regard for the University's due process requirements. Definitions and procedures relative to handling complaints of sexual harassment are provided in the Administrative Regulations (AR II-1.1-9).

Rationale: This policy on sexual harassment was approved by the Board of Trustees on March 1, 1983. At that time, in the background material for the recommendation to adopt the policy statement, it was stated that steps would be taken to include this umbrella policy statement in the Governing Regulations of the University of Kentucky.

Fourth Amendment - Renumber Parts XII.B through XII.G as Parts XII.C through XII.H, respectively.

Rationale: This renumbering is necessary if a new Part XII.B is added and the existing Parts XII.B through XII.G are retained.

#### UNIVERSITY RESEARCH PROFESSORSHIPS

The purpose of the University Research Professorships is to enhance and encourage scholarly research productivity, provide an opportunity for concentrated research effort for selected faculty members, recognize outstanding research achievement by members of its faculty, emphasize its research function, and to publicize its research accomplishments in order that the research function of the University be appropriately recognized and understood.

## Carl B. Cone

Dr. Carl B. Cone, professor emeritus of history, compiled a distinguished record of scholarship, teaching, and university and professional service during his 34 years at the University of Kentucky.

He received his B.A., M.A., and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Iowa, completing this work in 1940. He taught at Louisiana State University before joining the University of Kentucky History Department in 1947.

His books and articles have established him as one of the leading scholars in the field of British history. His two volumes on Edmund Burke are especially well recognized. He served in a wide variety of professional organizations and on major editorial boards. He has continued research and writing since his retirement. In 1981 the University Press of Kentucky published his book on sports and sportsmen in the early nineteenth century in England.

Within the History Department, he served a term as chairman and for many years as director of graduate studies, directed the work of many Ph.D. candidates, and served on innumerable graduate committees. His contributions to the graduate program were recognized when he won the Sang Award in 1968.

His contributions within the University can be measured not only by the number of councils and committees on which he served but by the quality of that service. His good judgment, dependability, and commitment to academic principles are well known to those who served with him.

In honoring Carl Cone's lifetime of service to the University we are recognizing both his tangible accomplishments as scholar and teacher and his intangible contributions to his colleagues and students and to this institution.

Doctor of Letters

#### William S. Monroe

William S. "Bill" Monroe has the unchallenged title as the "father of bluegrass music." He has developed and preserved a style of music which is recognized as distinctive throughout the nation and the world and which incorporates the authentic sounds of traditional country music.

Bluegrass music has been described as "a pure form of country music." Monroe has called it "the old Southern sound that was heard many, many years ago in the backwoods, at country dances." Monroe has been called a "tradition-bearer," capable of creating tunes that are at once traditional and original. One writer has described his accomplishment as "the dynamic fusing of seemingly disparate traditions into a coherent, subtle, wholly personal body of music."

Bill Monroe was born in Ohio County in the Pennyroyal region of Kentucky in 1911, and has been a performer since childhood. It was during the 1930s that he began to develop his own style of bluegrass music, and he has been playing it ever since. He stubbornly resisted commercial pressures to change his style, and in the last few years has been rewarded by the popular rediscovery of authentic bluegrass music. As one writer has said, "His musical gospel was powerful enough to establish a new genre in country music and to attract thousands of disciples."

The widespread bluegrass music festivals across the country testify to the enduring quality and growing appreciation of his music. He has recently been the subject of scholarly studies, including an essay in the Kenyon Review and a chapter in a book published by the University of Illinois Press.

It is appropriate that this University, in the heart of the bluegrass, recognize the father of bluegrass music for his musicianship and his commitment to preserve and enhance the traditional music of this region.

Doctor of Letters

#### F. Story Musgrave

Dr. Story Musgrave, a surgeon, physiologist, mathematician, teacher, researcher, pilot, and astronaut (among other things), is the twentieth century equivalent of the renaissance man.

He has undergraduate degrees in mathematics and in chemistry, a masters degree in operations analysis and computer programming, a masters degree in physiology and biophysics from the University of Kentucky, and a doctorate in medicine from Columbia University. He has flown more than one hundred types of civilian and military aircraft, and is an experienced parachutist.

In 1967 he was selected as a scientist astronaut by NASA. During his years with NASA, he helped to develop the sky lab, and participated in the planning of the space shuttle extravehicular activity. In April 1983, he was the mission specialist on the maiden voyage of the space shuttle Challenger, during which he conducted experiments, and took part in the space walk.

From 1964 to 1967 he was at the University of Kentucky Medical Center serving a surgical internship, and serving as a post-doctoral fellow in the fields of aerospace medicine and physiology. Since that time he has been an active member of the voluntary faculty, returning frequently to the campus to lecture and to present seminars.

Story Musgrave is a native of Massachusetts, an adopted Kentuckian, and a citizen of the world. His work has epitomized the growing importance of scientific research in the NASA program. He has explored new frontiers in both space and medical research, and has returned to Kentucky to explain what he has learned to both professionals and lay people.

The University honors him as a man of learning and of action, a man of great breadth in an age of specialization. It honors him for the accomplishments that are known to the world and for his continuing contributions to this University.

