

FOREWORD

This bulletin includes a list of the educational institutions which have been approved by the Department of Education of Kentucky up to August 22, 1945 to participate in a Veterans' Training Program as provided under Public Law 346—78th Congress. It is hoped that this publication will serve as a guide to veterans counseling centers, selective service boards, separation centers, and all others who will have an opportunity to counsel with veterans regarding their educational and occupational plans.

This bulletin was prepared by the State Division of Vocational Education. For further information on offerings in the colleges or universities, communications should be directed to the respective institutions. For information on vocational education opportunities, inquiries should be directed to the respective institutions or to Mr. Watson Armstrong, State Director of Vocational Education Frankfort, Kentucky.

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Steps to Follow in Qualifying For Educational or Training Benefits Under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944 (G. I. Bill)

- I. The veteran makes application on Form No. 1950 for education or training. This application form may be secured from the Veterans Administration, Lexington, Kentucky. When completed and returned to the Veterans Administration, it must be accompanied by a certified copy of the veteran's discharge or release from the Armed Forces.
- II. Upon receipt of Form No. 1950 and the certified copy of the discharge or release, the Veterans Administration will determine the eligibility of the veteran for training and the length of time he is entitled to attend school.
- III. The Veterans Administration will, after determining eligibility, send the veteran at least two official copies of notification of the amount of schooling to which he or she may be entitled. This official notice will be the authority of the institution to enroll the veteran as a student.
- IV. On enrollment of the veteran as a student, the institution will forward by mail to the Veterans Administration, Lexington, Kentucky, the following papers:
 - A. A certified copy of the notice from the Veterans Administration notifying the veteran of his eligibility.
 - B. A certified statement showing:
 - 1. Date veteran commenced training, name of course, length of course, length of the ordinary school year, and whether or not the course is full-time or part-time.
 - 2. Customary cost of tuition for the ordinary school year, itemized cost of regular infirmary and similar fees, books, supplies, and equipment for the regular school year, as they are generally required for the successful completion of the courses by other students in the institution. Transportation and living expenses are not to be included.
- V. After the veteran has enrolled in the institution in the same manner and under the same conditions as non-veteran students, the matter of the payment of charges for tuition, books, supplies, and fees will be taken up with the school by the Veterans Administration.

APPROVED INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER LEARNING SENIOR COLLEGES

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ASBURY COLLEGE

Coeducational

- 1. Location: Wilmore, Kentucky
- 2. President: Z. T. Johnson

- 4. Accreditation:

This college is a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools; a member of the Association of American Colleges; and a member of the Kentucky Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

5. Admission Requirements:

Students who are graduates of a four-year accredited high school or students who present 15 standard units and pass the prescribed entrance tests may be admitted to the college as candidates for the Bachelor of Arts degree.

6. Degrees Conferred:

Bachelor of Arts (A.B.)

7. Curricular Offerings of Interest to Veterans:

This college offers general or cultural courses, courses in preparation for the ministry, courses in preparation for the mission field, courses in preparation for teaching, courses in preparation for the practice of medicine, and courses in the preparation for law.

8. Credit for War Service Educational Attainment:

No provisions for giving such credit are in effect.

9. Opportunities for Accelerated Study:

The college operates on a four quarter basis with quarters opening September, January, March, and June. Students who have demonstrated competence may accelerate by enrolling for more than the normal number of hours.

10. Special Class Arrangements for Employed Students:

None are in effect.

11. Counseling and Guidance Services:

Counseling and guidance services are maintained under the supervision of the President, the Dean of the College, the Dean of Men, and the Dean of Women.

12. Living Facilities:

Dormitories are available.

13. Health Services:

The college uses hospital service in Lexington and maintains at least two full time nurses on duty on the campus at all times.

14. Recreational Services:

Basketball, softball, volleyball, tennis, hiking, and other supervised physical activities, and class entertainments are provided by the college.

BEREA COLLEGE

Coeducational

1. Location: Berea, Kentucky

2. President: Dr. Francis S. Hutchins

3. Person Veteran is to Contact: Charles T. Morgan, Director of Admissions

4. Accreditation:

Berea College has been formally approved by the Veterans Administration for the education and training of veterans. At the collegiate level, this institution is approved by the Association of American Universities, and is a member of the Association of American Colleges, the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, and the Kentucky Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

5. Admission Requirements:

Admission to our **upper division** is on the basis of completing satisfactorily two full years in a liberal arts program, with a grade standing of not less than C. Admission to the freshman class of the **lower division** is on the basis of graduation from an accredited high school or the equivalent thereof as demonstrated by examination; the quality of achievement and ability; and need for a school like Berea.

By institutional regulation, ninety per cent of our students must come from the Appalachian area of the United States. The chief criteria for admission are ability and need.

6. Degrees Conferred:

The usual liberal arts B.A. degree, the B.S. degree in agriculture and the B.S. degree in home economics.

7. Curricular Offerings of Interest to Veterans:

a. The work for the B.S. degree with major work in education to qualify for a state high school or elementary certificate.

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- b. The B.S. degree in agriculture or in home economics for those interested in teaching, or in county agent, or in home demonstration work.
- c. The liberal arts program, leading to the B.A. degree with majors in the natural sciences, in the humanities, or in the social sciences.
- d. The business department with courses in secretarial science.

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- e. The department of nursing maintained in connection with our college hospital.
- f. Courses in handicrafts and in vocational arts, combined with actual job experience in connection with some of our varied college industries.

