Roselle won't release names involved in NCAA allegations

UK President David Roselle did not re-lease to the public the full text of the NCAA Supplemental Official Inquiry in order to protect the privacy of individuals involved.

Roselle said he would guess there are more than ten' people named in connection with violations of NCAA rules.

Park, who read the letter to the media Saturday afternoon, advised Roselle that releasing the names "may possibly consti-tute a clearly unwarranted invasion of per-sonal privacy."

... The University obligation to protect the privacy of individuals requires that we not release the full text of the NCAA alle-gations at the present time." Roselle said Saturday afternoon when the allegations were announced to the public.

Park did say however, that individuals named in the allegations should be given the opportunity to release their names if they saw fit.

Basketball team slapped with 17 more allegations

UK has until Dec. 12 to respond to 17 additional allegations of wrongdoing against its basketball program by the NCAA, which UK President David Roselle said Saturday were the cause of "grave

concern."

The allegations — which range in severity from illegal payments to one recruit to improperly providing transportation, free lodging, Teshits and other items to several others — were released at a press conference Saturday at UK's Patterson Office Tower.

The new allegations came almost three months after the NCAA formally alleged that assistant basketball coach Dwane Casey had sent \$1,000 in an Emery overnight package to the father of basketball

The allegations

Here are the allegations against the UK basketball program of violations of NCAA rules. Allegation No. 1 was announced in July 1988. The rest were announced Saturday. Items No. 19 and No. 20 are still under investigation by the NCAA.

1. It is alleged that on March 30, 1988, while recruiting prospective student-allete Chris Mills (Los Angeles, California), men's assistant baskethall coach Dwane Casey sent a package via Emery Worldwide Overnight Service that contained a videotape and 20 S50 bills to Claud Mills, the young man's famer, at the prospect's home; further, at approximately 11:57 a.m. (PST) on March 31, 1988, this package, which contained 20 S50 bills and the videotape, was delivered to the Mills home, and a receipt for the package was signed by the prospect.

After the University has responded to the additional allegations, it will face a meeting of the NCAA infractions committee each in Perburary and again in April.

1996-87 academic year, a member of the university's basketball staff offered the young man improper inducements in order to obtain his signature on a National Letter of Intent. The NCAA said it could not find a single violation within the four-year statute of limitations for which it could punish UK, although a \$100 handshake was confirmed outside that time period.

UK was required to submit periodic written reports on the men's basketball program, including economic audits of the player's employment earnings, fees from speaking engagements and from selling their complimentary tickets.

UK has spent at least \$122,067 on its internal investigation of possible infractions in its bas-ketball program ds.

The National Collegiate Athletic Association is also investigating the Kentucky program and issued another round of allegation on Saturday.

The NCAA has already charged that Kentucky assistant coach Dwane Casey sent \$1,000 in cash to the father of Wildeat recruit Chris Mills in Los Angeles in April. Casey has denied



Sutton should not seal his Wildcats from journalists

A full-blown NCAA investigation would make college of-ficials nervous. The recent steps, however, by UK men's basketball coach Eddie Sutton to seal his team off from the media is a bit extreme.

Last week, UK Sports Information Director Chris Cameron announced that a new policy would be imple-mented regarding the mens baketball team. Effective im-mediately, all practices are closed and media can talk to players before practices on Mondays and Fridays during the preseason.

After the season begins, players will be available to the media only on the two days before games. Practices are still closed.

That's quite a change from previous years when meet

That's quite a change from previous years when most

That's quite a change from previous years when most UK practices were open and players were available for interviews before and after practices.

Although the "official" reason Sutton has made the changes is to take some of the pressure off his players, the real reason the decision was made undoubtedly was in reaction to 17 new allegations announced by the NCAA.

Now is a time when the UK men's basketball program needs all the "positive" publicity it can get. Closing practices and restricting media access to the players only will breed more suspicion about the program.

And when the media does get a chance to talk to players many of the questions probably will be about the investigation, since they only get to talk to them a couple times a week.

a week.

If members of the media are permitted to speak to the players on a daily basis, questions about the investigation soon would run out and there would be a greater chance of a return to normalcy.

The new policy will force reporters to hunt down players on campus between classes, at malls and local night spots in order to talk to them, which will restrict many of players freedom even more.

When a high school superstar decides to play for the UK men's basketball team, he is in effect becoming a public figure and subject to the pressure a public figure has to endure.

If kepteld make that clean to all recruits when they are

UK should make that clear to all recruits when they are begging them to sign a national letter of intent.

Because of the monster UK has created, UK's fans crave at least one story a day from the state's major papers — not to mention the UK-only weekly and monthly publications that appear on newsstands.

If the basketball program wants to continue to receive attention from the media it must allow the media more ac-