Doctor of Science

### Warren W. Rosenthal

Warren W. Rosenthal is best known in this state for his twenty-five years of experience at the helm of Jerrico, which he built from a few shops into one of the largest food-service franchising companies in the country. He is now chairman of the board after retiring as president. He has also been one of the leaders of restaurant and franchising organizations at the state and national level.

His accomplishments in the business world have been matched by a wide range of civic activities in Kentucky and particularly in Lexington. He has a long record of active service in such organizations as the Junior Achievement and the Boys Scouts of America. He is a life member of the Board of Curators of Transylvania University, was instrumental in establishing a School of Hotel and Restaurant Management there, and has been awarded an honorary degree by Transylvania University.

Warren Rosenthal, a 1947 graduate of the University of Kentucky, has served this university in many ways. He became a UK Fellow in 1970 and was elected to the Development Council in 1973, where he serves on the Board of Directors. He has worked closely with the College of Business and Economics in its fund-raising activities, and serves on the UK Business Partnership Foundation.

The University honors Mr. Rosenthal as an outstanding business leader, whose activities on behalf of this community and especially this University have been extensive and often unpublicized.

# AMENDMENT OF BYLAWS, MEDICAL STAFF UNIVERSITY HOSPITAL

Recommendation: that Article VIII, Section 2, d, 1 of the Bylaws of the Medical Staff, University Hospital, be amended to read:

NOTE: Addition underlined; deletion in brackets [].

"d. Automatic Suspension

Automatic suspension may be imposed upon a Medical Staff member by the Associate Dean for Clinical Affairs whenever:

1. The Medical Staff member, after receipt of a warning of delinquency for failure to complete medical records within [15] days 24 hours of patient's discharge (See Part 2, Rules Regulations, Medical Records) fails to complete the records. Such automatic suspension shall be temporary and effective until the records are complete and need not be followed by a written request for corrective action. Notification of the automatic suspension must be made in writing to the Medical Staff member, the relevant department chairman (Chief of Clinical Service) and the Hospital Director."

<u>Background</u>: This change was approved by the Hospital Clinical Board and the Council of Supervisors, University Hospital, in order to bring University Hospital into compliance with State requirements.

### <u>Delegation Authorizing the Treasurer to Approve</u> <u>Documents Relating to Donor Life Insurance Policies</u>

Recommendation: that the Treasurer be authorized to sign and execute appropriate documents related to donor life insurance policies; further, that the Treasurer be authorized to surrender life insurance policies for cash value and direct reinvestment in a new replacement policy upon request of the donor.

Background: Donor gifts to the University of Kentucky include life insurance policies wherein the University is designated as beneficiary and owner. The donor is the insured and pays the annual premium directly to the insurance company. As owner and beneficiary the University is required to sign and execute certain documents, including requests for surrender of policy and applications.

Donors sometimes request permission from the University to replace an existing life insurance policy with one more favorable to either the University or to the donor. University policy for replacement requires that the face value and cash surrender value of the replacement policy be the same amount, or higher, of the original policy. The University, as owner, must yield the original policy for cash value and authorize the reinvestment of the proceeds in the replacement policy.

## AMENDMENT OF CODE OF STUDENT CONDUCT

<u>Recommendation</u>: that the Board of Trustees approve the attached suggested revisions of Article I, The University Judicial System, in the Code of Student Conduct, effective August 16, 1984.

Background: Under Article VII - Amendment, only the Board of Trustees may amend the Code of Student Conduct. Responsibility for proposing revisions to the Code of Student Conduct is delegated to a committee consisting of students, faculty, and administrators. The committee accepts and reviews recommendations from students, faculty, and administrators regarding revisions and forwards them to the President for presentation to the Board of Trustees for its consideration. The Article also provides that the President may propose changes without reference to the committee.

As in past years, the committee solicited proposals for Code revision from members of the University community via The Kernel. Only the attached three proposals were received, pertaining to Article I - all from the Office of Dean of Students. After preliminary consideration and endorsement of the proposals, they were published in The Kernel with an invitation to comment on the proposals. Having received no negative comments, the committee then endorsed and submitted the proposals to the President for his consideration and forwarding to the Board of Trustees.

The proposed revisions were approved by the President, and they were forwarded to the Board of Trustees Student Code Committee.

#### PROPOSALS FROM STUDENT CODE REVISION COMMITTEE

Pertaining to Disciplinary Offenses

Article I - The University Judicial System

Section 1.2 Disciplinary Offenses

Subsection 1.21 Offenses as defined below are punishable disciplinary offenses.

It is proposed that the following revisions be made in the offenses listed in Subsection 1.21:

"Stealing any item of tangible or intangible [personal] <u>public or private</u> property upon University property."

(Material to be deleted is within brackets; material to be addded is underlined.)

Proposal #2: That the following item be added to 1.21:

"Possessing stolen property upon University property."

Proposal #3: That the following item be added to 1.21:

"Possessing a firearm on University property without authorization of the Dean of Students."

It is also recommended that the editorial task of reordering and relettering the offenses in 1.21 be assigned to the Dean of Students.