8. Credit for War Service Educational Attainment:

If the educational attainment is similar to that required for the completion of the college courses, then credit is given for:

- a. Completion of correspondence courses in approved colleges and universities.
- b. Satisfactory completion of courses given under the direction of the USAFI.
- c. Completion of courses in the various schools maintained by the Armed Forces.
- d. Completion of courses taught by the Armed Forces on various college campuses, such as work in the V-12 or ASTP.
- e. Credit also will be given for secondary level subjects or for general education courses at the collegiate level on the basis of demonstrated competence on standardized examinations, such as the General Educational Development Tests.

9. Opportunities for Accelerated Study:

- a. Students who can demonstrate competence in standardized comprehensive examinations will receive appropriate credit, and thus expedite completion of their courses.
- b. Students of unusually high scholarship may accelerate by taking slightly more than the ordinary 15 semester how course load.
- c. We plan some sort of summer session each year. This will enable some to progress more rapidly.

10. Special Class Arrangements for Employed Students:

All Berea College students take part in our institutional labor program.

11. Counseling and Guidance Services:

We have a special committee to plan for veterans at Berea College. The dean of the department concerned advises the student concerning his schedule of courses. Each student will have a faculty adviser who keeps in close and constant touch with his progress and problems. We expect to continue our close coopera-

tion with the men in the state and federal services whose responsibility it is to look after ex-service personnel. We have no intention of exaggerating the differences between veterans and non-veterans in our student body, but we expect to help exservice people to meet their special problems.

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We provide dormitories for our unmarried students. We will have a limited number of low-rent apartments for married couples, with preference given in letting places to couples when both are in school. We will also try to find suitable places in town for families we cannot accommodate in our dormitories.

13. Health Services:

Berea College has its own hospital and medical staff. We make a regular check on the physical condition of all students, and provide remedial services at very low cost.

14. Recreational Services:

We maintain a full recreational program for all students. Of course veterans would be invited to participate in this.

BOWLING GREEN BUSINESS UNIVERSITY AND COLLEGE OF COMMERCE

Coeducational

- 1. Location: Bowling Green, Kentucky

4. Accreditation:

The College of Commerce is accredited by the University of Kentucky as an A-grade senior college and by the Kentucky Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

The Commercial Department (non-college) is accredited by the State Department of Education.

5. Admission Requirements:

College of Commerce—regular college entrance requirements—high school graduation and 15 acceptable high school units.

Commercial (High School) Department—No entrance requirements are required.

6. Degrees Conferred:

B.S. degree in higher accounting B.S. degree in business administration A.B. degree in commercial education

7. Curricular Offerings of Interest to Veterans:

The College of Commerce offers:

a. The B.S. degree in higher accounting. The courses covered include:

accounting, economics, business administration, business law, English, mathematics, science, secretarial science, and typewriting.

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b. The B.S. degree in business administration. The courses covered include:

business administration, natural science, social science, mathematics, business law, accounting, English, and typewriting.

c. The B.S. degree in commercial education. Some of the courses offered are:

accounting, secretarial science, business administration, economics, business law, natural science, mathematics, English, education, health, physical education, and safety education.

Note: The two-year courses in all of the above meet the requirements for the A.C.A. Certificate.

The Non-College Department offers such courses as:

secretarial science, shorthand, typewriting, office practice, filing, bookkeeping and accounting, machine work, English, mathematics, spelling, rapid calculation, penmanship, business correspondence, business law, salesmanship, and economics.

8 Credit for War Service Educational Attainment:

This college will follow the standards adopted by other colleges. A committee is now at work on the details of a plan for giving such credit.

9. Opportunities for Accelerated Study:

All courses are set up on either the 36 or 48 week basis, providing an opportunity for the veteran to complete four years of work in three years, if it is desired to do so.

10. Special Class Arrangements for Employed Students:

This problem has not arisen in this college, but provisions will be made for such students, if the demand justifies it.

11. Counseling and Guidance Services:

J. R. Meany, Veterans Counselor, occupied a similar responsibility in connection with Navy V-1, V-5, and V-12 trainees in this school in the early stages of the war. An advisory Committee, consisting of the President, the Dean, the Registrar, and the Veterans Counselor is functioning. Weekly sessions of all teachers of veterans are held for the discussion of their problems in connection with the teaching of veterans.

12. Living Facilities:

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The college is located in the center of the best residential section of the city. Students live in approved private homes near the school. All students live within easy walking distance of the campus. Living expenses are reasonable.

13. Health Services:

All students in the College of Commerce are required to submit to periodic physical examinations at Graves Clinic located near the campus. We have a permanent working arrangement with this excellent clinic.

14. Recreational Services:

Tennis, golf, swimming, picnics in nearby parks, and frequent trips to Mammoth Cave National Park are sponsored by the college. School-promoted and supervised parties and dances are held. Five clubs, fraternities, and sororities, the members of which are selected on the basis of scholarship, personality, and general standing with faculty and students are organized on the campus.

CENTRE COLLEGE

A College For Men and a College For Women

- 1. Location: Danville, Kentucky
- 2. Dean: James H. Hewlett
- 3. Person Veteran is to Contact: James H. Hewlett, Dean

4. Accreditation:

Centre College is fully accredited by all accrediting agencies in this region, including the Association of American Universities and the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

5. Admission Requirements:

Admission may be granted:

- a. Graduates of accredited high schools, whose scholastic average places them in the upper two-thirds of their class.
- b. Graduates of accredited high schools who were graduated in the lower third of the class, but making satisfactory scores on four entrance tests.
- c. Any veteran, not necessarily a graduate of an accredited high school, who has completed 15 approved units of preparatory school work and who makes a satisfactory grade on the four entrance tests.
- d. Non-graduates of high schools who are beyond high school age, provided they are manifestly in earnest and give promise through our testing program of profiting by instruction here.

e. Veterans, who because of physical disability or some other valid reason, wish to enter as special students instead of following the general curriculum. Each case will be decided on its merits.

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6. Degrees Conferred:

Bachelor of Arts (B.A.)
Bachelor of Science (B.S.)

7. Curricular Offerings of Interest to Veterans:

Special programs have been set up for veterans who plan to enter graduate schools or professional schools of law, journalism, business administration, dentistry, medicine, religious education, social service, the ministry, library science, and engineering. Also for those who wish to enter certain fields of business, teaching in secondary schools, social work, nursing, public health, laboratory work, dietetics, and home economics. Majors are offered in the following fields: biology, chemistry, economics and business administration, English, French, German, Spanish, Latin, Greek, history and political science, mathematics, philosophy, psychology, religion, sociology, music, and home economics.

8 Credit for War Service Educational Attainment:

Credit will be allowed veterans for such studies pursued in the Service as may properly be accepted by a liberal arts college. In granting such credit, Centre will be guided by the recommendations of the United States Armed Forces Institute. If a veteran feels that any of his military experience has academic value, he is given the privilege of demonstrating the fact by taking the tests provided for that purpose by the United States Armed Forces Institute.

9. Opportunities for Accelerated Study:

- a. Centre College has adopted the quarter system so that veterans may regularly enter at the beginning of each quarter and for the summer session. They should be able to do four years of work in three calendar years.
- b. Students who have demonstrated competence may accelerate by enrolling for more than the normal number of courses.

10. Special Class Arrangements for Employed Students:

Special classes will be arranged for veterans who are employed while they are in college, or their schedules will be so arranged that they can meet their classes and still carry on their employment.

11. Counseling and Guidance Services:

- a. The Counseling and Guidance Program operates mainly through the offices of the Dean of the College, the Dean of Men, and the Dean of Women with the special cooperation of the department of psychology.
- b. The Dean of the College advises the veteran concerning op-

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portunities at Centre College and his or her schedule of courses.

- c. The Director of Placement counsels the veteran concerning opportunities for employment.
- d. Every veteran has a faculty adviser.

12. Living Facilities:

The college provides meals in the dining room of the college and also provides a list of rooms available in Danville. Dormitory facilities are provided if the demand is sufficient.

13. Health Services:

A special medical fee is charged which provides medical services by the college physician for minor illnesses but does not include hospitalization. Local hospital facilities are available in Danville at the Ephriam McDowell Memorial Hospital. The Darnall Government Hospital is located a few miles outside Danville. The Veterans Hospital is located at Lexington.

14. Recreational Services:

An organized recreational program is planned with trained faculty people in charge, also inter-collegiate athletics when enrollment of men is sufficient.

EASTERN KENTUCKY STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE

Coeducational

- 1. Location: Richmond, Kentucky
- 2. President: W. F. O'Donnell
- 3. Person Veteran is to Contact: M. E. Mattox, Registrar

4. Accreditation:

This college is approved by the Kentucky Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, the American Association of Teachers Colleges, the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, the American Association of University Women, and the American Council on Education.

5. Admission Requirements:

- a. Graduation from an accredited high school with two majors, one of which shall be English, and a minor.
- b. Veterans who have not graduated from high school may be regularly classified provided the work which they had in high school plus the training which they had in service, when evaluated according to recommendations in the **Handbook** published by the American Council on Education, amounts to the minimum requirements for admission.
- c. Veterans who cannot be classified under either of the above provisions will be admitted as special students. Deficiencies in entrance requirements may be made up after admission to the institution.

6. Degrees Conferred:

Bachelor of Arts (B.A.)
Bachelor of Science (B.S.)
Master of Arts in Education (M.A.)

7. Curricular Offerings of Interest to Veterans:

a. Professional courses to qualify teachers, supervisors and administrators for work in public schools and colleges.

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- b. Pre-professional courses needed by students who are preparing to enter medical and dental schools, colleges of law and colleges of engineering.
- c. Commerce: accounting, general business, secretarial work
- d. Regular liberal arts courses with majors in art, biology, chemistry, English, French, geography and geology, health and physical education, history, home economics, industrial arts, Latin, mathematics, music, physics and social science.

8 Credit for War Service Educational Attainment:

If the educational attainment is similar to that required for the completion of the college courses, then credit is given for:

- a. Completion of correspondence courses in approved colleges and universities.
- b. Completion of college level courses given under the direction of the United States Armed Forces Institute.
- c. Completion of courses in the various schools of the Armed Forces.
- d. Completion of courses taught by the Armed Forces on various college and university campuses.

9. Opportunities for Accelerated Study:

- a. Students who have demonstrated competence may accelerate by enrolling for more than the normal number of courses.
- b. Students may accelerate by attending, in addition to the regular college, a summer session of 12 weeks.

10. Special Features for Employed Students:

Students who wish to attend college while regularly employed may elect to take a reduced load in college.

11. Counseling and Guidance Services:

- a. The Coordinator of Veterans' Programs directs the induction of the veteran into the college.
- b The Dean of the College advises the veteran concerning his schedule of courses.
- c. The Director of Personnel arranges special examinations to meet educational, vocational, or personal needs of the veteran. He also renders consultant services related to such problems.

12. Living Facilities:

The college dormitories accommodate 528 women and 234 men. Off-campus rooms and apartments are available. The college operates a well-equipped cafeteria in the Student Union.

13. Health Services:

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The college has a full-time physician and a nurse. No charge is made for their services to students.

14. Recreational Services:

The center of social life at Eastern is the Student Union. The college is represented in intercollegiate athletics by teams in football, baseball, basketball, swimming, tennis, and golf. A strong intramural program of competitive sports is sponsored.

GEORGETOWN COLLEGE

Coeducational

- 1. Location: Georgetown, Kentucky
- 2. President: S. S. Hill
- 3. Persons Veteran is to Contact: Robert T. Hinton, Dean; Edna Record, Registrar

4. Accreditation:

This college is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, and is a member of the Association of American Colleges.

5. Admission Requirements:

Admission is based on the presentation of fifteen units and a certificate of graduation from an approved high school. Where students cannot offer fifteen units of credit but show equivalent preparation they may be admitted by taking examinations in such subjects as the college may select. Students above twenty years of age and unable to present fifteen units may be admitted as "special" students.

Students taking less than the minimum normal load may be admitted as "non-matriculates".

6. Degrees Conferred:

Bachelor of Arts (B.A.)

7. Curricular Offerings of Interest to Veterans:

Majors in art and music.

Majors in the division of humanities, natural sciences, social sciences, including secretarial studies, and Bible for the training of ministers and church secretaries.

8 Credit for War Service Educational Attainment:

Where the courses given parallel the college courses credit is given for:

- a. Correspondence courses completed in approved institutions.
- b. Courses completed under the direction of the U.S. Armed Forces Institute.
- c. Courses completed in the various schools of the Armed Forces.

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d. Completion of courses taught by the Armed Forces on college and university campuses.

9. Opportunities for Accelerated Study:

On proof of ability students may take extra hours above the normal load or may attend the summer quarter of 12 weeks, in addition to the regular terms.

10. Special Class Arrangements for Employed Students:

Depending on the type and time of employment, students may attend special Saturday classes, complete some courses by consultation, correspondence, or extension.

11. Counseling and Guidance Services:

By the Dean of the College By various faculty members appointed for the purpose By the Director of Placement

12. Living Facilities:

Dormitories for both men and women are available.

13. Health Services:

A college nurse with the necessary facilities to treat minor cases is on duty. Local hospital service is available in the city.

14. Recreational Services:

A full recreational program under the supervision of the Director of Athletics is in operation.

KENTUCKY WESLEYAN COLLEGE

Coeducational

- 1. Location: Winchester, Kentucky

4. Accreditation:

Kentucky Wesleyan College is a full member of the Association of American Colleges and of the Kentucky Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. Kentucky Wesleyan College is

on the non-member list of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

5. Admission Requirements:

- a. Fifteen units are required for admission: five of these are specified and ten are elective. The specified units are three in English and two in mathematics—algebra through the binomial theorem and plane geometry.
- b. The ten or more units offered as electives must be acceptable to the Committee on Admissions.

6. Degrees Conferred:

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Bachelor of Arts (B.A.)

7. Curricular Offerings of Interest to Veterans:

A general liberal education with majors in the following fields: biology, chemistry, economics and sociology, English, French, history, history and political science, history and social science, Latin, mathematics, physical sciences, religion, and the social sciences.

8 Credit for War Service Educational Attainment:

If the educational attainment is similar to that required for the completion of the college courses, then credit is given for:

- a. Completion of correspondence courses in approved colleges and universities.
- b. Completion of college level courses given under the direction of the United States Armed Forces Institute.
- c. Completion of courses in the various schools of the Armed Forces.
- d. Completion of courses taught by the Armed Forces in various colleges and universities.

9. Opportunities for Accelerated Study:

In addition to the regular terms, there is a summer session of 8 weeks.

10. Special Class Arrangements for Employed Students:

Veterans will be in classes with the regular students.

11. Counseling and Guidance Services:

Freshmen and sophomores are assigned to individual faculty members. Juniors and seniors are under the direction of their major professor.

12. Living Facilities:

Boys' dormitories.

13. Health Services:

A college physician and the services of the Guerrant Clinic are available.

14. Recreational Services:

Gymnasium facilities, a swimming pool, tennis courts, a recreation room, a hockey field, and other facilities are provided.

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KENTUCKY STATE COLLEGE FOR NEGROES

Coeducational

- 1. Location: Frankfort, Kentucky

- 4. Accreditation:

This college is accredited as a standard class A four year college by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

5. Admission Requirements:

Admission is based upon:

- a. Graduation from an accredited high school with at least 15 acceptable high school units.
- b. Demonstrated competence as revealed by the tests recommended by the Armed Forces Institute and the American Council on Education.
- c. The desire of non-high school graduates to enroll as special students and take certain specified courses, continuance in which is contingent on the approval of the instructor concerned.

6. Degrees Conferred:

Bachelor of Arts (A.B.)
Bachelor of Science (B.S.)

7. Curricular Offerings of Interest to Veterans:

For the regular students courses leading to the Bachelor of Arts or the Bachelor of Science degrees are as follows:

Credit will be given for:

costume designing

a. The completion of correspondence courses in approved colleges and universities;

 the completion of college level courses as recommended by U.S.A.F.I.; credit may be granted in specific cases for completion of courses in the various schools of the Armed Services; credit may be gained by examination at Kentucky State College For Negroes;

c. the completion, in specific cases, of courses taken in the various schools of the Armed Forces;

d. examinations passed at Kentucky State College For Negroes.

9. Opportunities for Accelerated Study:

No accelerated program is provided except for veterans who desire to enroll as special students and who do not desire credit, i. e., if a veteran does not desire credit, he may proceed in study at his own rate.

10. Special Class Arrangements for Employed Students:

No special class arrangements have been made for employed students.

11. Counseling and Guidance Services:

The Dean of the college serves as adviser to veterans.

12. Living Facilities:

Veterans will be regarded as regular dormitory students.

13. Health Services:

The college employs a part-time physician and a full-time nurse, but the college has no regular hospital beds.

14. Recreational Services:

A full program of recreational and athletic activities is carried on by the college.

MOREHEAD STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE

4. Accreditation:

This college is accredited by the Kentucky Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools; the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools; and the American Association of Teachers Colleges.

5. Admission Requirements:

The veteran who has served at least three months may be admitted in one of the following ways:

a. Graduation from an accredited high school with at least 15 acceptable high school units.

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- b. By examination, although not a graduate of an accredited high school, provided 15 acceptable high school units are presented.
- c. As a special student regardless of age or entrance credentials. Before a special student can become a candidate for a degree or certificate he must have his status changed to that of a regular student. Veterans may do this in either of two ways:
 - (1) by satisfying the requirements for admission to the freshman class.
 - (2) by completing two years of work in this college with a standing of at least 1.5 in all work attempted.

6. Degrees Conferred:

A.B. in Education (with either an elementary or secondary certificate)

B.S. in Education (with either an elementary or secondary certificate)

8. Credit for War Service Educational Attainment:

Eight quarter hours of credit will be granted upon the presentation of evidence of having completed basic training courses in the Armed Forces.

Credit will be granted for work completed in the Army Specialized Training and Navy V-12 Programs on the same basis as any other work taken in accredited colleges or universities. Credit for specialized training taken in other than accredited institutions will be allowed on the basis of proficiency examinations, information compiled by the American Council on Education, and the services of the Armed Forces Institute.

9. Opportunities for Accelerated Study:

The college is in session four quarters each year. Students who attend all quarters may finish their programs in three years. Students who demonstrate their ability to do so may carry "extra loads" thereby reducing the time spent in residence.

For Veterans—The rules for the admission and continued registration for demobilized students are, in general, the same as those for other students; however, the emphasis will be put on the student's ability to do college work rather than on the formal completion of specific units of high school work or upon graduation from high school. By means of testing programs approved by recognized educational agencies, each student will be classified and enrolled in the college at the educational level to which he is entitled by his actual educational achievements. Any educational experiences that the veteran may have had in the Armed Forces which might entitle him to receive credit will be given full consideration. In granting such credit, the college will be guided by the recommendations of the American Council on Education, the U.S. Armed Forces Institute, and other agencies. Veterans whose background and training do not meet college requirements may take review courses in subjects such as pre-college English and mathematics.

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As A Special Student—Any person over 21 years of age who is unable to meet college entrance requirements may be admitted as a special student to such college classes or curricula as he is qualified to enter; however, before a degree is granted, he must fulfill the college entrance requirements as specified in college catalogue.

Transylvania College offers veterans liberal arts, pre-professional, and some vocational training. The school considers that it has a duty to furnish a liberal education of the highest quality. This motive underlies and gives distinctive continuity to its entire academic program.

In addition to the background of liberal education, the courses of study provide training in many pre-professional and vocational fields. (2) two majors of not less than three units each, one of which should be English and a minor of at least two units.

The other units are to be selected from foreign languages, social sciences, mathematics, music, science, and vocational subjects.

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- To advanced standing:
 Transfer students are given advanced standing according to the amount and character of credit presented.
- c. To graduate standing:
 Students admitted to the graduate division of the college
 must hold the Bachelor's degree from an accredited fouryear college and must have completed a minimum of eighteen quarter hours in education.
- d. Admission of Veterans:
 Special provisions have been made for admission of returning veterans on the basis of previous educational experience, results of standard tests, and recommendations from high school principals.

6. Degrees Conferred:

Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, and Master of Arts in Education.

7. Curricular Offerings of Interest to Veterans:

a. Teacher training curricula:

Preparation for every type of educational positions in the public schools of Kentucky including agriculture, home economics, industrial arts, physical education, and music.

A standard Theological School Curriculum is provided, including Old Testament, New Testament, Church History, Christian Doctrine, Pastoral Theology, Religious Education, and Missions.

8. Credit for War Service Educational Attainment:

War service educational attainment is almost entirely in the undergraduate field and should be used to assist men toward completing the entrance requirements.

9. Opportunities for Accelerated Study:

The veteran may accelerate by attending the summer sessions which usually last for six weeks.

10. Special Class Arrangements for Employed Students:

Employment of students is usually in the form of student preaching for nearby churches. The four day schedule of classes (Tues., Wed., Thurs., and Fri.) makes week-end work of this type possible.

11. Counseling and Guidance Services:

All members of the faculty assist in this, since each student is usually assigned to his major professor. The professor of Pastoral Theology offers special advice to students in connection with preaching appointments.

12. Living Facilities:

The dormitories of Transylvania College are open to both men and women students. Opportunities for securing accommodations in private homes have been sufficient to supply the demand in the past.

13. Health Services:

The private medical and related facilities of Lexington have made special services in the health field practically unnecessary.

14. Recreational Services:

No organized formal recreational service is provided but ample opportunities are available through the facilities of the community.

6. Degrees Conferred:

Bachelor of Law.

7. Curricular Offerings of Interest to Veterans:

A course of study in law qualifying one for either the practice of law or business of the market place.

8. Credit for War Service Educational Attainment:

No provision is allowed under "Rules for Admission to the Bar" for credit in law courses; however, certain credits are allowed with reference to academic work, and such credit as is allowed by colleges and universities, having academic departments. Such credit should be obtained by and through a college or university in Kentucky before entering the Jefferson School of Law.

9. Opportunities for Accelerated Study:

The New Rules for Admission to the Bar require the completion of three full years of law school work which cannot be accelerated.

10. Special Class Arrangements for Employed Students:

Classes are conducted at night. Hours: 7:00 to 8:30 P. M., hence the employed student may attend.

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11. Counseling and Guidance Services:

The Registrar provides necessary counseling and guidance services.

12. Living Facilities:

None provided by the institution.

None provided by the institution.

14. Recreational Services:

None provided by the institution.

5. Admission Requirements:

Admission is based upon the following factors:

- a. Posession of the A.B. degree or its equivalent from an accredited institution.
- b. The quality of achievement in schools previously attended.
- c. The personal qualifications of the applicant.
- 6. Degrees Conferred:

Bachelor of Divinity (B.D.) Master of Theology (Th.M.)

7. Curricular Offerings of Interest to Veterans:

All our offerings are for the preparation of ministers. Any veteran interested in becoming a minister would find the curriculum suited to his needs.

Returning chaplains are to be offered refresher courses in the practical field of the minister and his work.

8. Credit for War Service Educational Attainment:

Since no work beyond the college or university level was offered by Armed Forces Institute, it is unlikely that we could give credit for war service educational attainment.

9. Opportunities for Accelerated Study:

a. Students who have demonstrated competence may accelerate by enrolling for more than the normal number of courses but this is not encouraged because the program of field work for students is heavy and work in the parishes is deemed as important as class room work.

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10. Special Class Arrangements for Employed Students:

Our students are not employed except as student preachers, and they work under the supervision of a field director. Classes are not held on Monday in order that they may have a full weekend in the field.

11. Counseling and Guidance Services:

- a. The Dean of the seminary, with the President, advises the applicant concerning his schedule of courses.
- b. The Field Director counsels the applicant concerning personal affairs and placement as a student pastor.

12. Living Facilities:

Dormitory facilities are available. Regular meals are served except on Sunday.

13. Health Services:

The seminary provides the professional services of a physician for all students, for which a small health fee is paid by the student.

14. Recreational Services:

The seminary has no recreational facilities as such—but it is located near the Y.M.C.A. and other places which offer recreational programs in which students may participate.

MOUNTAIN PREACHERS BIBLE SCHOOL

Coeducational

4. Accreditation:

This is a new institution, and it is not accredited by any of the college accrediting agencies. It is an unque type of school set up to help the under-graduate. It is recognized by the Government as a theological school coming under the Selective Service Act of 1940, within the meaning of Section 5 (d) of said Act.

5. Admission Requirements:

Admission to the Mountain Preachers Bible School is based on the following requirements which the student must meet:

- a. Be of good moral standing
- b. Give creditable evidence of a call to the ministry, if he applies as a minister; however, students will not be kept back because of any lack of educational training.
- c. Any under-graduate man or woman showing good character may enroll.

6. Degrees Conferred:

We do not confer degrees, but do give certificates at the end of the three years' course.

7. Curricular Offerings of Interest to Veterans:

We expect to offer correspondence courses in a year or so. We also expect to have a circulating library.

8. Credit for War Service Educational Attainment:

We give no credit for war service educational attainment.

9. Opportunities for Accelerated Study:

Students who have demonstrated competence may accelerate by taking grade or high school subjects in connection with the local county schools.

NOTE: Technically speaking this institution is not an institution of higher learning but it is included under the "Technical and Professional Schools" to avoid creating a separate classification.

10. Special Class Arrangements for Employed Students:

Evening classes are contemplated for men and women who cannot attend during the day. Certificates will be awarded when they complete the required courses.

11. Counseling and Guidance Services:

The Dean advises the veteran when he needs help in his courses. The faculty assists in guidance as needed.

12. Living Facilities:

A rock and cinder block hotel of 106 rooms with hot and cold running water in each room is available. Meals are served in the building. A limited number of cabins for men with families are available. Use of the cabins is free, provided they are kept in repair by the occupant.

13. Health Services:

Students carry hospitalization for rooms in the community hospital located in Pineville. Physicians are available in Pineville which is located five miles from the school.

14. Recreational Services:

None are provided by the institution.

SOUTHERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY A Seminary For Men

4. Accreditation:

The Southern Baptist Seminary is accredited by the American Association of Theological Schools.

5. Admission Requirements:

There are no academic requirements for admission. Students must be recommended by the church of their membership as students worthy of the ministry.

6. Degrees Conferred:

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Bachelor in Theology—three years with 60 hours of college work are required.

Bachelor of Divinity—three years. The A. B. degree is a prerequisite.

Master in Theology—one year above the B. D. degree.

Doctor in Theology—one year above the Master in Theology.

7. Curricular Offerings of Interest to Veterans:

Regular ministerial course to prepare men for pastoral positions. Educational courses for pastors' assistants and directors of education. Our music school prepares men for the music ministry and choir leadership.

8. Credit for War Service Educational Attainment:

We allow no credit for work done anywhere except in residence in an accredited or acceptable seminary or Bible school. Correspondence work or extension courses are not accepted for credit.

9. Opportunities for Accelerated Study:

Our ministerial course covers three years work. Arrangements for acceleration are not provided.

10. Special Class Arrangements for Employed Students:

Most of our basic classes come in the mornings, Tuesday through Saturday. Students may work afternoons or evenings.

11. Counseling and Guidance Services:

Our seminary employs a full time counselor whose field is the orientation and guidance of all students and especially of in coming men.

12. Living Facilities:

Dormitories are provided for single men. Rooms with meals in the dining hall for couples without children are provided. Apartments for married couples with or without children are provided. Limit of family—two children. Maximum age of children admitted to apartments—12.

13. Health Services:

The seminary operates a six bed infirmary. Two resident nurses are on duty. We have a medical staff of six physicians, each holding a weekly clinic (medical; surgery; ear, eye, nose; pediatrics, etc.)

14. Recreational Services:

The seminary has a Director of Athletics, five tennis courts, a swimming pool, and a gymnasium. The seminary has a basketball team.

APPROVED SECONDARY SCHOOLS

Veterans may want to return to high school to prepare for college entrance, or to increase their civic and vocational efficiency. Interested veterans should get in touch with the principal of the school they plan to attend. The principal should then assist the veteran in planning his educational program.

The need for giving high school credit for educational experiences while in the Armed Forces has been recognized by the State Board of Education in the regulations passed on September 15, 1944. A summary of these regulations follows:

A Summary of Regulations Regarding High School Credit for Educational Experience in Military Service

- 1. Credit toward high school graduation may be allowed for educational experience in military service on the basis of recommendations made by the United States Armed Forces Institute, Madison 3, Wisconsin.
- 2. The pupil desiring such credit should request the Armed Forces Institute to send a complete record of his educational training and experience to the high school which he designates.
- 3. The local school should give special attention to the following items in evaluating the Institute's reports regarding Specialized Training Courses:
 - (a) the name of each course successfully completed.
 - (b) the grade made in each course successfully completed.
 - (c) the number of clock hours spent in each course successfully completed.
 - (d) in such courses 180 clock hours is the minimum time allotment for one unit of credit; 90 clock hours is the minimum time allotment for one half unit of credit.
- 4. Off-duty educational courses such as correspondence courses should be evaluated by the local school on the basis of information furnished by the Institute.
- 5. Before a pupil may receive a diploma from an accredited high school under these regulations, the following conditions must be met:

(a) At least twelve (12) units of high school work in regular attendance during the regular term must be completed. Variations from this standard must be approved by the State Director of Supervision.

(b) The regular subject requirements of the school granting the diploma must be met.

- (c) The educational experience and achievement reported by the Armed Forces Institute should be evaluated in terms of units and must bring the total amount of credit up to sixteen units in order to qualify the pupil for graduation.
- (d) Not more than two units of credit may be given for the completion of the various Basic or Recruit Training Programs.
- 6. Veterans who wish high school credit for educational or training experiences while in the Armed Forces should use the application blank, "Application For Educational Achievement During Military Service", USAFI Form 47, Revised Sept. 1944. Complete page one and mail to the Armed Forces Institute, Madison 3, Wisconsin. The Institute will complete and return to the principal of the high school designated by the veteran.
- 7. To assist him in the evaluation of the military training of the application as certified by the Institute, the principal should:
 - (a) read very carefully the instructions accompanying the completed Form 47.
 - (b) consult the handbook, "A Guide to the Evaluation of Educational Experience In the Armed Forces", published by the American Council on Education, 1201 Sixteenth Street, Washington, D. C
 - (c) consult the pamphlet, "Earning Secondary School Credit In the Armed Forces," published by the National Association of Secondary School Principals, 363 Administration Building, Urbana, Ill.

Kentucky has twelve vocational schools for white persons. Each school serves several districts. For the most part these schools are operated by the local boards of education in cooperation with the State Division of Vocational Education. Four similar schools are operated for the benefit of Negroes. Facilities are available in each of these vocational school centers for training in practically every trade or industrial pursuit, and in some of the schools in the commercial field. Other schools throughout the state offer one or two vocational courses in trades and industries. Train-

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ing in the retail occupations is available in or under the direction of each of the twelve vocational schools for white persons. The objectives of each course in all of these schools are to make persons employable in a specific occupation.

The schools have already done an outstanding job in carrying out a vocational training program during the period of the war effort, and there is little doubt that this same effectiveness can be realized in training many of our returned service men and women for employment now and in the postwar period.

The vocational schools are so located throughout the state that those discharged veterans whose interests, needs, and aptitudes indicate the desirability of vocational training will find it convenient to enroll.

The facilities available for vocational training in trades and industries, office practice, and retail occupations are described below. For the convenience of school personnel, the name and address of the superintendent of schools or other persons in charge of the local school unit is given, as well as that of the coordinator in charge of the various vocational schools. Contact with any particular school should be made through the superintendent, coordinator, or principal.

Discharged members of the Armed Forces who desire refresher training in an occupation, or, who wish to prepare themselves for a specific occupation, either for immediate use in the war effort, or for increased proficiency in the postwar period, should get in touch with the school nearest to them which offers the desired training.

Courses Offered in Trades and Industries and the Retail Occupations in the Larger Vocational Schools

Each of these schools has facilities available for training in some or most of the occupations listed below.

Trades and Industries: aircraft engines, aircraft sheetmetal architectural drafting, auto mechanics, barbering, bookbinding chef training, commercial art, commercial dressmaking, cosmetology, electrical wiring, foundry, garment servicing, industrial electricity, janitorial service, machine shop practice, masonry, mechanical drafting, office practice, plumbing and heating, printing (hand composition), printing (press work), linotype operation, radio service, refrigeration service, sheet metal, instrument and watch repair, electric welding, acetylene welding, woodworking

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iry, inton, nd (carpentry), woodworking (cabinet making), woodworking (machine), and other building trades.

Retail Occupations: Sales Training for—department, variety, shoe, hardware, and grocery stores, restaurants and similar businesses. Merchandise Training including—men's and women's wear, textiles, groceries, hardware and similar lines of merchandise. Business Promotion including—advertising, showcard writing, and window and interior display. Management Training including—starting a small business, record keeping, employer-employee relations, business speech, business arithmetic, how to train an employee, and other similar supervisory training courses.

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The Apprentice, the Cooperative, and the On-the-Job Training Programs

There are three distinct types of trade and industrial training programs which returning veterans may want to enter besides fulltime in-school training.

Apprentice Training

This training program is carried on through the cooperation of industry, labor, the vocational schools, and the apprentice in recognized trades or occupations requiring 4,000 hours or more of on-the-job experience plus a minimum of 144 hours a year of related technical instruction in a school.

Eligible establishments have either submitted a written program of apprenticeship or they are participants in such a program.

The apprenticeship agreement specifies the schedule of processes, the approximate amount of time to be spent in each process, and the wage scale throughout the program of indenture. wage scale must average at least 50 per cent of the journeyman's wage during the period of indenture.

Detailed information in respect to specific trades in which apprenticeship training is available may be secured from the State Director of Vocational Education, Mr. Watson Armstrong, Frankfor, Kentucky, or from Mr. Harold G. Wilson, State Supervisor of Trade and Industrial Education, Division of Vocational Education, Frankfort, Kentucky. The Superintendents of schools having charge of the Area Vocational Schools or the Coordinator of these schools can also give the interested veteran the desired information.

Cooperative Occupational Training

The Cooperative Occupational Training Program is operated through the cooperation of industry or business and the school. The training is under the direction of the school and the industrial or business establishment in which the veteran secures his work experience is considered a definite part of the total training facilities made available by the school.

The local school assumes the responsibility for seeing that a satisfactory instructional pattern is carried out on-the-job and in the school.

Detailed information on this type of training may be secured from Mr. Watson Armstrong, Director of Vocational Education, Frankfort, Kentucky, or from Mr. Harold G. Wilson, State Supervisor of Trade and Industrial Education, Division of Vocational Education, Frankfort, Kentucky. The Superintendents of schools in the centers where the Area Vocational Schools are located or the Coordinators of these schools can also supply this information.

On-the-Job Training

Where the schools find it impossible to provide either apprentice or cooperative occupational training for a veteran, business or industrial establishments may be approved to provide on-the-job training for him. Several establishments have been approved for this type of training.

Establishments are approved for this type of training on the basis of a written program of on-the-job training. The written program is specific in regard to such factors as: the quality of the instruction and supervision provided by the establishment; the provision of adequate facilities for training; a well organized sequence of job-experiences with provision made for the proper time allotment for each experience; keeping adequate progress records, and the payment of a wage scale, which, over the term of training will average at least 50 per cent of the average trained worker rate in the occupation the establishment represents.

A list of the firms already approved for this type of training and other detailed information may be secured from Mr. Watson Armstrong, Director of the Division of Vocational Education, Frankfort, Kentucky, or from Mr. Harold G. Wilson, State Supervisor of Trade and Industrial Education, Frankfort, Kentucky.

Approved Facilities For Providing Vocational Training In Agriculture And General Shop Work

If instruction in agriculture is to be effective it must be specifically in terms of the individual and his farming opportunities. One of the big jobs to be dealt with in providing satisfactory agricultural training to returning service-men is the matter of getting them started in farming and providing the necessary instruction simultaneously with their effort to become established in farming. It will be possible for returning veterans to be, in a sense, apprenticed to teachers of agriculture who have charge of local programs of vocational agriculture. The teacher can hold classes for veterans when there is a sufficient number to justify it. In addition to this, he can work with them individually at school and on the farm. His work will include the making of detailed farm plans and farm

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budgets, determining the approved practices to follow in the respective enterprises in order that efficient production may be possible, and in addition to instruction in production and marketing practices, there are opportunities in each of the centers for the servicemen to learn to do the repair and construction work needed on farms. Each of the vocational agriculture shops is equipped to provide general pre-employment training in woodworking, metal work, electricity, and auto mechanics. General pre-employment courses can be arranged in each of these centers for servicemen in order to provide needed initial training before the men enroll in a specific vocational course in a regular trade school.

Specific instruction can be given in the various farm enterprises such as: corn, tobacco, small grains, dairying, sheep, swine, and poultry, as well as in soils, farm management, and other subjects. Persons desiring such instruction should get in touch with the local teacher of vocational agriculture.

Returning veterans who wish to resume farming operations, or who wish to begin farming operations as a new farmer, and feel the need of any of the above listed type of instruction, should get in touch with the teacher of vocational agriculture in their home community.
